NEW MEMBERS' BIOS

William C. (Bill) Chandler, Ph.D.

Chandler was born in Danville, VA and grew up in Caswell County, NC.

Chandler holds a B.A., Political Science, Master of Public Administration and Ph.D. from NC State University. Chandler's doctoral dissertation examined the sale of alcohol to underage persons in NC, its causes and prevention. Chandler has taught public policy analysis in NCSU's MPA Program and public budgeting at Duke University's Sanford School of Public Policy MPP Program.

Chandler retired from the NC Alcohol Law Enforcement Division after over 30 years of service. He held the positions of Special Agent, Assistant Special Agent in Charge, Acting Special Agent in Charge, Training Coordinator, Assistant Director, Deputy Director and retired as Director.

Gunn was in the infantry during several battles and skirmishes across Virginia and was transferred to the artillery under Captain Price and Col. Lamb at the Battle of Yorktown. Gunn's tombstone bears the following inscription: "Sacred to the memory of Starling Gunn a soldier in the war of Independence who fired the first cannon at York and was an eyewitness to the surrender of Cornwallis."

Kenneth (Ken) James Donald Van Valen

Compatriot Van Valen was born and raised in Bergen County, New Jersey, the "Crossroads of the American Revolution." In 1990, Ken earned the prestigious rank of Eagle with 5 Silver Palms. The Veteran Smiles Foundation

The Veteran Smiles Foundation (VSF) is a non-profit organization headquartered in Wake Forest, NC, and provides educational and financial support to at-risk veterans to improve their dental and oral healthcare. Most of these veterans do not qualify for free care at VA hospitals and clinics and cannot afford dental care on their own. VSF founder Ret. Colonel David E. McCracken became aware of the gap in veterans' services through his work with the Veterans Affairs Council and created a solution with VSF.

VSF's year-round Vet Smiles initiative is in partnership with the East Carolina University (ECU) School of Dental Medicine, NC Serves, and Veteran Service Officers throughout the state. ECU's School of Dental Medicine has eight satellite dental clinics located around the state in rural and under-served areas including Brunswick, Robeson, and Davidson Counties, and also in the communities of Elizabeth City, Ahoskie, Lillington, Spruce Pine, and Sylva.

After a veteran is determined eligible for services, the program begins with an oral exam and X-rays to outline a dental plan specific to their oral health needs. Dental plans include routine checkups, annual cleanings, and minor and major dental work. VSF provides financial support when the veteran enrolls in the program. The level of assistance is subject to funds available under VSF financial policies and agreements.

For the current fiscal year, the VSF has spent about \$10,700 for 21 veterans. The VSF's funding and day-to-day operations are dependent on grants, donations, individual dentists volunteering their services, and the ECU School of Dental Medicine.

How can you help? The VSF needs partners for funding and donations to expand the "Vet Smiles" program to help more veterans with gaps in their oral healthcare throughout North Carolina.






June & July in Revolutionary War History

June 28, 1778 - Battle of Monmouth, NJ

July 4, 1776—Continental Congress adopted the Declaration of Independence.

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Patriot Robert Brevard was born on July 17, 1763, northeast of Charlotte in Rowan County, NC. A few months after his 16th birthday in 1779, his services in the American Revolution began. He served a total of 6 tours in the militia with 4 times as a volunteer and 2 times as a draftee.

Up until this point, the war had been raging on for about 4 years with neither side having a decisive advantage. Major battles had taken place up north in and around New York, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania. The British suffered a major embarrassing defeat with the surrender of Burgoyne's army at Saratoga on October 17, 1777. With Friedrich Wilhelm von Steuben's arrival at Valley Forge in February 1778, Washington's army began its transformation into a well-disciplined fighting force, learning to make effective use of the bayonet. The Continental Army became a serious force to be reckoned with. With the war settling into a stalemate, the British shifted their attention to the southern colonies, particularly North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgie, and Florida. They believed that major military operations there would bring a swift end to the war; they were also banking on large numbers of loyalists and Tories to come out in support (which never happened). The action in the south heated up with British forces capturing Savannah, GA, in December 1778; the British also had troops on the ground near Charleston, SC.

In the fall of 1779, a call for volunteers was made in North Carolina for the defense of the state against a feared British invasion. Robert answered the call and volunteered as a private in a company of the Rowan County Militia Regiment under Captain John Dickey. The volunteers marched out without any organization to a place called Phifer's and then proceeded on to Charlotte where the invasion of the state was expected. After arriving they learned that the British had no immediate plans for an invasion, and they were discharged to return home after 1 week in the field. Brigade General Griffith Rutherford of the Salisbury District Brigade of Militia was in command of this expedition.

