

HOLY WEEK TIMELINE

Palm Sunday: Jesus rode into Jerusalem on a donkey, and many people put palm branches down for the donkey to walk on as a show of respect for Jesus. Many people thought he was the Messiah, coming to rule Israel.

Religious Leaders Plot to Kill Jesus: Jesus was a threat to the religious leaders because he performed miracles and had lots of people believing in him. They wanted the people to keep believing them, so they plotted to have him

Last Supper: On Thursday night, Jesus sat down with his disciples to have Passover dinner. He broke bread and said it was a symbol of his body. Then, he blessed wine and said it was a symbol of his blood. He told the disciples he would be murdered and would rise on the third day, and his body and blood were a sacrifice for sins.

The Arrest: After supper, Jesus and the disciples went into the Garden of Gethsemane to pray. The disciples fell asleep! Jesus prayed, and the soldiers came to arrest him after he was betrayed by his disciple Judas.

The Trial: Starting that night, Jesus faced, Annas, Caiaphas, and Pontius Pilate. Pontius Pilate agreed to crucify Jesus between two rebels because the crowd demanded it.

The Crucifixion: Jesus was crucified Friday at noon. He lived on the cross for three hours, then said to the Father, "Into your hands I commit my spirit." And he died. There was an eclipse, an earthquake, and the very thick curtain inside the Temple was ripped in two.

The Resurrection: Some of Jesus' disciples, Mary Magdalene, and a few other believers saw the empty tomb on Sunday morning. Some saw angels who said, "He is not here; he is risen." Over the next 40 days, 500 people saw the arisen Jesus.

Lay Leanings By Deacon Mike

Holy Week. This is arguably the most sacred week in the Church calendar, and it's particularly holy because of what we will commemorate. But it's also 'holy' because God has touched you and me with that holiness. I don't know about you, but sometimes it scares me to even say the word ... 'holy', let alone consider myself as 'holy'. When I think about that, it's as if I've entered God's home without knocking.

So what does it mean to be 'holy' anyway? I've always had this image of 'holy' as being saintly somehow; those whose lives are marked with some extraordinary, perhaps even miraculous presence. But over the years, that image has undergone a transformation in me; the extraordinary has given way to the ordinary; and no miracles among the holy in my life ... no walking on water or raising the dead. In fact, it would be hard to actually *see* 'holy' in most people just by looking at them. But the truth is ... holy people don't *look* any different than you and me. So what makes them holy?

Perhaps they're *holy* because they can see the divine in everyone they meet ... and that means there's no place for judging others in their life.

Or maybe they're *holy* because they see everything in their life as a 'gift' ... and that helps them not to cling to what they have, and to share freely with others.

Could it be that they're *holy* because they're not 'me' centered; not apt to talk about themselves, and instead genuinely care about *you* as a person rather than what you *are* or what you *have*?

Or perhaps they're *holy* because they're not perfect. In fact it's likely they have some bad habits as we all do, but they'd be the first to acknowledge their own weakness in order to help you overcome your own.

I'm guessing they're *holy* because they know where their holiness comes from. They freely give their love because they know they are loved first, and loved ... *unconditionally*. And, in fact, it's *that* love of God for us ... that unconditional love that makes this week *holy*.

By my own definition, I'm at best a holiness work-inprogress. And yet, God makes clear in scripture that we are <u>all</u> 'holy', not because of anything we've done or haven't done, but simply because of 'Whose' image and likeness we were created in. Don't forget that the next time you judge yourself unworthy of holiness.
