





July I preached a homily about lay ministry, and I'd like to share an adapted form of that homily again here for your prayer and reflection. May we all answer the call of God on our lives and be empowered to serve the community around us!

A Homily from July 3, 2022

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

A Week at Good Shepherd

On Monday of this past week here at Good Shepherd, a group of parishioners gathered to discern with someone how God might be calling her to serve the world, while the Good Shepherd school board received an update of the success of the school's summer camp.

On Tuesday of this week more than 50 families received supplemental groceries from our food pantry, while a gathering of friends and neighbors came together in person and online to celebrate the life and mourn the death of a loved one.

On Wednesday of this week Good Shepherd parishioners joined with other Episcopalians across the diocese to learn more about how our congregations can better serve women and their reproductive health, while another group of parishioners joined to discuss how to offer continued support to our outreach ministries.

On Thursday of this week a group of parishioners joined on zoom to start their day off in prayer for one another, their church, and the world, while a member of the pastoral care team checked in on a parishioner going through an illness.

On Friday of this week a volunteer prepared and printed bulletins for today's service, while a woman received financial assistance in a time of need.

On Saturday of this week two parishioners set the altar for

our Sunday service, while others decorated and cooked for a celebration of one parishioner's decades of ministry at Good Shepherd before she moves away.

And on Sunday, this community gathers as it does every week—some of us having been here for a long time, and others of us here to visit for the very first time—some of us locally and in person, and some of us thousands of miles away online—to pray and worship and spend time with one another in fellowship.

This is but a tiny glimpse of everything that goes on here day after day, week after week at Good Shepherd. And almost all led, facilitated, and embodied by you: the lay ministers of this church. The harvest is plentiful and the mission and ministry of Good Shepherd Episcopal Church is alive and well.

Who are the seventy?

In the first twenty verse of Luke's tenth chapter, Jesus sends out seventy people into the country between Galilee and Jerusalem to proclaim God's mission to the world. He tells them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Go on your way." And so they go and when they return they are filled with joy at the things they were able to do in Jesus' name.

But I have a question about this passage. Who are these people? Who are the seventy that Jesus sends out? This is the only time the seventy are mentioned in the entire Bible. And yet they must have been important to be sent out by Jesus and have their mission recorded.

It's interesting because this passage in chapter 10 is almost a mirror image of a passage in chapter 9 where Jesus sends out his *twelve* disciples to proclaim God's mission to the world.

In both passages the missionaries are sent out to heal the sick, to cast out demons, and to proclaim God's kingdom. In both passages they are to take nothing with them for the journey. In both passages they are told to stay in one house per village. The

difference is: we know who the disciples are. We know the stories of James and John. Of Peter and Andrew. We've heard the names of Judas, Matthew, and Philip. But who are these seventy?

I think the seventy are *all* those who volunteered to participate in God's mission in the world. Not just a select few, but all who answered Jesus' call. I think this passage is teaching us that the mission of God is reserved not just for a few but for all those willing to take it up.

See, normally the twelve disciples for us represent a small group of leaders

who carry on Jesus' message. Each of the twelve went on to become bishops throughout the world and so in some ways the twelve disciples represent clergy. Ordained ministers. They represent those among Jesus' followers with a specific kind of role to lead and guide the community of the church.

And yet, here in the gospel of Luke the seventy are sent out to do virtually the same work as the twelve disciples. The mission of God is proclaimed not only by Jesus, and not only by the twelve disciples, but by all who are willing to accept God's call in their lives. If the twelve represent clergy, the seventy represent you, the lay ministers of the church. We are all called to do God's work in the world.

Who are the ministers of the Church?

And this is a foundational belief in our Church. Take a moment and open to page 855 in the Book of Common Prayer in front of you. You may not know, but in the back of the prayer book is a catechism of what we believe in the Episcopal Church. It's a great resource. Take a moment to open to page 855. What does it say?

"Who are the ministers of the Church? The ministers of the Church are lay persons, bishops, priests, and deacons."

Lay persons! That's you! You are the ministers of this church. And God is calling you to carry on the mission and ministry of Good Shepherd in this community. The ministry of the church is not just for clergy, it's for you. Did you know you were a minister?

I think here at Good Shepherd we do know it. Because day after day, week after week, the people of Good Shepherd minister in a thousand different ways. From volunteering at Pennies Thrift Shop to serving as a lay reader, from leading morning prayer to financially supporting our food pantry, our people minister every day.

