

The first phase of the reconstruction and renovation of the Leatherwood Museum began with doing a full inventory of all documents and artifacts found in the museum. During this time, a copy of a letter was found in a Family Bible dated 1889. The letter was written from David Dunn to his wife.



David Dunn was born in 1835 and was married at an early age. He joined the Confederate State Service in 1861 at Camp Moore in Tangipahoa Parish in Louisiana. He had already been married and had children when he joined. The following letter was written to his wife, Elizabeth Jane, on Monday evening, July 29, 1861 when he had just been "mustered" into the army.

The original letter was donated to the Camp Moore Museum in April of 1966 by his grandson Clarence Henderson.

MY DEAR WIFE,

I WILL NOW SAY TO YOU THAT WE HAVE JUST BEEN MUSTERED INTO THE CONFEDERATE STATE SERVICE FOR TWELVE MONTHS. I AM HAPPY TO SAY TO YOU THAT WE WILL SOON BE READY TO TAKE UP ARMS IN DEFENSE OF OUR LOVELY COUNTRY. DEAR WIFE I FEEL HAPPY TO SAY THAT WE ARE ALL WELL AND SEEM TO ENJOY OURSELVES. I THINK WE WILL ALL DO WELL. WE ARE WELL PLEASED WITH OUR OFFICERS AND WE ARE SORRY TO SAY THAT



SOME OF OUR BOYS HAVE BACKED OUT. I THINK THAT THEY HAVE DONE WRONG. I WOULD HAVE DIED BEFORE I WOULD HAVE BACKED OUT. YOU MAY THINK THAT I DO NOT FEEL NEAR TO YOU, BUT MY WHOLE LIFE DEPENDS UPON YOU AND SELF IN DEFENSE OF MY COUNTRY. IF GOD SPARES ME I WILL RETURN TO YOU, THAT IS IF LIFE LASTS. YOU MUST NOT TAKE ANY EXCEPTIONS TO ANYTHING THAT IS WRITTEN, BECAUSE IT IS ON MY SATCHEL UPON MY LAP. IF I NEVER SEE YOU ON EARTH, MAY WE MEET WHERE THERE IS A BETTER AND BRIGHTER WORLD ABOVE, WHERE WE WILL NEVER PART AND SONG SHALL NEVER CEASE TO BE SUNG, AND MORE WHERE PARTING WILL NEVER BE ANY MORE. OUR BOYS THAT HAVE BACKED OUT HAVE NEVER SEEN THE ELEPHANT, TOO MANY MEN AND TOO MANY DRUMS BEATING, I SEE TWELVE COMPANIES DRILLING EVERY EVENING AND MORNING. AND I HOPE THAT IT WON'T BE LONG BEFORE WE WILL BE DRILLING. I SEE LOTS OF COMPANIES THAT GOT THE WORD OF COMMAND PERFECT.

I HAVE NOTHING OF INTEREST TO WRITE TO YOU NOW THAN I HAVE MY PROFILE DRAWN AND WILL SEND IT TO YOU. I MUST NOW CLOSE BY SAYING TO YOU THAT YOU MUST KISS ALL THE CHILDREN FOR ME AND DEAR WIFE, YOU MUST NOT TAKE ANY THING HARD, AS ALL WILL BE BRIGHT.

I CLOSE BY SAYING TO YOU ALL IS WELL AND RIGHT WITH ME AT THIS TIME. I CLOSE: GOODBYE.

Yours Truly David Dunn

David Dunn came home after his term in the Confederate State Service. He died on August 24, 1869. He was 34 years old. The story that is told was that David had hunting dogs and the dogs were stolen. He figured out who took his dogs and went to the people's house that had stolen the dogs to get them back. David found his dogs and was on his way back to his house. As he and the dogs were leaving the house, David was shot in the back and killed.

The letter above has been reacted and is shown on video in the "family bedroom" in the museum. The furniture in the bedroom is from the turn of the century. The bed and dresser are a matched set. The secretary is from the early 19th century. The baby bassinet in the room was made from white oak strips and is over 100 years old.

David Dunn is relevant to Allen Parish because his son, William T. Dunn, was the founder of Dunnsville. William T. Dunn donated 80 acres of land in 1885. This area became known as Dunnsville, Louisiana. It remained Dunnsville until 1911 when the area was renamed the Village of Oakdale.

The Wrinkle Family

John Jacob Wrinkle was my great, great, great, great, great, great grandfather born about 1720 in Germany and died in 1813. He and his wife had a son named George who was born about 1740 in Virginia, and died 1807 in Knox Co... Tennessee. He married Sophia in Virginia. They had eight children, one being John Wrinkle born about 1760. John died May 1829 in Natchitoches Parish, Louisiana. He married Sarah Madden about 1780 in Mississippi Territory, daughter of Emanuel Madden and wife unknown. Sarah was born about 1760 in Natchez District, Mississippi Territory, and died 1851 in Louisiana. John and Sarah had five children, one being E. David Wrinkle, born about 1781, and died after 1860. He married Sarah Wray and they had three children, one being John Wray Wrinkle. John Wray was born about 1831 and died in about 1865 from health problems caused by months spent under siege at Vicksburg. He died in Shelby County. Texas. He had married Angeline Cox in April 1861 in Natchitoches Parish. Angeline was the daughter of Robert M.Cox and Louise Johnson Cox. She was born in August 1841. They had one son, George Robert(Bob) Wrinkle born about 1863. Bob Wrinkle was my great grandfather. He married my great grandmother, Grace Johnson, about 1887. She was born in Nov. 1871 and died in Dec. 1950. They had eight children, one being my grandmother Jennie Wrinkle Williams.

Wrinkle families appear on the earliest census records of Louisiana. They settled in the Kisatchie Bayou area of Natchitoches Parish. They owned a lot of property in this area. Following the civil war, of which John Wray and brother Abraham David were veterans, the Wrinkle family holdings in this area were sold and the families dispersed. After John Wray died, his widow, Angeline, later married Billy Cole, and settled in Kinder, Louisiana.

My great grandfather Bob, and great grandmother Grace lived out of Kinder on the Calcasieu River on what is now the Old Pump Road. They were farmers and had a huge orchard. Great Grandfather Bob must have been a colorful character from some of the stories I have been told about him. One story that I heard and think is so funny was what he had to say about a couple of his son-in-laws. He told someone that the devil owed him a debt, and paid him back with son-in-laws. My Grandmother Jennie was not yet married, so my Grandfather Bryon Williams wasn't part of the pay off. Great Grandfather Bob and my Grandfather Bryon did get on very well I have been told.


