### It Takes a Team

It has been quite a ride for me since I joined the NSGW Fairfax Parlor #307 in November 2018. From knowing nearly nothing about the nuts and bolts of the organization, I went from a new member to a Grand Trustee in less than six years. But I could not have done this by myself.

Soon after joining the order, I was asked by Past Grand President Fred Codoni if I would like to run for Third Vice President and "climb the chairs." Not knowing what that meant, Fred described the process of running through the Parlor chairs, advising me that it would take around three years. I said, "Yes," and was curious to see what would happen.

I was installed as Third VP in December of 2018. My duties were to order snacks for the parlor meetings and observe how things worked that year.

During that same year, Fred and then Grand President Joe Castillo asked if I would like to be on the Board of Control which would allow me to join the Grand Parlor meetings. Sure, let's go.

I climbed from Third VP the next December when I was installed as Second VP. But then, in March of 2020, COVID hit and everything changed. Closures and lockdowns occurred and meetings went virtual.

During the next two years, I went from Second VP to Parlor President as people above me left. I was installed as Parlor President for the 2023 calendar year, finishing my term in December.

During this time, some members of the Grand Parlor were urging me to consider a run for Grand Office as a Grand Trustee, suggesting I would be "good at it." I considered this and decided to run.

### **Essay Contest Winner**

Adeline S. Biggins of Manor School in Fairfax won first prize in the **Grand Parlor Essay Contest** for fourth grade students. While her subject was a common one about the California Gold Rush her treatment was different and attracted the interest of the judges. Brother Bill Addy of Fairfax Parlor was the local chairman of the contest. Here's her essay:

#### The California Gold Rush

Gold in California!!! You can't walk down the street without kicking a gold nugget! Or so one flier said. In reality you have to labor away at the mines or pan the creeks for gold. Some people did strike it rich, but for most people the gold rush was a difficult time.

On January 24, 1848, James W. Marshall found gold at Sutters mill. John Sutter, his boss, told James to keep the discovery a secret. So did the secret stay in Sutters Mill? No, no it did not. The tale of gold in California quickly spread to the far corners of the world.

Most people who came to California in search of gold had a comfortable life on the East Coast, where there were paved roads, organized cities, and large hours. In California they had none of those luxuries. People mainly had to live in tents and the food was never fresh.

The people who made the real money in the gold rush sold supplies and services to the miners. For example, Levi Strauss sold sturdy pants to miners and two partners named Henry Wells and William Fargo created a bank for the miners gold.

Levi Strauss & Co and Wells Fargo were really successful businesses during the California gold rush and still are today. The California gold rush changed the lives of many people of European descent but it also impacted the indigenous people who relied on the land. The Nisenan Maidu for example lived near the American river which happened to be the same river where gold was found in Sutters Mill. Many native peoples died from foreign disease and starvation and others were forced to leave their sacred land.

The gold rush was exciting for some people and sad for others. But to this day it remains one of the most important events in California history.





