Parlor Cheesemakers in News

Brothers Rick and Scott Lafranchi and their Nicasio Valley Cheese Company were spotlighted in the winter 2025 issue of *Via*, the magazine of the California State Automobile Association. In the article, Brother Rick tells the story of how a multigenerational pilgrimage to his grandfather's home in the Swiss-Italian Alps inspired the family's transition from milk production to making cheese.

"Our relatives served us these traditional regional cheeses, and they were unlike anything we'd experienced before," Rick said. "We took some home and everyone who tried them thought they were pretty special."

Recruiting Swiss cheesemaker Maurizio Lorenzetti for authenticity, Brothers Rick and Scott (and non-parlor member Randy) began production in 2010 at their facility at 5300 Nicasio Valley Road, just off the Nicasio Square, and now have a dozen fresh and aged cheeses. One variety, "Nicasio Square," won first place in the farmstead category.

In the article, Rick said they milk their herd of Holsteins each morning, and the milk is at the creamery and into production in less than four hours. "The freshness makes the difference," he said.

Nicasio Valley cheese is available at markets throughout Marin, including Fairfax Market and Fairfax Good Earth Market and Andronico's and United Markets in San Anselmo.

Following are more excerpts from Brother Burt Winn's interview with Brother Russ Knudsen concerning Russ' interest in helping the environment, especially through his book Bobby Otter and the Great Pacific Garbage Patch.

Burt. Have you been writing for a long time?

Russ. Writing was always easy for me. I mean, I just had no problem writing, but I didn't think of it as a way of life, or as some people use the word, passion. I've just always have loved to write. And now I'm serious about getting as many stories out there as possible with the Bobby Otter story being

1st and foremost

The other two stories that are part of the trilogy are also environmentally important. And believe it or not, most of the stories that I've written have some type of impact on the planet, you know? I wrote a story called "Respect the Horse," about the wild Mustangs we have throughout the country. From an environmental standpoint, I look at that mainly as the wild horses feel like they represent America—the freedom, because that's why we started. We wanted our freedom and these wild horses almost represent humanity. And so I wrote a story about that. But once again, it hasn't been published. This Bobby Otter is the first story to be published.

Most of my stories have some type of environmental impact somewhere, or theme, if you want to say that. And, I think I've started a new genre of story writing, and I call it environmental adventure stories. Yeah, environmental adventure stories, this genre that I kind of want to make part of a mission statement or, if I ever start marketing myself, I'm gonna let people know I write environmental adventure stories.

Burt. So how does this tie in with your spoken word events?

Russ. You're talking about the story nights that I have here.

Burt. Yeah, I call those spoken word events. It's a little gig, you know?

Russ. The story nights I do here are strictly at Canon. And it's like I'm practicing to be a storyteller. So that eventually, if my environmental adventure stories become, well-known and people want me to come and speak about them, I'll feel confident I can present myself well, because when you get up in front of the public, there's a little bit of anxiety and nerves. It can be a little nerve-racking when you do that. But the more you do it, the easier it becomes for you.

I'm doing it here, I'm telling these stories here, to help me with my confidence in that I know I can, I know I can hold a crowd, make it fun for them and make it a good learning experience as well.

Burt. I'm curious, now, how do you come up with the ideas for your stories like the globe spinning and the things hanging from the ceiling and all that kind of thing? People seem to really enjoy it.

Russ. Well, the first three stories that I wrote here, it's funny, I do, I like the idea of trilogies. So my first three stories that were titled were, "Three Stories for Three Sisters." The three sisters were members here. One of them is Marty Rosen, Bloom's wife; R.J. Franco's wife; and Richard Doores, his wife. Those were the first three stories.

Now, in the story these men have to take care of their wives. They cannot take care of themselves. They are physically in a position where they're almost bedridden; if they get out, it's a struggle for them. But in these three stories, the men are the heroes. These are three heroes, heroic men. There a are three stories for three sisters, and the three sisters basically means their wives.

So I wrote a story about each of the men. And I just made up stuff. And they went over pretty well. And, they all did have environmental stuff with them.

The one about R.J. Franco, that one was called "R.J. Franco and the Bongo Boys," because he's a drummer. He's a teacher. I guess from an environmental standpoint, the spiders in that story, which were down in his basement, they'd spin webs.

Burt. Right, I remember they would, and what those webs were, it was music.

Russ. It was like musical notes because that they were always practicing down in the basement, and the spiders were digging it, and they would they would make their webs as if a musician was writing down a composition for music. But they did it in the spider web. I wouldn't necessarily call that an environmental, something that has environmental impact, but the spiders are part of the environment and music is important to our world for humans and for animals.

Burt. I guess you did say there's a little bit of environmental impact there because the spiders are recording the music for the future spiders.

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
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