And so at the beginning of a time of transition here at Good Shepherd, this is simply a reminder for us. We are currently without a rector. And yet our pews are full of ministers. The mission and ministry of Good Shepherd goes on! This community is still full of ministers ready to continue the work of God in this place. This interim period is not a time to slow down or pause in our work. The harvest is plentiful. The needs of the community are great. The time for work is now. We have a place for you.

So keep on ministering! And if you're not involved in any ministries at Good Shepherd yet, I invite you, join in our mission. Explore this edition of *Tidings* and ask God where God wants you to serve. Call the office. Fill out our form for volunteering.

You are the ministers of this church. You are the ones being sent out into Tequesta, Jupiter, and beyond. You are being empowered to do God's work. So let us rejoice at all God is doing through you in this community. Amen.

Join us for a fascinating discussion about these often forgotten texts as we hear the story of Hanukkah.

Close Encounters of the Church Kind

Over the summer I had many encounters with our youth, children, and families ranging from casual to formal. Whether it was the youth mission experience, or the GS Kids Vacation Bible School, or Summer Sunday Café Breakfast, these encounters were all moments where relationships were made and where relationships grow. Encounters matter! Special encounters!

Important connections happen here through ministry participation that lead to real faith formation in a variety of ways.

Youth and children need to encounter voices from all generations. Of course, that includes Mom and Dad, but it also includes the whole faith family sharing faith stories with each other, worshiping and serving God together, sharing meals and playing together.

Youth, children, and parents need encounters with peers of faith. That means we need to create opportunities for children to be with children, for youth to be with youth and for parents to be with parents. Why? Because these are the relational

connecting points that will be present with us in our daily faith walk.

Youth, children, and families in general need to encounter places where they can use their gifts and abilities to serve the whole faith community. We must never miss the opportunity to create an encounter where youth and children connect with God's Love Story to them. Honestly, we all need to recognize and own that we are in this story and we are finding our place in it.

Finally, and perhaps most importantly, youth, children and parents need encounters with God. These often happen in surprising ways and places. These encounters require sacred space—places where the pace and volume are slow and soft; where the spirit of the child in all of us meets the Spirit of God.

While all these encounters offer special opportunities and moments of faith formation, we must not ignore the fact that what happens in our homes influences our youth and children perhaps more than anything else. Still, the local church has the unique potential to influence the family more than any other organization. In our community, that church is Good Shepherd. We stand in a unique

position to speak into and care for families; to equip, to encourage and to partner with them.

An impactful youth, children, and family ministry both fuels and strengthens the entire church body. It also yields a brighter future for every area of a church's ministry. A family formation program grows a church from the outside, bringing in new families who may not have attended church by providing opportunities and events that are family integrated. When we partner together with families we are building a stronger faith community that makes a difference for years to come.

Throughout the coming year our volunteers and design teams are planning events and encounters that range from bringing back the Coffee House Open Mic Night to extended fellowship opportunities for parents, youth and children. GS Kids Sunday School offers encounters for children to hear and see God's love for them in the great stories of the Bible. Wednesday Night Youth Group and other activities for our youth provide both place and space to not only connect with each other but with God. Plans like the Family Game Nights and pumpkin carving as a family in October, to celebrating the birth of Christ through the Children's Christmas Pageant are all opportunities to encounter God through our encounters with one another.

Our church has both the influence and the tools necessary to help parents, youth and children become strong faith-filled families that make a difference in our communities. It is my conviction that ministry in general, and particularly ministry to youth, children, and families must have as its focus relationship-building, because ministry is person-to-person and happens in proximity. As such my prayer is for God's direction in continuing to create opportunities throughout the year that are family and parish integrated. May God use all of us to equip and encourage our youth, children, and parents as we partner with them to build a faith community of strong families.

And, in August, a group of 27 friends gathered for a walk among the wiregrass and wading birds of Pine Glades Natural Area, a wetland in Jupiter,


Church on the Green is back in November

Church on the Green is an outdoor service with a focus on light and God's creation, which started during the pandemic as a way to gather out in the open air. It's a casual, family-friendly, unique worship experience with varying themes. The service is held on the field behind the Parish hall on the second and fourth Sunday of each month at 5PM from November through April. In 2022 we concluded the season with a combined School/Church beach cleanup at Carlin Park with over 70 people in attendance!

"The difference between an ordeal and an adventure is the way you handle it."

These words of wisdom are from a man called Peter, who comes to our Food Pantry on his bicycle. To be a Christian is to be open to new adventures. Our Lord didn't sit in the synagogue waiting for people to come to him. He went out among the people, and certainly experienced his full share of ordeals and adventures.