In June 1780 news came that the Tories (loyalists) were gathering under Lt. Colonel John Moore at a place called Ramsour's Mill in Lincoln County to join up with the British. The loyalist camp would eventually grow to about 1,300 strong. Another call for volunteers was made to disperse the enemy, and Robert rejoined Captain John Dickey's Company of the Rowan County Militia. They joined up with other militia units that answered the call near Cowans Ford on the Catawba River, numbering about 300 to 400 men all under the command of Lt. Colonel Francis Locke. On the evening of June 19, patriot militia forces began their march of about 15 miles towards Ramsour's Mill. On the morning of June 20, Locke ordered an attack on the Tories that numbered about 3 times the size of his army. The courageous actions of Captain Dickey that day led to the Tories' defeat, with many killed, captured and dispersed. Robert was in the field for 1 week on this tour. Detachments of the following militia regiments were present in this Ramsour's Mill action: Rowan, Surry, Mecklenburg, Burke, Lincoln, Rutherford, Orange, and Edgecombe. Also present were several South Carolina militia regiments including the 2nd Spartan, New Acquisition District, Turkey Creek, Little River, and Upper Craven.

Later that summer in 1780, Robert volunteered again when a call was made by Colonel William Richardson Davie. Robert was still a private in Captain John Dickey's Company. The militia was ordered to intercept and stop the British foraging parties who were now advancing in the state. The patriots marched from about 8 miles north of Charlotte under Colonel Davie to the swamp of Sugar Creek which was south of the town. British troops had possession of Charlotte. Colonel Davie described Charlotte as a town of about "twenty houses, built on two streets, which cross each other at right angles, at the intersection of which stands the court-house" (Norris & Barefoot, 2006). The volunteers under Davie remained for about 3 days when it was determined that Cornwallis's men had abandoned the town. Robert was dismissed after another tour of 1 week.

Afterwards in the fall of 1780, Robert was drafted and mustered into the company of Captain David Ramsay of the Rowan County Regiment of Militia. They mobilized in a place called New Providence south of Charlotte near the South Carolina state line. The troops formed their camp at Six Mile Creek where Robert remained in service until the expiration of the 3 months tour. At the beginning of the tour, General William Lee Davidson held the immediate command. A short time later, General William Smallwood took command of the troops; they were joined by General Daniel Morgan. Robert was discharged by Captain Ramsay.

In early 1781, a call for volunteers was made, and Robert, still a resident of Rowan County, entered as a private in the militia company of Captain John Dickey. Robert noted that he was under the command of Lieutenant Robert Ramsey. All the militia units in this action were under the overall command of General William Lee Davidson, and they organized at Beattie's Ford on the Catawba River. Their objective was to hinder the British advancing into the state under British General Cornwallis. They marched to Cowan's Ford on the Catawba River to oppose the British crossing. Robert noted that he saw General Nathaniel Greene on this tour. An engagement took place at Cowan's Ford on February 1, 1781. The British succeeded in crossing the river and dispersed the militia volunteers after killing General William Lee Davidson who bravely attempted to hold the line against the overwhelming British numbers. The death of General Davidson caused panic among the patriots. Detachments of the following militia regiments were present in this Cowan's Ford action: Surry, Johnston, Montgomery, Rowan, Mecklenburg, Lincoln, Burke, Orange, Caswell, and Wake.

That same day, an attempt was made to reorganize the dispersed militia at Tarrant's Tavern about 8 or 10 miles from the Cowan's Ford action. Cornwallis had dispatched Lt. Col. Banastre Tarleton and his cavalry legion to find the fleeing militia. Tarleton captured several prisoners and learned of the planned rendezvous at Tarrant's Tavern later that afternoon around 2 p.m. and scattered the patriot militia again. Detachments of the following militia regiments were present in this Tarrant's Tavern action: Surry, Rowan, Mecklenburg, Lincoln, Burke, Randolph, Orange, Caswell, and Wake. Robert noted in his solder's pension file that after the militia was dispersed again, he returned home but had to leave and hide during the approach of the British army. This early 1781 tour for Robert lasted 6 days.

Robert's last tour was in late summer and fall in 1781 when he was drafted for 3 months. This time he was mustered into a company of cavalry under Captain George Cathy near Fayetteville. The militia detachments gathered for this expedition were under the command of General Griffith Rutherford. They marched to a place near Wilmington. It was here that news of Cornwallis' defeat at Yorktown was communicated. After a few days, the patriots marched back west to Salisbury where Robert was discharged. Robert was about 18 years old at the conclusion of his last tour.

After the war, Robert at the age of 31 married Nancy Hackett in 1794. Robert moved his family in the fall of 1827 to the County of Cape Girardeau, Missouri, where he lived out the rest of his life. At the age of 69 on December 22, 1832, Robert applied for a Revolutionary War soldier's pension by appearing before the justices of the court in the County of Cape Girardeau by making a sworn statement of his services, most of which was used as the source for this article. This was in response to the Act of Congress on June 7, 1832. This Act provided every surviving officer and soldier who served at least 2 years in the Continental Army with a pension of full pay for life, and those who served for a period less than 2 years but more than 6 months were granted partial pay based on the period that they served.

