#### **Discovery of Gold Weekend**

A Travelogue by Burt Winn

There was a break in the rainy weather this January for my first visit to the Discovery of Gold Weekend hosted by Excelsior Parlor #31.

Held in the Gold Rush town of Jackson, County Seat of Amador County and nestled in the rolling foothills of the central Sierra Nevada, the town is located on CA Highway 49, in the middle of the Mother Lode, the central vein for California gold. Travel was easy and the skies were clear. I missed the famous California traffic by taking Highway 4 to Highway 99, then north to the town of Jackson, an easy trip from Marin County.



Arriving at the hotel, my wife and I soon left for our first event, a meet and greet at Excelsior Parlor's NSGW clubhouse on Court Street, a beautiful older building on a hill one block above Jackson's downtown. The sun was setting, but we were just in time as I opened the front door to be greeted by a crowd of Brothers and Sisters hanging out in the clubhouse Bar.



I socialized with many of the members and enjoyed the old time vibe of the Bar, visiting with many of the attendees discussing local events and catching up with other Native Sons from around the state. A lot of history was represented in that room and I listened to many stories of the old days of California. Saturday morning was up and at 'em for the Grand Parlor meetings at 8am in a room below the Bar at the NSGW Hall. Afterwards we were off to a Dedication of the Central Eureka Mine to the north in Sutter Creek.

The mine was in production from 1852 to 1953 with a main shaft reportedly 4,855 ft deep. This was one deep mine, producing some 1,800,000 ounces of gold - one of the most productive mines in the Mother Lode.

The mine is currently owned by Jeff Campbell, the current President of Amador Parlor #17, with his wife Jessie. You can see both of them in the dedication picture.



After driving back, I dropped my wife off at The Estate Planning Law Center in downtown Jackson. It's owned by the Mayor of Jackson and current Grand First Vice President, Steve McLean, and his wife Gwen Christeson. It looks like a law office, but it has a secret basement room turned into a "speakeasy," inaccessible from the street. There, a Ladies Social was being held with wine tasting and Hors d'oeuvres.

Back at the NSGW Hall, in the upstairs Great Hall, a formal Initiation of new members was chaired by Senior Past President Dave Allen. A large group from Chispa Parlor #139 were the initiates. I have to mention how stunning this hall is: It is made of dark hardwood, festooned with banners and paintings from the 19th Century with a raised Dais at the far end and large windows allowing natural light to enter. And even with my hearing difficulties, the sound in the room was excellent and clear, lively even. Amplification was unnecessary.



Following that, a very fine lamb shank/tri-tip dinner was served in the downstairs meeting room. A highlight was a talk by Cedric Clute, a local KVGC radio personality who hosts "Tales of the Motherlode," a popular local history show. While we were being served he told the "real" history of Jackson, pointing out that mining was not the basis of the local economy in historical times. In fact, it was...wait for it...prostitution! The speakeasies underneath the downtown buildings were saloons during Prohibition and houses of prostitution up until the Governorship of Pat Brown in the 1950s, who shut the establishments down, thus cleaning up the town and allowing Jackson to become the tourist and visitor magnet it is today.

Sunday morning was the last event, a Breakfast held at Excelsior Parlor #32's NSGW Hall in the downstairs room. The weekend was a fun and educational tour of Jackson, the surrounding area's local mine and a great socializing event for the Brothers and Sisters of the NSGW.

Brothers, I urge you to visit and participate in functions like these, a great perk of being a member of the Native Sons.

#### Weekend in the Redwoods

Wandering Marshal Lou Langlamet

My wife Irene and I have been going to Weekend in the Redwoods for quite a few years and enjoy the camaraderie of seeing friends from all over the state and the informative dedications at historical sites.

On Saturday morning we traveled to McKinleyville for the NSGW dedication for Howard 'Pete' Snell, whose tragic death spurred greater safety standards in the racing industry. The Snell foundation still tests helmets and safety equipment to this day.



Afterwards we had a nice lite lunch at the Eureka Parlor, a beautiful old building with retail on the ground floor and the Parlor above.



Then on to Ferndale. The cross at Ferndale Cemetery was dedicated in memory of 38 pioneers that lost their lives in 1860 when the Steamship Northerner hit the the shoals off shore.



An earthquake wrecked the original cross, which was rebuilt and dedicated by Grand President Fred Codoni in 1995.



Unfortunately, the cliff continued to erode and brother Allen Beard had to lower the cross down to the beach, its present site.

Because of the crumbling cliffs a second cross was dedicated high above the town of Ferndale with exceptional views of the surrounding countryside.



At the end of the day in Fortuna we had a formal initiation of 9 new brothers, very impressive! Now for dinner lots of Hors d'oeuvres, open bar, then Salad, prim rib, chicken and all the trimming with wine on the table and dessert. As with all the festivities a majority of Grand Officers were in attendance, as well as Past Officers and 14 Parlors being represented. The picture shows just a few of the silent auction items available to bid on. I think it was the biggest Silent Auction I have ever seen – good times!



Sunday everyone went home but Irene and I extended our stay to visit the site of the original cross and see some more of the beautiful countryside.

Irene navigated our way there, and though the roads were a bit dodgy and I found myself pressing my right foot into the floor like it was the brake, we made it in one piece.


It's always a pleasure to travel around the state meeting our brothers and celebrating our history. If you get the chance you should try it!