As lay people, we are already in the world, and we are called – every day – to witness there. In the immortal words of St. Francis of Assisi, "Preach the Gospel always. If necessary, use words." We preach the Gospel by witnessing to God's love for all of us. We witness by listening, by caring, by showing respect. "You are always so friendly, and you are not judgmental" said an older woman who comes regularly to our Pantry. We witness not just by what we give, but by what we DO.

Our Outreach ministries are one vehicle by which we - ALL of us - come together to

witness to God's love for his people. When we bring a can of tuna for the Food Pantry, or make a sandwich for St. George's Center, or donate a book or a box of crayons for the Warfield School, or pack a meal for Haiti – we are witnessing as Christian lay people. When we design a poster, or craft a message, or place a phone call to a friend, we are sharing our gifts and serving as ministers of our church.

We, as a community, have been through a collective ordeal with the COVID pandemic. All of us here at Good Shepherd and in the community around us have struggled in a variety of ways. But by reaching out, by sharing our gifts, by growing our collective ministry, we as a community have turned our ordeal into a new adventure. We have discovered new opportunities for service, made new friends in the community, and involved others in numerous ministries. In the way we have handled this ordeal, we all have grown. Praise be to God.

Successful Transition of St. George's Center

Many of us support Good Shepherd's Outreach program of the St. George's Center where we feed the hungry and food insecure. Good Shepherd has supported this program from its inception in Riviera Beach for forty years. We have helped prepare hot meals, sandwiches, and Manna Bags even throughout Covid. We have collected toiletries, towels, books and clothing to help our neighbors.

Now, CHANGE HAS COME....the St. George's Episcopal Church and Center will no longer house the St. George's Center ministry. There are plans to demolish the current buildings in September and build a new facility which will support many community groups and include the St. George's Center ministry and its partners. A Chapel will also be included.

On August I, St. George's Center started using three new locations to continue its mission. The distribution of food and donor drop off is at Victory City Church on 20th Street. It is just a couple of blocks from its previous place.

The St. George's Center clients are quickly finding its new home! Lunch hour is 11:30-12:30 and donor drop off is 10:00-1:00 Monday - Friday. The Support Partners of CROS ministries, Modine Mental Health, and The Lord's Place are also on site.

Last week, the first hot meals were served from Victory City Church. Meals were prepared either at a donating church or organization's kitchen or at the First Presbyterian Church in PBG.

First Presbyterian has graciously opened their doors to St. George's for this task.

And lastly, but not least, our Administrative Offices are now located in the Integrated Healthcare Systems building on 20th Street, only a block away from the previous location and just east of Victory City Church. This is where clients receive their mail, signup for IDs, SSI and Medicaid, find living locations and other helpful programs.

So, St. George's Center is on the move to continue its mission to provide a pathway to self-sufficiency for individuals and families while meeting their basic human needs.


assistance with minor tasks like a ride to a doctor appointment, or a meal after surgery. Sadly, Alison departed this life, but the spirit of support and love that surrounded her lives on at Good Shepherd.

Prior to the pandemic, we were receiving very few requests — a good sign! However, in the past two years, requests have increased and are currently beyond the capacity of our staff to coordinate. The Daughters of the King have offered to facilitate the assignments and we are pleased to relaunch this ministry of love and support as *Helping Hands*.

Helping Hands works by compiling a list of parishioners willing to provide assistance as in a ride, a small repair, a companion visit, or a meal after surgery or new baby. Once we have an active list of providers, we can begin assigning them to requests that come in to the office.

Helping Hands is a meaningful, ministry that connects people and respects time. There are no meetings. There are no events. It's just people helping people on their own schedule. When a request comes in, an email goes out to the list and the DOK will pair the respondent with the request.



As Good Shepherd navigates toward calling the next rector of this parish, we have been providing updates of our progress on our website. The Rector Search page lets us know, in general terms, the status of the Search Committee efforts including processes, timelines, and even focused prayer. Currently, work is being done to complete profiles for the diocese and a parish profile based on who we are now, in this moment, as a church.

In June, Good Shepherd participated in a parish survey, the results of which will inform the Rector position description and ultimately our profile. We had excellent participation in this survey which improves the reliability of the results.

The Vestry and the Search Committee have had the survey results interpreted by professionals at Holy Cow! Consulting and we are now prepared to present them to you! Join us on Sunday, September 18, when a written summary of the results will be available in the Narthex, and a special Sunday Forum will take place in the Parish Hall at 9:00 AM, between services to review outcomes and answer any questions you may have. The forum will be moderated by our Senior Warden, Heather Graham, and Ian Anderson, Vestry Liaison to the Search Committee. The summary results will also be posted on the Rector Search page of our website under the ABOUT tab.
