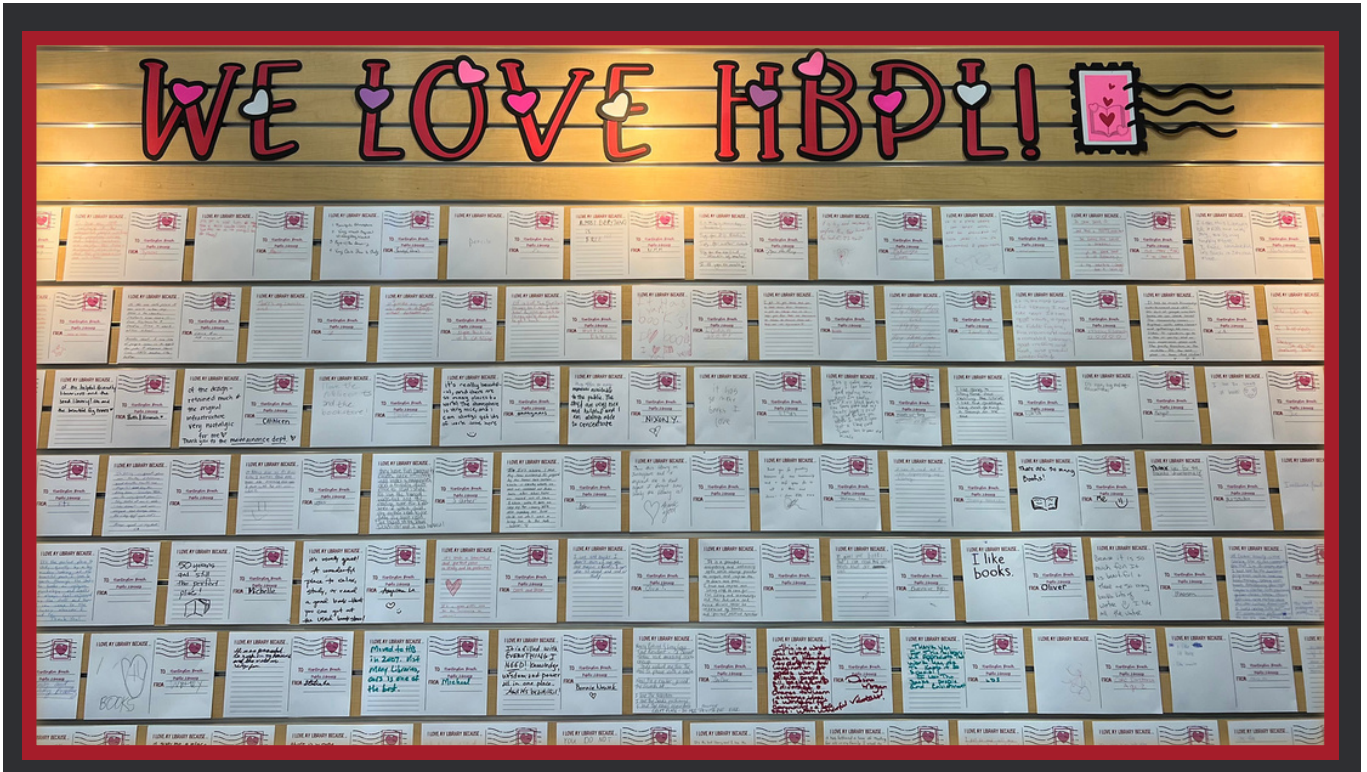

Privatize Our Public Library?

On March 19, the Huntington Beach City Council voted 4-3 to explore, through RFP, the privatization of our public library. The proposal was accepted despite 100 citizens expressing opposition at the meeting along with 600+ individuals who wrote emails against privatization.

The city has stated it's their fiduciary duty to look for ways to save the city money, but it's important to point out that our library has one of the leanest departments in the city. It represents only 1.9% of the city budget of \$500,000,000.

This winter, the city spent two months assessing Library Systems and Services' unsolicited bid to outsource our public library, LS&S is the country's largest public library outsourcer. The City's former Mayor, Mike Posey, is a sales executive of the for-profit private corporation based in Rockville, MD. One has to wonder why our public library and cultural center needs to be outsourced when it's

run so leanly. Over 10 years ago, LS&S backed out of its proposal to outsource our library because they realized our library ran efficiently and didn't need outside help.

Currently, HBPL is ranked as the most efficient running library system in Orange County. Its budget increased only 2% in 9 years; LS&S's budgets contractually increase at least 2 1/2% every year. If privatization does occur, it will cut 20% or more of the library budget, which will impact staff (reductions/fewer experienced librarians), program cuts such as Storytime, programs, Genealogy, Veterans Resource Center, Literacy, Citizenship, Homework Help and Makerspace, and books and materials (collection will be greatly reduced).

In 2018, Santa Clarita's City Council voted unanimously to take back full control of its public library system, and end its contract with LS&S due to declining service and higher costs. Returning to public status saved the city \$400,000 in its first fiscal year of operations, despite rehiring public employees.

