



# While America was fighting its war for independence from Britain, a Raynham slave took up arms, not only aid the revolution,

Tobias "Toby" Gilmore, a local Revolutionary War hero whose bloodline was once believed to be extinct, actually has more than 100 living descendants, recent research shows.

"Toby Gilmore is my 6th great-grandfather," said Chaz Moore, a 28-year-old Sturbridge native who is now a firefighter in Raleigh, N.C.

Old church records and census documents support that claim.

Gilmore, an African-born slave who won his freedom by fighting in the American Revolution, will be the subject of a presentation at 7 this evening at the Old Colony Historical Society in Taunton. The event is being held in conjunction with Liberty and Union Weekend, an annual celebration of Taunton's role in America's war for independence.

"Toby is an amazing figure," said Andrew Boisvert, an archivist with the Old Colony Historical Society. "It's a strong story. It's a success story. Here's a gentleman who went from being a slave to a free man and may have been connected to George Washington."

Genealogical discovery

Until about two years ago, it was assumed that Gilmore, father to eight children, had no living descendants. An item in the Oct. 24, 1921, edition of the Taunton Daily Gazette stated that Caroline J. Gilmore, the last member of the family's line, had passed away that morning.

New genealogical research, however, revealed a previously unknown bloodline, Boisvert said. "Nobody knew," he said. "Everyone assumed the family had died off."

Moore is a descendant of Gilmore's daughter Delia, who married a man named Thomas Davis. "The line that Chaz follows, they had moved away and people lost track of them," Boisvert said. "It's this one Davis family that had descendants."

That was discovered when Moore's cousin, Milah Pasto, visited to Old Colony Historical Society to research information about her 3rd greatgrandmother, a woman named Elmira Sullivan. Records showed that Sullivan's father was a man named Toby Gilmore Davis, a grandson of Toby Gilmore and a member of the branch of the family that had previously been lost to history.

She had never previously heard of her locally famous forebear.

"It was one of those moments," Boisvert said. "I was looking at microfilm and staring at a descendant of a man I'd been researching for the past seven years." Moore said Pasto is the "big family genealogist" and got him interested in tracing his roots.

"We've been doing a lot of family research," he said. It has been exciting, Moore said, to learn about his family's history.

"To find out you're a descendant of a person who fought for the freedom of his nation and was granted his own freedom for his service, it made me feel so honored and humbled," he said.

The Gilmore legend

Born in coastal West Africa as Shibodee Turry Wurry, Gilmore was about 16 years old when he was captured by slave traders in 1757.

Shackled below deck with dozens of other African men, Shibodee Turry Wurry was taken from his homeland across the Atlantic on a slave ship bound for Virginia. After the ship was battered in a storm, the slave traders changed their course for Rhode Island and auctioned off some of the captives to pay for repairs to the vessel. A Raynham man named Capt. John Gilmore attended the auction and purchased Shibodee Turry Wurry, giving him the name Toby Gilmore.

According to popular lore, Capt. Gilmore and his wife were an elderly couple and raised the young slave like the son they never had, teaching him to read and write. "The legend said that when the revolution broke out, Toby enlisted in his master's stead" Boisvert said. "What we've been able to figure out through research is that Capt. Gilmore had many children and Toby most

likely enlisted to gain his freedom."

Records indicate that there was as little as a 15-year age difference between Toby Gilmore and his master, disproving the story that Capt. Gilmore was an elderly

man.

War records indicate that Gilmore fought three separate tours of duty and participated in the Battle of Fort Ticonderoga and the Continental Army's bitter winter encampment at Valley Forge. After earning his freedom, Gilmore purchased land in North Raynham that had been confiscated from a British sympathizer.

According to legend, Gilmore served directly under Gen. George Washington, who gave him a cannon as a gift. Every year on Independence Day, the story goes, Gilmore brought his cannon to Taunton Green and fired 14 shots - one for each of the 13 original colonies and one for Gen. Washington.

Although Gilmore would have seen Washington at Valley Forge, his military records don't indicate that he ever served directly under him.

"In the African tradition, I think he was a great story teller," Boisvert said.

The Gilmore family was given a cannon, which now resides at the Old Colony Historical Society. "One theory is it belonged to the Bristol County regiment and that Toby was an artilleryman, but there's no proof of it," Boisvert said.

Gilmore died in 1812 at age 70 and is interred at the Hall and Dean Burial Ground in Raynham. The Sons of the American Revolution placed a marker on his grave in the 1920s, but it was stolen years ago, Moore said.



"The Sons of the American Revolution will be putting marker on his grave site early next summer," Moore said. "There are only about 30 African-Americans in the group, so when myself and my family members join, we'll bolster the numbers quite a bit."

Discovering his lineage has been a source of inspiration and pride for Moore.

"America was founded by people of all backgrounds and faiths," he said. "We are effectively a nation of immigrants, and everyone was trying to carve out their freedom. To go from slave to American hero is something to be proud of. I think it's great."



#### Compatriots,

The Raleigh Chapter cordially invites you to attend the 2011 annual convention of The North Carolina Society, SAR in the Capitol City. The convention hotel is the Clarion Capitol, located at 320 Hillsborough Street, Raleigh, NC. Registration check-in will be from 2 PM to 6 PM Friday or between 8:00 AM and 11:30 AM Saturday. The SAR table will be off the main lobby. Your convention registration packet will be provided to you at the check-in table. It will contain tickets for the events for which you have registered, the itinerary, and information and maps on the points of interest in Raleigh, as well as shopping and dining.

A hospitality room will be available Friday thru Sunday in Suite 1801 for relaxation and informal gatherings.

The President's Reception on Friday evening will be held at the home of Glenn Sappie (6 blocks East of the hotel at 117 N. Bloodworth St.), beginning at 6:30 PM. It will include heavy hors d'oeuvres, and beverages.

A breakfast is planned for Saturday morning in the Four Sisters - Clambake room on the main floor of the Clarion between 8:00 and 9:30 AM.

Officer training sessions for presidents, secretaries, and registrars will be held on Saturday morning between 10 and 11:00 AM in the Clambake room after the hotel has refreshed the room set-up. The hospitality suite 1801 may also be used if additional space is needed.

For those not attending the training sessions the morning is open time for you and yours to visit the sites of our city, however, we suggest that you be back in the hotel not later than 11:45 AM.

The Ladies Auxiliary will be hosting a Victorian tea and luncheon at the Sappie home (address above) beginning at 10AM and lasting until about 2 PM. Refreshments will be followed by a garden walk of historic Oakwood (weather permitting). All ladies not attending the Youth Awards Luncheon are invited to join the SAR Ladies Auxiliary for this unique event.

The SAR Youth Award luncheon will begin at 12:00 noon on the top floor of the Clarion. The winners of the NCSSAR Youth Contests (Eagle Scout, Essay, Outstanding JROTC Cadet & Americanism Poster) will be recognized and presented with their awards.
