COMMITTEES

In 2021 our organization formed 4 committees to meet the growing needs of our organization and those that we serve. Committees are composed of one board member who serves as the chair, staff members, and volunteers ensuring that the voice of lived experience is present in each committee.

Policy & Procedures Committee:

This committee addresses WRR's Programs, Policies, and Procedures ensuring all programming reflect our organization's mission and those we serve. This committee works to establish the annual strategic plan to present to the board of directors and ensures that the organization is carrying out the task of the strategic plan. This committee makes recommendations to the board for any necessary changes to organizational policies and procedures.

Finance Committee:

This committee provides overall financial oversight of our nonprofit. Its members help to ensure that your organization has the necessary resources to provide programming and deliver our mission in the community. Responsible for reviewing budgets initially prepared by staff, to help develop appropriate procedures for budget preparations, recommend financial guidelines to the board, work with staff to design financial reports and ensure that reports are accurate and timely, oversee short and long-term investments, and to advise the executive director and other appropriate staff on financial priorities and information systems and helps ensure necessary internal controls are in place for the organizations safety.

Fundraising & Events Committee:

This committee is responsible for overseeing the WRR's overall fundraising efforts. They will work with staff to establish a fundraising plan that incorporates a series of appropriate vehicles, such as special events, direct mail, product sales, etc., work with fundraising staff in their efforts to raise money, will take the lead in certain types of outreach efforts, and will be responsible for involvement of all board members in fundraising. Its main duty is to support the Board and the organization in a structured process of raising funds.

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee: will be composed of diverse staff members and volunteers who are responsible for helping bring about the cultural, and possibly ethical, changes necessary for WWR. This committee will also be responsible for ensuring WWR's policies and procedures align with a culturally competent environment.

Wilkes Recovery Revolution formed a Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion committee to center the experiences and needs of individuals from underrepresented and marginalized populations. Our mission is to create a community where recovery is possible for all. This committee supports us in achieving this mission through education, advocacy, and policy review.

WHO ARE WE?

Wilkes Recovery Revolution, INC. is a 501c3 nonprofit organization and an accredited Recovery Community Organization (RCO). This standing designates that we are a non-clinical, grassroots effort committed to advocacy activities and community building within the recovery population. We are the first accredited RCO in Wilkes County and have earned our status through Faces and Voices of Recovery based in Washington, D.C. This accreditation also represents a commitment to being peer-run, which means that more than 50% of our staff, board, and volunteers have lived experience with recovery from substance use or mental health concerns.

Our Mission:
Through the wisdom of lived experiences we are creating a community where recovery is possible through resorting hope, repairing lives, and rebuilding community.

Wilkes Recovery Revolution, INC is an umbrella organization supporting various programming and support services including our R3 Recovery Center, Wilkes Harm Reduction Collective, Fresh Start Farm, Wilkes Fresh Mobile Market, Project HOW-Healing Our Workforce, Phases Transitional Housing, Revolution Thrift Store, and Hope Warriors.



PROGRAMS

Phases Transitional Housing:

Offers supportive and safe housing for those entering recovery. We offer three facilities, serving male and female residents in separate programs. This peer driven program supports individuals in building a foundation that will help them transition into independent living, where they will have the support to live a meaningful and productive life. Phase's transitional housing believes recovery is possible and serves as a catalyst for stability on their personal journey of recovery.

R3 Recovery Center:

Opened in November of 2021 and acts as a walk-in recovery community center located at 1907 West Park Drive, N. Wilkesboro NC, 28659, where peers looking to enter or sustain recovery from the effects of substance use or mental health concerns can come and meet with North Carolina Certified Peer Support Specialists who guide their recovery journey through the lens of lived experience. Our peer support specialists work with peers to offer wrap-around services that address the eight dimensions of wellness as outlined by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) including housing, transportation, health and physical wellness, continuing education, employment assistance, and more. Through active community navigation, we have established avenues of partnership and referral with other human services agencies in addition to what we are able to offer directly.

Wilkes Harm Reduction Collective:

Is housed at the center of the R3 Recovery Center. We believe that those who use substances deserve and require the same access to services and programming as those who are choosing a harm reduction pathway of abstinence in their recovery. This program operates to reduce harms for people who use drugs through offering overdose kits, syringe access services, supplies and training for safer use, fentanyl testing strips, wound care kits, and personal hygiene supplies. Being housed in the R3 Recovery Center allows for immediate and direct linkage to resources and care for our participants, as well as the opportunity to participate in our other programming.