According to the president of the Friends of the Santa Clarita Public Library, who volunteered both under LS&S and its original public library, the entire Friends group left when the for-profit corporation took over. She returned after a few years, but it wasn't the same place as it was before the takeover. "Unfortunately, I noticed that many of the LS&S employees did not have sufficient training. I am assuming that this was because LS&S was trying to keep their costs low. My biggest complaint was that we lost a lot of our collection," she said. "I really don't recommend that your library go with LS&S because, as we learned from experience, it was a very bad idea. If not, we would have still kept our contract with them."

HBPL'S DEDICATED VOLUNTEERS

They come in all sizes, shapes, and ages. But they have one thing in common--they are giving of their time and knowledge to improve the world of the Huntington Beach Library patron and allow the librarians to maximize their effectiveness based on their education and experience. And their time equates to more than a million dollars a year to the City of Huntington Beach.

There are seasoned volunteers who provide decades of experience in business, education, and living a fulfilling life. There are high school volunteers who introduce their contemporaries to media that does not require batteries or plug-ins and can be just as exciting, or even more so, than digital games.

Need help in looking up ancestors or long-lost relatives, there are volunteers dedicated to Genealogy. Looking for reading material for an extended period, the Used Book Store has thousands of books from current best sellers to classic and fiction or non-fiction. All thanks to the volunteers.

How about an unusual gift? The Friends Gift Shop has a plethora to choose from whether it is for a newborn or senior. You may prefer to make your own gift or just preserve a memory; Makerspace provides all the equipment and volunteers to help you achieve your desired goal.

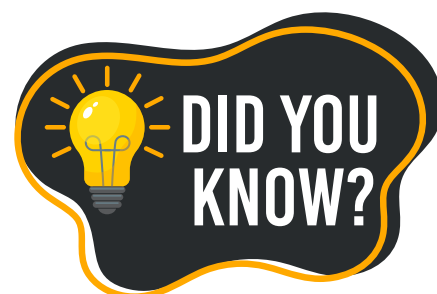
There are what might be perceived as more mundane jobs such as shelving books, sorting returns, identifying books to put on hold. With volunteers supplying the labor, the tasks are accomplished quickly without infringing on the librarian's valuable time.

But what does it mean to the citizens and the city as whole? Every volunteer hour is saving the taxpayer and the city budget appropriately \$37 according to an independent survey.

Let's take an example of one area: volunteers support Adult Literacy Services last year was 2494 hours (about 3 and a half months). Adult literacy adds to the value and attractiveness of Huntington Beach overall. So, in addition to the hours spent, the effort also improved property values in Huntington Beach.

The volunteer hours spent in Used Books and the Gift Shop create revenue that goes directly to Huntington Beach in the form of a check that last year amounted to \$250,000.00.

There are programs supported by volunteers that provide Veteran Resources to help vets with filling out applications for benefits, resuming a place in civilian life and helping vets solve personal problems. Hundreds of volunteers gave a total of over 33,000 hours (about 4 years) to support not only the Huntington Beach Library but make the city of Huntington Beach a better place to raise a family and increase the value and quality of life for all residents. There is always room for more volunteers. Unique skills or an educational background are valued, but a desire to help others is the most desired motivation.

Barbara Marrs



As the daughter of a small college athletic coach, Barbara did some moving around in her youth. If you ask where she grew up, she will claim Las Cruces, New Mexico. She graduated high school in Hayward, California and then went on to California State University San Diego.

At San Diego, her parents paid for the basics but if she wanted “fun funds” she had to fend for herself. Barbara joined a female trio that sang from one to three gigs a weekend. They sang at a variety of venues and had to have a large repertoire as they might sing at a hotel, such as the Hotel Del Coronado one night and at a high-end restaurant the next. Barbara returned to Hayward for her final semester of college and graduation from California State University East Bay with a degree in English in 1970. In 1976, Barbara returned to school. This time at California

State University Long Beach. With special permission she undertook a challenging course of study that netted her an M.A. Education with emphasis in reading. She graduated in 1979. During 1980 Barbara also joined Belisle & Associates where she designed and taught workshops to professionals for improving their reading skills. In 1983, in collaboration with her husband, she produced an instructional video “Managing Your Reading.” Along with the workbook, the program was adopted by several major companies, notably Chevron Oil, who utilized it nationwide. From 1980 until 1991 Barbara taught as Adjunct Faculty at Long Beach City College, CSULB, and Cypress College. In 1991, she joined Cypress College as a Reading Specialist. By 1999 she was Dean, Language Arts, Cypress College.

After retirement, Barbara decided to volunteer at the library. She requested any position available in the gift shop, and she was asked to be a buyer, a job she thoroughly enjoys. She especially enjoys working with other enthusiastic volunteers and meeting new members of the community. Her daughter also provided a distraction with the birth of triplets. They have provided hours of enjoyment and entertainment through their participation in sports and other activities.

Cindy Piring

They were planning to escape from Vietnam. Her father and uncle were building a boat. They had nearly completed the boat when her father was arrested. Cindy Piring’s family had to leave immediately. Two older sisters, an older brother, and 14-year-old Cindy left their home and joined the boat people seeking a new beginning.