Robert died in January 1847 at the age of 84. Nancy lived until October 1853. They are both buried at Jackson Cemetery in Cape Girardeau. Robert is listed as Patriot # P-120567 in the SAR Patriot Research System. This database does not currently show any SAR members that have joined on Robert's record.

Honoring their Patriot Ancestors at the 241st Anniversary of the Battle of Ramsour's Mill



Pictured are Color Guard Members Bob Sigmon (Right), Raleigh Chapter NC SAR and Gordon Woodard (Left), Button Gwinnett Chapter GA SAR. Bob's patriot ancestor is Nathaniel Vannoy (1749-1835) who was a soldier in the Wilkes County NC Regiment of Militia under Colonel Benjamin Cleveland and who fought at the Battle of Kings Mountain. Gordon's patriot ancestor, Thomas Maxwell, Jr (1742-1837), was imprisoned by the British for preaching the Baptist denomination. He was also a soldier in the VA Culpeper County Militia.

The 241st Anniversary of the Battle of Ramsour's Mill was sponsored by the Catawba Valley Chapter of the NC Sons of the American Revolution on Saturday, June 5th, at 10 am in Lincolnton, NC. This was a National Color Guard event commemorating the battle on June 20, 1780.



Road Trip- Colonial Williamsburg - Submitted by David Bamford

Colonial Williamsburg, Virginia, is an interesting place to visit. We were there in the summer of 2019. Looking back, the middle of summer with the excessive August heat wasn't probably the best time to go. Keeping hydrated and searching for bottled water was unfortunately more of a focus at times than the historic sights and scenes. For overnight accommodations, we decided on the Williamsburg Lodge Autograph Collection which was right next to the historic area within walking distance. While I would recommend the lodge we stayed at, there are other hotels around the area too. If you do visit, I recommend staying within walking distance. At our lodge, we were able to purchase day passes to access the exhibits. We walked out of our hotel room, down the sidewalk about 300 feet, and crossed the street to the historic area.

If you haven't been before, it is about 300-acres centered around E Duke Gloucester Street (no vehicle traffic) about 1/2 mile-long from one end to the other. The road is lined on both sides with exhibits, gardens, taverns, old buildings, shops, and things to see. There are some original structures still standing after all these years, surviving both the Revolutionary and Civil War, like the



Public Magazine built around 1715 and the old Court House built in 1770. This <u>website</u> indicates that there are about 500 original and reconstructed structures at Williamsburg, along with a list of the few original structures still standing.

There is no main gate or entry like you might find at other entertainment, amusement or historic parks. You can wander in and out at your leisure, accessing the historic area from any direction. Once you get to E Duke Gloucester Street, you are now emersed in a living history time machine environment. There is a daily schedule of events where the militia performs drill and artillery fire at the Public Magazine. The fifers and drummers come down the street about once a day in the afternoon. There are persons in period clothing wandering around in character going about their business that you can stop and ask questions. It's a bustle of activity that you can simply observe at a distance or interact with. I tried my best to get a Continental officer out of character by asking questions about the area; he maintained not only a straight face but also his aristocratic accent.

The Court House holds session several times a day, and you can go in and watch actors in period dress conduct town business and legal proceedings just like in the 1770s. If you sit too close to the front in the courtroom, you might get conscripted to participate in the skit. If you are an introvert like me and would rather be left alone, the back row is



where you want to sit and watch. There are several historic homes you can enter and look around too. Some exhibits like the book maker and gunsmiths are off the beaten path. Make sure you get a map of where things are otherwise you may miss some hidden gems. The flag that we saw posted everywhere was the Grand Union Flag which was adopted in June 1775.

Williamsburg was the capital of Virginia from 1699 to 1780; it was the center of government, education, and culture in the state. The prestigious college of William and Mary is there. In July 1781 the Continental Army led by General George Washington and French General Rochambeau, occupied Williamsburg. The army was following British General Cornwallis and his troops on their way toward Yorktown. Williamsburg is definitely a place to visit. The Yorktown battlefield is about 10 miles away, and that visit will be featured in the October issue in time for the 240th Anniversary of Cornwallis' defeat.

build the Color Guard of the NC Society by encouraging Compatriots to acquire and wear a Revolutionary War outfit at events. The form is now available to obtain a \$100 reimbursement from the State. Reach out to the Raleigh Chapter leadership. To do so, (1) a Compatriot acquires a complete Revolutionary War era uniform or outfit for the first time; (2) participates in a Color Guard function or other SAR related activity (i.e.,

giving an award, giving a presentation, manning a recruiting table, etc.) wearing the RW era outfit, (3) has the form verified with a signature from your Chapter President, Vice President, or Chapter Color Guard Commander; and (4) sends form to our State Treasurer Sam Powell for reimbursement. Reimbursements are retroactive to September 1, 2019.