Project HOW (Healing our Workforce):

This program is Wilkes Recovery Revolution's effort to bridge barriers to employment for those in recovery. Through funding from the Golden LEAF Foundation, the Appalachian Regional Commission, and the Herring Foundation, ProjectHOW offers opportunities for continued education, soft-skills and job readiness training, employment support, and more. Through linkage with a North Carolina Certified Peer Support Specialist, peers in recovery obtain wraparound services to address all barriers to finding meaningful and gainful employment including transportation, funding for courses, connection to our community partner agencies, and support through to employment.

Recovery Friendly NC is Wilkes Recovery Revolution's program advising community-level Recovery Friendly Workplace Initiatives. Recovery Friendly Workplace Initiatives are efforts to support local employers through navigating the effects of substance use on their valued employees.

The three main goals of the Recovery Friendly Workplace Initiative are to combat the stigma surrounding substance use and recovery, to connect employers with necessary resources and support for their valued employees, and to reduce the negative effects and fiscal burden of substance use on the workplace. Recovery Friendly Workplace Initiatives are starting across the nation; Wilkes Recovery Revolution is a part of a Community of Practice that includes twenty-five states where this work is taking place. Locally, Wilkes Recovery Revolution has worked to designate five Early Adopters who act as champions of this work - Wilkes Chamber of Commerce, NCWorks Career Center of Wilkes, the High-Country Workforce Development Board, Suncrest Farms Country Ham, and Tyson.



Fresh Start Farm:

Is an agricultural work-study opportunity funded through the Appalachian Regional Commission to bring therapeutic work experiences and meaningful certifications to forty peers in recovery. We have hired a Project Coordinator and farming specialist who has broken ground on farmland owned by Wilkes Recovery Revolution and that is adjacent to our transitional housing program. Certifications like OSHA-10, SERV Safe, Greenhouse Production, Pesticides and more will be offered in partnership with Wilkes Community College. This program will also take over the operations of Wilkes Fresh Mobile Market, an existing community collaborative designed to address equitable, healthy food access by selling locally grown produce in underserved areas of Wilkes as identified by research conducted by the Healthy Wilkes Action Team, who piloted this successful project through Healthy People, Healthy Carolinas - a Duke Endowment Initiative.

The store offers crisis assistance for individuals who are preparing for interviews, reintegrating into society, transitioning into housing, reunifying family's structure, or recovering from trauma. This program also serves to build program revenue to support individuals in recovery. We offer meaningful work that aids to build workforce skills and empower individuals to be productive members of their community and society. The participation of volunteers serves to involve members of the community to become a part of the recovery movement and support those in recovery.

2021 YEAR

IN REVIEW

R3 Recovery Community Center had its official ribbon cutting on July 28th, 2021.

Hosted our 5th Annual Recovery Rally virtually on September 5th, 2021, exercising caution with an uptick in COVID-19 cases. This event reached 2.1K people and received 1.3K reactions, comments and shares on Facebook.

Hosted "Somebody's Someone" Overdose Awareness Event on August 27th in person and virtual live stream in partnership with Project Lazarus in honor of International Overdose Awareness Day on August 31st. Through this event, a candlelight vigil was held, materials and naloxone distributed, and a memorial wall was created at the R3 Recovery Center.

Through a partnership with Wilkes Art Gallery and Instructor Kim Reid, "Just for Today Clay" began, a class for people in recovery to benefit from the therapeutic values of art.

Fresh Start Farm program is off to a great start preparing for 2022 growing season where we will hire individual in recovery who make a living wage and gain free certification to procure fresh fruits and vegetables.

Wilkes Fresh Start Mobile Market is being donated in 2022 for Wilkes Recovery Revolution, Inc. To run. This program is in a transition period with The Health Foundation and Wilkes Partnership for Children to prepare for 2022 mobile market season.

Our staff prepared and distributed hot meals and gifts through R3 Recovery Center for Thanksgiving and Christmas.

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Wilkes Recovery Revolution, Inc. made its first appearance at Wilkes County's Christmas Parade to raise awareness and provide program information. Hosted North Carolina's first Recovery Coaching: A Harm Reduction Pathway training, enabling us to get 20 people across the state trained in this new curriculum and 10 individuals trained to be trainers of the curriculum across the state.

Hosted our annual Phases Transitional Housing Christmas Party, where the community supported in providing gifts to each resident.

Established Wilkes Harm Reduction Collective to reduce harms for people who use drugs. We improved the health of 1,094 unique participants with safe, live saving supplies.

Increased the peer workforce by hiring 7 individuals with lived experiences through our organization, with a total of 16 individuals employed through our organization with lived experiences.

Opened our R3 Recovery Center to the homeless population, allowing them a safe space during the day to be out of the elements and provide access to restrooms and food.

Received the 2021 Chairmans award through the Wilkes Chamber of Commerce.