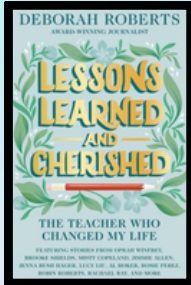
Eventually they made landfall in the Philippines where they stayed for six months. Not finding a suitable place to settle, they moved on to Malaysia. There, the Catholic church put them in touch with a Christian family in Washington State and through the auspices of the Catholic church, they relocated to the US.

While in Washington, the oldest sister met and married her husband before moving to Beaverton, Oregon. The second oldest sister and Cindy visited an aunt and uncle in Orange County, and Cindy was able to finish her education and graduate from Savanna High School.

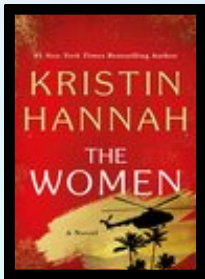

THE DAHLIAS AND THE RED HOT POKER

It is summer 1935 in Darling, Alabama.

For a small town in the South in the summer there is a great deal of activity. There is a new fire engine, there is an arsonist, and there may be a con artist working the ladies in town. The Dahlias, the local gardening club, are planning the annual dinner for the local volunteer fire department called the Hot Dogs. There is a poker game with FDR in Warm Springs, Georgia revealing who FDR believes to be the most dangerous men in the country, and a late addition to the activities is a campaign appearance by Huey P. Long. The Kingfisher himself!

The Darling Dahlias is a series about a garden club and each book features a plant. Red Hot Poker Lilys are from South Africa but do fine in Alabama. The Dahlias also believe that a garden keeps the group steady. With the great depression going full blast, the garden also provides support for the community when food is in short supply.

Susan Albert garnishes her books not only with information about the plants, but also provides recipes, most originating in the Southern States. With the Red Hot Poker, the recipes are on Susan Wittig Albert's website.

Susan Wittig Albert has written over 60 novels in the Mystery genre. Most are related to or based on plants and their properties. She has also written three historical fiction novels about famous women: Loving Eleanor, a fictional account of the friendship of Eleanor Roosevelt and Lorena Hickock; A Wilder Rose, the story of Rose Wilder Lane and the writing of the Little House books; The General's Women, about the romantic triangle of Dwight Eisenhower, Mamie, and Kay Somersby.

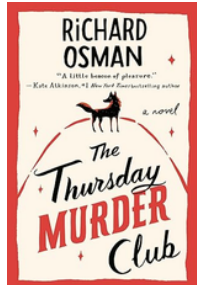

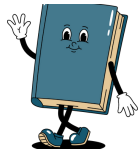

MESSAGE FROM FOTL PRESIDENT MARTHA ELLIOTT

The City Council is in the process of selling management control of our library to LS&S, a private, Maryland-based hedge fund. Mike Posey, the sales person who suggested this arrangement to his friends on the City Council, is a former Huntington Beach Mayor who claims the sale will result in a \$1M annual savings to the city. However, neither the City Council nor LS&S has provided a single item of information or calculation to back up that projection.

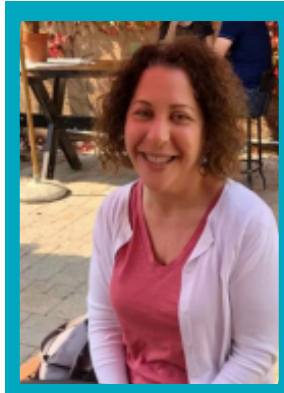
HBPL has a long history of stable economic management by professional librarians who competently provide a balanced curated collection of materials for our community. In a span of 9 years the \$5 million library budget has increased by only \$100,000 because the library professionals already have a public and private partnership with cataloging, acquiring library materials and providing electronic resources such as Libby and Palace for ebooks and audiobooks.

Our 1,100 generous FOTL members have contributed time and money for 57 years to fund Huntington Beach Library and Cultural Center community programs, library materials and even the Central Library Building because they love the library and the way it is operated. Over the last 10 years this amount totaled \$2 Million. Our members also operate the very successful Gift Shop and Used Book Store that draws people from all over Southern California.

In 1992, Cindy traveled to England and as a personal assistant to a sales executive managed to visit every major city in England and Scotland. While in the UK she acquired a hobby of making pictures and posters using postage stamps. Several of her works have sold for significant prices. After returning to Oregon in 1995, Cindy decided to go to Southern California to learn hair styling. While in Orange County, she met Alan Piring, but Cindy once again returned to Oregon.

She was just getting settled in Oregon when Alan showed up asking for a date. Their date wound up at the Grotto which is a beautifully landscaped park with an artificial grotto.

In 2002 their daughter was born. Cindy's neighbor, Carol Kanode, worked as a cashier in the Used Book Store and told Cindy about the Mommy and Me events at the library. Cindy became a FOTL member 10 years ago, starting as a cashier in the Used Books. She takes turns as a cashier, if needed, but now spends her day receiving and processing donated books for the Used Book Store.

Little could she imagine as a terrified 14-year-old just wanting to escape Vietnam, that she would one day work as a volunteer in a library, travel the world, have a husband who plays golf every day, and a 23-year-old daughter graduating from UCLA in June. Good things do happen to good people!
