Jackson Bloom Wins National Oration Contest

The North Carolina Society of the Sons of the American Revolution is very proud to announce that Jackson Bloom took First Place Prize as the 2011 National Winner in a Historical Oration Contest. The title of his sixminute, memorized oration was "Bold Choices" and Jackson took to the stage like the accomplished actor he is known to be in Raleigh. The whole auditorium concentrated on his deep, commanding voice after a pause, "*A law repugnant to the Constitution is void.*"

The winning contestant competed successfully against 16 other State finalists and was submitted through the Raleigh Chapter. The final rounds of this oration contest occurred during the 2011 National Congress conducted by the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution in Winston-Salem. While hosting this year's National Congress, special attention shined on the celebration of our 100 Year Anniversary since the founding of the North Carolina Society.

For forty-four years the National Oration Contest, sponsored by the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, carried the name Douglass G. High. In 1993 the name of this oratorical contest was changed, in perpetuity to the JOSEPH S. RUMBAUGH HISTORI-CAL ORATION CONTEST. Including this year, twentyone State Societies have won the National Contest. Virginia has fielded 8 national winners, Ohio had 7, Florida with 6; Georgia and Texas with 5 each; Maryland with 4; Tennessee, California and now North Carolina each had 3 wins. Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Delaware and Arkansas have each had 2 national winners.

North Carolina previously held 1st Place National honors when it was won by Brian Nicholson, back in 1986. Then in 1991, North Carolina again brought home victory through John C. O'Quinn as our National First Place Oration Winner. Now in 2011, The North Carolina Society also brought home the award plaque for bringing forward a national award winning contestant. Thank you, Jackson Bloom!

May 28, 2011 – Memorial Day Weekend

The Raleigh Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution placed a recruiting booth at the NC State Historic Site, Bennett Place, in Durham. The event was a Memorial Day Remembrance of the "United States Military Through the Ages". The weather was perfect all day.

As representatives of the first US Military, the Raleigh Chapter of the SAR placed an information booth with an extensive display of Revolutionary Military arms and equipment. Joe Griffin and Dan Hopping used the booth to educate the visitors about the life of a member of George Washington's army.

The display covered the firelocks and accouterments of both the Continental line soldier and the militia soldier. We handed out information brochures on the SAR and inquired if the visitors had an ancestor who served in the Revolution. We had interest from several people who said they would investigate their ancestors. We received the contact information on four people who said they knew they had Revolutionary War ancestors and expressed an interest in joining our Chapter.

The other displays at the event covered the Civil War, the Spanish American War, WW I, WW II, and the Vietnam War.

May 28, 2011 – Memorial Day Weekend

Firing demonstrations were held on the hour to demonstrate the dramatic difference between the arms of the Revolution, the Civil War and the Spanish American War. Dan Hopping of the Raleigh Chapter SAR was dressed in the uniform of the first two years of the Revolution and demonstrated the Brown Bess. At the last firing of the day all three of the demonstrators fired volleys to show the rate of fire between Firelock, Percussion cap musket and the Krag890s.





We had quite a crowd of very interested visitors and the Bennett Place Historic Site did a great job of organizing an educational Memorial Day outing for the families.
