## HOMEMADE COOKIES FOR CATS AND DOGS

- 2 Cups of Wheat Germ**
- 3 jars of strained chicken baby food**
- 1 Tablespoon of Water**

**Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Mix ingredients together and roll in to 1-inch balls, adding a little more water if needed to ensure that they stick together. I wish I could say it was easy for all volunteers to be with him, but it wasn't. Armani was confused and flat out annoyed that he wasn't home. He would not do anything he didn't want to do. Volunteers sometimes had to call other volunteers to help get him back to the shelter or into his kennel. Some spent hours trying get him inside. He would growl and snap at you if you kept trying to make him do something that he didn't want to do. Somehow, I never had as hard a time with him as others did. He would be stubborn, but I always found a way to outsmart him. Maybe I never outsmarted him -- and that was his way of telling me that I was his person.

From May to August, Armani had five failed adoptions, most saying that he was just too stubborn or aggressive for them. Most people just couldn't handle him, and my heart kept breaking for him. More hurt and heartache. His eyes were broken. You could see him starting to give up. That's when I said, "Enough! I will make it work with my dogs."

I always had a connection with Armani, so when he come home, it was no surprise that he immediately was a completely different dog than who he was at the shelter. He listened! I couldn't believe it when he came inside when I called him the first time. He learned his routine very quickly and even became a morning dog without pouting about it. Anything I told him, he did. He is absolutely one of the best dogs I've ever had. He is goofy, quirky, stubborn, super cuddly, and has a personality that goes on for miles! He is so smart. He will figure out how to get through every barrier and blockade I put up to keep him out of a room. He goes over, under, around, and through. He is amazing on all levels.

I never thought I'd ever love a dog the way I love him. There is just something about a rescue and how they love you back that is truly amazing. It is different than a dog that always had a home. Armani was broken and shutting down. Since coming to me he has flourished! His personality has come out and he smiles, he runs, he plays, he wrestles, he rolls over for belly rubs, and gets mad when you stop. He has his problems, but nothing we haven't been overcoming. It's a slow process at times to gain his trust with certain things, but I have and it's the best feeling in the world to have the trust of a dog that wouldn't let anyone in.

I saved Armani, and he has given me more than I could ever ask for. It was stated by a veterinarian that he was "not adoptable" after one of his check ups. He had growled at the vet for touching his feet. When they went to look in his ears, he snapped. He didn't bite, but that was enough for him to be deemed "unadoptable." Thankfully, I was the right person for him and he was spared.

He is an amazing dog! He just needed the right person to give him love and be patient with him. He knows mom is the boss. He doesn't try to challenge me like he does with others. He is my everything. There is nothing I wouldn't do for him, and he is my protector. He makes sure his mom is safe if people are over. He keeps an eye on my guests all times. He will let them pet him if I tell him it's okay. He may not like it, but he looks and me, I look at him and he lowers his head to them know they can pet him. The bond we have is greater than any other bond I've ever had. He knows he is safe and is finally home.
