





2 Kings 5:14-17

Naaman is cleansed of his leprosy and chooses to serve the God of Israel.

Gospel Reading

Luke 17:11-19

Jesus heals 10 lepers, and one, the Samaritan, returns to give thanks.

Background on the Gospel Reading

Today we hear about how Jesus, continuing on his journey to Jerusalem, heals 10 lepers. This story is a lesson about faith and reminds us that faith is sometimes found in unlikely places. Ten people afflicted with leprosy cry out to Jesus. Struck with pity, Jesus heals all 10. However er, only one is described as glorifying God and returning to thank Jesus. The one who returns is a Samaritan, a foreigner. In the Jewish circles in which Jesus lived, Samaritans were looked down upon because of the differences between the two communities in their observance of Judaism. It is significant, therefore, that Jesus commends the Samaritan for his faith, which has been his salvation. Throughout Luke's Gospel, faith is found in surprising places.

Another lesson for us in this Gospel has to do with salvation. All 10 of the lepers were given the gift of healing, but in his gratitude to God for this gift, the Samaritan found salvation. Our salvation is found in recognizing the gifts we have been given and knowing to whom we must offer our thanks.

October invites us to slow down, breathe, and turn our hearts toward one of the Church's most

This devotion is more than a string of beads; it's a walk through the life of Christ with Mary as our guide. Every "Hail Mary" draws us deeper into the mysteries of Jesus' love, mercy, and sacrifice. The Rosary is simple, rhythmic, and powerful. It centers our minds, calms our hearts, and reminds us that even in a noisy world, prayer brings peace. Whether prayed in a church, carpool line, or living room, this centuries-old devotion still transforms hearts today.

Ideas to Celebrate the Rosary This Month: For Families and Children

- □ **Rosary Craft:** Make a paper-chain Rosary—one color for each decade. Pray a decade together each night until it's complete.
- □ **Mystery Coloring Book:** Print or draw pictures for each Mystery of the Rosary and let children color as you explain what's happening in each scene.
- □ **Family Rosary Night:** Choose one night each week to pray together as a household. Light candles and include intentions for your parish or world peace.
- □ **Rosary Walk:** Pray while walking your neighborhood—each step an offering for your neighbors.
- □ **Reflective Study:** Read Rosarium Virginis Mariae (St. John Paul II's apostolic letter) and journal about how the Rosary draws you into deeper discipleship.
