City Recognizes FOTL Milestone

At the Huntington Beach City Council meeting held on Sept. 21, 2021, Friends of the Library were honored with a special commendation by Mayor Kim Carr for their 50th anniversary and the long-standing support the organization has given to the Huntington Beach Public Library and city as a whole. During the meeting, FOTL presented the city with a check earmarked for Library Services in the amount of \$250,000.

Author book discussions are a great way for FOTL members and non-members to obtain first-hand information about the latest books. FOTL hosted a variety of author events last fall that were both well-attended and well-received!

In September, Judge Robert "Bobby" Fegers discussed his non-fiction book, *Grant Justice--The Untold Story of the Finest Attorney of a Generation*. He shared stories from his research on prominent Los Angeles attorney, Grant B. Cooper, who was the chief defense attorney in the murder trial against Sirhan Sirhan for the assassination of Robert F. Kennedy. Several Cooper descendants joined 63 attendees on the Zoom session. Later that month, two of Cooper's daughters hosted a private book-signing in Newport Beach, and one of the invited guests was MaryEllen Elick, FOTL Programs.

In October, a virtual book discussion was held with historical mystery author Lauren Willig, whose latest book is *Band of Sisters*, about a group of young women from Smith College who risked their lives in France at the height of World War I. 53 people attended the Zoom event. In November, FOTL hosted the first in-person author luncheon since the start of the pandemic. This popular event featured fiction authors Naomi Hirahara and Julia Walton, who discussed their latest books, *Clark and Division* and *Just Our Luck*. Over 75 members and non-members attended the luncheon. After all the Zoom meetings, the participants agreed that it was great to finally meet in person for such a fun event.

With the Friends' 70 volunteers and dedicated members, FOTL is able to raise funds through community events and fundraisers, Used Books Store and Friends Gift Shop sales, as well as membership donations in the amount of \$250,000 each year for the city library services division. Even in the midst of the Covid setback, FOTL was able to provide the same financial donation to the library as previous years due to the Friends' fiscally responsible financial planning, as well as generous donations from a former member, Ethel Watts.

This is not the only way the Friends are able to support the community--throughout the year they have had several community outreach projects including the Books for Schools program, as well as author events that provide a place for community member to meet others with similar interests. FOTL also provides the city with over a million dollars in savings each year through their volunteer hours alone. As Mayor Carr pointed out in her commendation speech, the 56,000 volunteer hours is equivalent to 27 full time employees.

Friends of the Library President Dina Chavez, along with others from the FOTL executive board, proudly accepted the commendation and thanked the City Council for their recognition. With honorary acknowledgment from the City Council, FOTL will continue to engage with and support their outstanding community.





a cousin. The cousin moved to Boise, but Susan stayed and has been a resident of Huntington Beach for 40+ years.



I'm not a huge fan of science fiction and fantasy literature, but when I heard that novelist Kazuo Ishiguro had a new book out last year, I wasted no time checking it out from the library. *Klara and the Sun* is the first book Ishiguro wrote after he was awarded the

Nobel Prize in Literature, and it's quite compelling, particularly related to technology's impact on people and society.

The story, set in the not-too-distant future, centers around Klara, an AF, or Artificial Friend, who serves as a type of mechanical nanny in search of a child. AFs can walk, talk, see, and learn. The reader first meets her in a storefront window, where she is desperately hoping to catch the eye of a would-be owner. The opening is powerful, allowing Klara to vividly narrate observations about humans and how they relate to one another.

Klara eventually goes home with Josie, a sweet, but physically ill girl and her mother. As Klara becomes part of the family, she learns about the world around her, discovering truths about people, their decisions, and the meaning of love.

One of my favorite Ishiguro books is *The Remains of the Day* (a recent Central Library Book Club pick), and it's quite different than *Klara and the Sun*. In fact, his books are very diverse. But regardless of the genre or theme, an Ishiguro book is always thought-provoking and stays ingrained in your brain for some time after the initial reading. I highly recommend *Klara and the Sun*.


