### Fridays, January 20, February 10 and March 10 at 2:00 pm




Looking back over the years at the Huntington Beach Public Library!

Dewey, The Rooster By Kathie Schey FOTL Historian



When Central Library opened in 1975, one of its earliest and most persistent patrons was a very large white rooster! Variously referred to as "Melvil" or "Dewey", staff named him after Melvil Dewey, widely regarded as the "Father of the Modern Library" and inventor of the Dewey Decimal system of classifying books.

While staff members worked to keep him out, he continuously made his way in. He loved scratching in the planters and was known to frequently roost in the Shakespeare section. When he couldn't get in, he forlornly gazed into the library through the windows. Finally, staff gave in and asked people not to disturb him, presuming he came from a surrounding early farm, "He'd been there first"! Eventually, Dewey, the Rooster "flew the coop" and was not seen again. His memory survived. The staff recognition honor named for him was awarded for years afterward!



A SUNLIT WEAPON By Jacqueline Winspear REVIEWED BY RAY RYDELL



Maisie Dobbs is at it again. In this 17th book of the Maisie Dobbs series by Jacqueline Winspear, she has three separate cases that all come together in the climax, plus she must address bullying at school of her adopted daughter.

Maisie is unusual in that she is a psychologist and investigator who does not carry a gun and does not practice any exotic martial arts. She avoids violence and if needs firepower can call on Scotland Yard or, in culmination of this story, she has the Yard and the US Army to back her up.

The first case she accepts involves someone shooting at planes being ferried to combat bases by women pilots. This leads to two missing US soldiers, and then a mystery involving a visit by Eleanor Roosevelt to the UK.

This all takes place in the late months of 1942. However, the resolution of the bullying will call on her experience from her nursing career in WWI.

Jacqueline Winspear has created an unusual heroine who uses her intellect and training to solve mysteries.Her timeline runs from just before WWI to WWII. Though Winspear wasn't born until 1950 she spent many hours with her grandfather to gather background and stories from that period.

I recommend the entire series and having lived through some of that time, I can guarantee that she has the world events accurate.
