

This year, the Florida State Poets Association (FSPA) held its annual fall convention at Bok Tower Gardens in Lake Wales, FL on October 25-27. Mary's poem, "An Aged World Speaks", was announced as a winner in the FSPA 2025 Contests. In Category #1 : Free Verse, it earned the 1st Place Award, \$100.00 and publication in Cadence anthology. Congratulations, Mary! Brava!

On Friday, November 7th, five SIS members went to hear wonderful Jazz music by Doug Carn at the Lincolnville Elks Lodge on Washington Street in Saint Augustine, which served as the kickoff for the Lincolnville Festival. The music was fabulous and all of us enjoyed it tremendously. The Elks Lodge had recently re-opened after a million-dollar renovation project was completed. It was built over 70 years ago, and was a meeting place for Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. The Lodge also served as a training center for the Southern Christian Leadership Conference during the Civil Rights Movement.

Prior to going to the concert, we went into Best Richardson African Diaspora Literature & Culture Museum. It is located at 83 Washington Street. For the Lincolnville neighborhood, it is a cultural center with a wonderful vibe! We were so happy to find this gem of a bookstore: full of new books, as well as first editions, signed, used and rare books, beautiful artwork and jewelry. We were all pleased to have met and talked with co-owner Gigi Best Richardson. We had an ongoing conversation with Gigi, Friday night and into Saturday. Gigi knows so much about world history, as well as her own history as she has spent years of research learning about her ancestors.

On Saturday, we set up a SIS table for the all-day festival in front of the Lincolnville Museum. There were plenty of vendors and food trucks. However, the turnout was less than expected. We stayed the whole day, though we decided not to come back the next day, as they were expecting even less people. The highlights were the music and meeting Gigi Best Richardson. Who knows? ABOUT SIS: FOUNDERS' STORY


