Ray Rydell was born in Enterprise, Kansas, and when he was 18 months old his family moved westward to California, settling in the Long Beach area. He was always drawn to the written word and enjoyed reading.

After graduating from high school, Ray spent two years in the U.S. Navy and six years in the reserves as a radar instructor. His first job was as a copywriter for a general interest magazine. 

# Remembering Shirley Dettloff

On April 23, 2024, we lost one of our most beloved Friends when Shirley Dettloff passed away unexpectedly. Shirley was a huge advocate and supporter of our library. A former Huntington Beach mayor, Shirley worked closely with Democrats and Republicans alike during her City Council tenure from 1994 to 2002, to tackle vital city improvement issues such as library expansion. In 2023, when the current City Council proposed major changes to the library, including book censorship and privatization, Shirley took an active role by making public comments at City Council meetings and writing letters to the editor of local newspapers.

Charlene Bauer, a founder of Friends of the Huntington Beach Public Library and the wife of the late Ralph Bauer (former mayor of Huntington Beach), said Shirley "viewed the library as a city treasure that served as the centerpiece of our community." According to Charlene, one of Shirley's greatest skills was bringing people together, which helped to make Huntington Beach a world-class city for residents and visitors. "Shirley was extremely proud of our library, the librarians, and volunteers, and that's why she defended it so passionately during the past year."

Shirley is survived by her husband of 68 years, Bob, who is 91. She was the mother of three: Rob Dettloff, Sue Bohannan and Julie Snider, and grandmother of Anna Bohannan. We miss Shirley but she serves as an inspiration as we work hard each day to protect our first-class public library.

Library Systems and Services was the only bidder left at the end of the Request For Proposal (RFP) process and they withdrew their bid the night before the City Council was to publicly discuss proceeding with a contract.



We continue to advocate that Huntington Beach Public Library is a public service that can best be managed by library professionals and the City of Huntington

Beach. This was the original covenant with the city when the public, including children, raised money by individual donations starting 119 years ago to acquire a small building to house donated books. That covenant continued through all the expansions and improvements when generous citizens gave their money and efforts to create the Central Library and branches, we have today. This is truly our library that the city promised to care for and support.


Rise to Fame, by Olivia Ford. Your reference librarians are always happy to suggest books to match your interests!
