OAK VIEW'S CHESS CHAMPS

It is 2 o'clock on a summer Saturday afternoon. Two teenage girls enter the Oak View Library with their mother. The girls grab tubes from the plastic storage box and proceed to place 12 chessboards on the six tables in the activity area of the library. Their mother sits on the sidelines absorbed in her tablet.

From 2:15 on, other children and teens drift into the area. As they enter, Aaron Herrera, Department Service Aide, calls out to each one to warm up with a puzzle, which is a snapshot of a chess game in progress. The puzzle is: if the correct move is made, checkmate can be achieved in one move. What is that move?

At 2:30 Giancarlo Dimas enters carrying two trophies. There will be a photo session today and Giancarlo with his trophies will be the subject. He participated in a chess tournament in Garden Grove in 2023 and took second place. After honing his game at the Oak View Library Chess Club, Giancarlo returned to the chess tournament in 2024 and won first place.

An eight-year-old girl, Cindy Lindenberg, accompanied by her father and two grandparents, approach Aaron and ask if she could participate in the chess club. She knows how the pieces move and has played a few games with her father. Aaron agrees to play a game with her to assess her capabilities. Her father sits on the sidelines working with his phone.

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EMBRACING LITERACY

Celebrating 40 Years of Service at HBPL

Have you ever noticed the Literacy Center office on the bottom level of Central Library where the coffee bar is located? Maybe you're wondering what they do in there. If you guessed teach people how to read and write, you'd be right; however that's not all that they do. The Literacy Center is a nonprofit organization, formally called Literacy Volunteers HBPL, which was founded in 1984. It is funded by three sources: the City of Huntington Beach, the California Library and Literacy Services, and their own fundraising. Their main mission is to help adults, 18 and over, learn to read and write. Volunteers work one-on-one with students until the student's goal is met.

Goals of students can vary. Perhaps the student wants to read the newspaper or a book, help their child with homework, or improve their job skills. Volunteers help the students by being trained by the Center via a 13-hour program with various modules. This training is done partially online and also in person. Volunteers do not need any previous experience such as being a teacher since all training is provided. Volunteers meet with students once or twice a week for two hours using materials provided by the center, either at the center or another mutually agreed upon public location. Hours are flexible and tutors are matched with students who have the same time schedule. There are currently 100 volunteers!

One such volunteer is Laura. She is retired, having formerly worked in the real estate industry. Laura has volunteered for 2 1/2 years, teaching 3 students. One student has an English speaking background, while another is a foreigner, and the third is a disabled student. Generally she has worked with them once or twice a week, depending on what fits best for her students' schedule. When Laura retired, she wanted to do something that helped the community.

Additional services provided by the Literacy Center include helping to prepare for the GED or HISET exam, as well as provide information on getting a high school degree via online coursework. Preparation for obtaining U.S. citizenship is also provided, as well as computer skills.

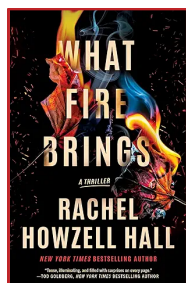
Welcome to the Bon Veeevil Festival of Fear! Prepare for the spookiest night of your life.

VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT

Lauren West

Lauren West, a hard-working FOTL volunteer, moved to Huntington Beach when she was nearly four years old. Her parents met in Scotland, and she was born in Dumbarton. After studying at Golden West College, she finished her English BA at UC Berkeley. As a student she was able to study abroad and visited the place where her parents had met in Scotland. Her first job was at an advertising agency where she worked as a copywriter, but eventually she went back to school to obtain a Masters of Library and Information Science at San Jose State University, which she completed last year. "Whether I work in a public or academic library or library-related institution, I hope to have the opportunity to help people of all ages access accurate and helpful information," says Lauren.



Lauren grew up going to HBPL with her parents from when she was very young. "I remember going to storytimes and sitting in the Children's Theater and going to the outside stage during the summer reading program. We did not always have a lot of money growing up, but the library opened up many opportunities for fun and learning. From the time I was able to get a library card, I would borrow as many books as I was allowed to, and this transferred even to my teen years, where my brothers and I would all scooter to Central Library to find the next book in many popular series...it never left my attention that the library is one of the last real third spaces in America. The third space describes the concept of how we, as a people, need a place outside of work/school or home to gather and have community. For many, the library is the third space."

Last March, Lauren started volunteering at HBPL as a computer coach. She also became involved with ProtectHB and FOTL in their outreach efforts against censorship and outsourcing at HBPL. "I was actually in the United Kingdom with a friend, celebrating graduating from our MLIS program, when I read the news that the City Council had voted to control what books were allowed in the library. I can remember being on a train and crying about it, feeling defeated that I wasn't home to have gotten involved."

