## Before the Foundation of the World

Eternity is one of our great mysteries when we think of God. It symbolizes the concept of infinity in relation to time. We find it difficult to understand eternity because we lack precedent. Additionally, His love cannot be increased by our efforts or good deeds; it's already at its fullest. But if God chooses who is saved, doesn't that undermine our free will to choose and believe in Christ? The Bible affirms that we have a choice: all who believe in Jesus Christ will be saved. Jesus said, John 3:15: "that everyone who believes may have eternal life in Him." and Romans 10:9: "If you declare with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised Him from the dead, you will be saved." The Bible does not describe God as rejecting anyone who believes in Him or turning away anyone seeking Him. **Deuteronomy 4:29:** "But if from there you seek the LORD your God, you will find Him if you seek Him with all your heart and with all your soul." The truths of God's sovereign predestination and man's responsibility are not mutually exclusive. Somehow, in the mystery of God, predestination works hand-in-hand with a person being drawn by God and believing in salvation. Jesus said in John 6:44, "No one can come to Me unless the Father who sent Me draws them, and I will raise them up at the last day."
