Across the world we will find churches empty Easter morning, just as Mary Magdalene found the tomb of Jesus. We will make it through this episode and celebrate our reunion at the right time.

We have all had to face the reality that we will not be able to be in our respective churches for Holy Week this year. It is important to focus on the fact that the Church is not, in the end a building, but the faithful who gather to worship God. This feels like an exodus time to me, and as it was for the people of Israel as they made their way to the promised land, we are in exile, on the way to a new place where God calls us. So we travel in hope and with God's grace.

I suggest that we find a place in our homes where we want to be for our on-line worship services. It can be in the hub of our house; the kitchen table for instance, or it can be a place where we find ourselves for quieter purposes, a study, or den. Wherever, I think we should "dress it up" for the occasion. Candles, a special table cloth, flowers, a simple cross are all things that might help.

On Maundy Thursday there was the suggestion that we wash each other's hands rather than feet. Given the present circumstances this seems appropriate. Also we will share, an Agape meal, each in our own house. Based on the Seder shared by Jewish families, commemorating the Exodus seems like a meaningful endeavor. Basic foods, bread, olives, cheese, fruit, maybe a glass of juice or wine, will be what we need.

Jesus said to Thomas, 'Have you believed because you have seen me?
Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe.'
(John 20:29, NRSV)

Dear Friends in Christ,

As we draw closer to the celebrations of the Easter season and I have contemplated the decisions that we must make, the story of the encounter between Thomas and our risen Lord Jesus has found its way into my heart. Normally shared publicly on the 2nd Sunday of Easter, this passage from John's gospel portrays the challenge faced by Thomas in accepting the word of the other disciples, when they tell him "We have seen the Lord." Thomas needed to see Jesus for himself and to touch his wounds. Too often, we are critical of Thomas, labeling him as doubting. In reality, most of us need to see for ourselves before we can "believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God." (verse 31)

Sadly, our celebrations of Holy Week and Easter Day will not include seeing one another in the usual ways, nor embracing one another in person. With this letter, I am directing that the suspension of public worship continue in every congregation of the Episcopal Diocese of East Carolina through the end of April 2020. There are to be no exceptions. The creativity and collaboration that I am witnessing across our Diocese will need to be taken even further, as we find new ways to worship during Holy Week and the early part of the Easter season. I will collaborate with our clergy and churchwardens to find ways of addressing the challenges ahead, and I will be available to support the leaders of each congregation in making necessary decisions.

Please note that this direction applies only to public worship. Leaders of the congregations of our Diocese are charged with making responsible decisions for all other dimensions of life and ministry in their own communities. In all cases, we are to comply with the requirements of local, civic and federal authorities in order to help slow the spread of infection. Diocesan House staff will work with ministry leaders to modify, reschedule, or cancel all Diocesan events planned to take place during the month of April.

This Holy Week and Easter season, we might look to Thomas for our inspiration, particularly as we can neither see nor embrace one another in person. May God's Holy Spirit lead us to seek not our own needs, but the needs of those who suffer most deeply as a result of the pandemic brought by COVID-19. May our Easter proclamation of God's love be expressed in our love for one another and for all of our neighbors.