As a computer coach, Lauren has seen how people come to the library to have access to a computer for a variety of purposes, such as filling out forms, government documents, renewing healthcare, paying bills, applying for unemployment and jobs. "I appreciate all the ways you can use digital resources through the library--ebooks, audiobooks, and even streaming. The library is so much more than just books, though there are those too!"



VOLUNTEERS RAISE MONEY FOR HBPL

Aside from the newcomer, the youngest player this day is nine-year-old, Ean Romero. He is playing 17-year-old Rafael Pena. There is a dramatic difference in their games. Ean plays quickly and aggressively while Rafael plays a more conventional game, contemplating each move and analyzing the opponent's move.

The Oak View Library Chess Club does not play in silence. It is more like a soccer match. When it becomes apparent that Giancarlo and Alexander are in a close match, some of the players abandon their game to kibitz. The kibitzers get a little louder and Aaron calls for a volunteer to quiet the noise.

As the afternoon winds down, the players start to roll up the boards and return them to the tubes until next week. One member turns on the computer and starts to play an online match. Aaron cautions no computer until after the club is over at 4:30. Although Aaron has put books on chess strategy and history out on a nearby table, the members prefer to go online and get playing experience against live players. It's always a fun Saturday afternoon!

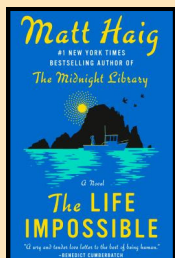

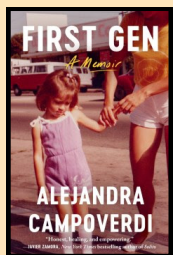
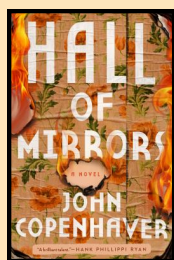

THAT LIBRARIAN

Amanda Jones spoke before her community's public library board in July 2022. Afterward, she was vilified in social media. She has written an account of her situation and why she filed a defamation lawsuit against the people who hurled epitaphs such as "groomer" and "pedophile" against her. It includes the text of the speech she made - about the purpose of a public library and why diverse books are needed to represent the entire community. She was accused of promoting anal sex to her middle school students. All because she said that public libraries should serve their entire communities.

This book is worth your time to read. It is excellent on many levels: her situation and why she decided to fight back; a sad description of our current polarized society; and, she's an engaging author. I especially enjoyed the peek into living in a small town where you can't go out without meeting someone you know. Something a lifetime in Orange and LA counties has made totally foreign.

Her constant theme was the requirement to be a strong example and role-model for her students. She succeeded admirably. While occasionally uneven (her soul-searching and attempts to force herself to forgive her attackers), her book is a treasure. Just one word of warning - read it with a box of tissues handy. You'll need them.

2024 In-N-Out Cover to Cover Reading Program



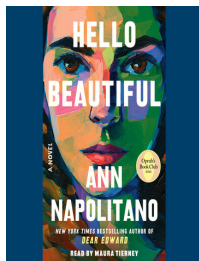

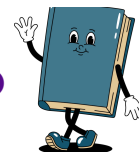

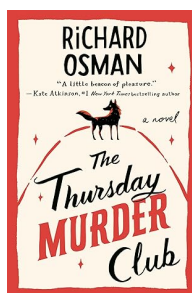

MESSAGE FROM FOTL PRESIDENT MARTHA ELLIOTT

Welcome Friends of the Library to Fall. Thank you for everything each of you do to support our library. There is another vital action you can take to keep our library reflecting the viewpoints in our community.

Please sign two petitions that will give Huntington Beach voters a chance to participate in deciding the future of our library. They are available to sign at Central Library. Each petition will put a question on the ballot in the Spring. The first is should we keep the 21-person politically appointed book committee that will have the final decision, with no appeal, about what materials our public library is allowed to obtain and where they are placed for access.

Currently, trained and experienced librarians select materials based on research and community needs. Parents have always had the ability to restrict what their children can check out or see by putting limits on their library card or accompanying their children to the library. The second question is should HB voters decide if any city council can enter a contract to have a for-profit company manage library operations. To make a profit, contract terms include the ability to reduce the number and quality of employees, reduce books and other materials resulting in a fraction of the collection we have now, and reducing the number of branches and/or branch hours. Our library is one of the most fiscally efficient in California, so the only way to make a profit is by these methods.

Please stop at the library and sign the petitions today. The full language of the proposal can be read on the petition.
