


FLOOD!

LAKE CHARLES, LOUISIANA MAY 17 - 27 A PICTORIAL STORY TEN DAYS OF DISASTER



The ten days from May 17 to May 27, 1953, were disastrous days for the people of Lake Charles, Louisiana. During that period, the worst flood in 40 years rose to its destructive peak and then slowly ebbed from the city and surrounding area. There was high water before the flood and it remained high for some time after, but those were the ten days that will be remembered for generations to come. At the flood's peak, some 15,000 of the city's approximately 50,000 residents were homeless. When it ebbed, it left damage estimated in the millions. Miraculously, there was only one fatality - a miracle which officials said was made possible by the swift and united cooperation of the entire community which mobilized overnight for rescue and rehabilitation work. This booklet is an attempt to tell the pictorial story of that disaster and of the magnificient conduct of the men and women who rose to meet it.





When, for the first time in 40 years, the river really ran amok, it hit Oakdale, far up stream, at first...




. . . And, widening as it rose, spread on out and overflowed into the town of Kinder on down river.



From up-river the warnings grew grim and tense as the river waters inched toward the city...




. . . And, heeding the warnings, some streets and roads were closed, purely as a safety measure.

. . . And putting those refugee families to quick flight by boat - on down into Lake Charles. . .






The flood noose slowly tightened around the city, closing many state and federal highways...
