THEN AND NOW

On April 5, 1975, when Huntington Beach residents entered HBPL's brand spanking new Central Library, they were impressed by the iconic architects' Brutalist design, the sweeping fountains, lush plants and open spaces. But there was one feature they found quite perplexing. There were no books in the expansive array of bookshelves.

That's because a global economic recession occurred as the finishing touches were being made on the beautiful new Central Library. Thankfully, Friends of the Huntington Beach Public Library—which had been formed several years prior to the opening of Central Library—went into high gear raising money for the city's new library. Friends' members organized book sales throughout the city, a gala fundraiser, and many other events. In a short period of time, Friends raised \$10,000 and books gradually started appearing on the shelves.

Fifty years later, Friends has never stopped raising money for our city's cultural gem. Currently, FOTL's fundraising efforts provide approximately \$250,000 yearly for the HBPL. Used book sales are still a major part of the group's success. Book lovers from throughout Orange County rave about the selection of used books available for purchase. The Friends Gift Shop, which opened the same year as the Central Library, has grown steadily over the years, and is considered one of the finest in California.



Sponsored by the Friends of the Children's Library, this is one of Huntington Beach's most popular events for children and their families. Held from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. in front of Central Library, the carnival features games, shows, face painting, food vendors, a silent fundraising auction, and, of course, a sign-up table for the Summer Reading Program. (Carnival tickets are .50 each or 11 for \$5.00 and are sold outside on the day of the carnival.)

Last year, 2,998 participants signed up for the reading program. A total of 189 programs for patrons of all ages were held in conjunction with the Summer Reading Program. In Huntington Beach, reading doesn't fizzle out during the long summer months. Thanks to our library and its stellar programs, reading sizzles as the months get warmer!

A VITAL RESOURCE FOR VETERANS

Located to the right of the reference desk on the first floor of Central Library is a helpful resource for veterans—the Veterans Resource Center. Established in December 2018 with a small grant, volunteers from the American Legion Post 133 (one of the oldest continuously serving posts in the U.S.), who are veterans themselves, staff the center. Information about federal, state, and local programs is offered to veterans on topics such as housing and education.

Volunteers staff the office weekdays for 2-hour shifts. Help to access military records to get benefit compensation, funeral benefits, widow benefits, even access to an emergency fund for financial needs, and more is available. Frank Passarelli, a veteran of the Vietnam War and a reservist, mans the center during the week and mentioned instances of helping veterans find homes, and pay bills such as cars and cell phones. He stated that many veterans are helped by the center—approximately 1,000 per year since the center opened.

Special events, too, are sponsored such as the March "National Vietnam Veterans Day", where veterans were honored for their service. Should you know a veteran who needs some assistance with some facet of their life, the center is a good place to utilize.

SEEDS FOR SPRING PLANTING!

HBPL Seed Library provides seeds to HBPL cardholders. Patrons can check out up to 10 seed packets per month to grow in their home gardens. At the end of the season, we encourage you to let a few plants go to seed and donate the seeds back to the seed library for others to use. This creates a sustainable and diverse stock of seeds for our community to use.

Most seeds provided are purchased through our library's program funding. Seeds of Change has generously donated a variety of lettuces, roots, herbs, etc. Any packet marked "Seeds of Change" on the packing label is USDA Certified Organic. Most Native California seeds are donated by Shipley Nature Center. In addition, some local native nurseries donate to our Native California collection.

She excelled as an elementary teacher and eventually was promoted to principal at two different schools.



As a retired educator, Elaine still had a yen for public service. During the last year, Elaine was appointed to the Friends of the Huntington Beach Public Library Board, which gives her the ability to engage in local library projects.

Elaine is a long-time resident of Huntington Beach, and a wife and mom of two children. Her son is an accomplished astrophysicist at UC Merced and her daughter continued in her footsteps as a teacher of dance in the APA program at Huntington Beach High School. Elaine is also a grandmother to a beautiful 3-year-old granddaughter.

This is a fun book about Dr. Amy Attas, a house call veterinarian in Manhattan for over 30 years. Her practice resembles the television show, "All Creatures Great and Small," except that most of the patients are cats and dogs. We hear about her visits and situations, clients who are sometimes famous but also those who are not. Cher, Elton John, and Steve Martin are all clients whose pets Dr. Attas has treated, and Joan Rivers was one of the doctor's biggest supporters.

After going to veterinary school, Dr. Attas began working at a private animal hospital in a fancy area in Manhattan where the rich and powerful lived. Through working at this hospital, she developed a clientele that depended on her to treat their pets, which she did after opening her own private practice. Putting ads in local newspapers and magazines, her biggest bullhorn was Joan Rivers, whose dog, Spike, Dr. Attas had treated many times and with great success.

Treating an aggressive rottweiler owned by a real estate mogul, getting bitten by a cat, or alternatively taking care of a wonderful labrador retriever who devoted her life to serving her master with multiple sclerosis are all things that Dr. Attas has done in the course of her work.





City Holds Special Election June 10 Involving HBPL

The City of Huntington Beach has scheduled a special election on June 10 to determine how Huntington Beach Public Library will be operated going forward. The Measures—A and B—were introduced following a grassroots effort where thousands of signatures were collected to oppose initiatives to control library book selections and privatize management of the public library.

Mail-in ballots will be distributed in mid-May and more information will be contained in the voter materials.


