

Some Youngs and LeJeunes Submitted by: Ethel Fontenot Sacker

There's an old cemetery located off of highway 26 in Mittie, Allen Parish, Louisiana, known as the Old Young Cemetery. Only two marked graves are still found, but apparently at a much earlier time, there were many more graves. Time and the elements have destroyed all but these two.

The two remaining marked graves are: Julian Young b. 1802; d.1894 and his daughter: Louvinia Young b. May 1840 d. Oct. 1881

Supposedly the Cemetery was located not far from the Old Julian Young Home Place. Louvinia Young's name is found spelled in 2-3 different ways: Lovenia seems to be the most used spelling, although her grave marker has Louvinia. She was married to Andrew J. Young.

Searching the Simmons Cemetery between Oberlin and Mittie, Lovenia Young's grave is listed with no dates. Next to her is the grave of Andre Young b. Aug. 18, 1832 d. Mar. 3, 1920. His grave is marked (CSA Vet, Pvt. Co. A. 28 La Inf.) H/o Lovenia Young. Other members of her family are located in the same area of Simmons Cemetery.

Having LeJeune blood flowing in my veins, and being somewhat familiar with the interchangable use of "Young" and "LeJeune" surnames, I became a little fascinated by the tale of the Old Young Cemetery, with it's two lonely graves. Much has been written about the changes made in the LeJeune and Young names. My early ancestors were known as LeJeunes: Rodolph LeJeune born in 1860, in Church Point, LA, was my great grandfather (on my father's mother's side). Tracing the line back from him, I find the families were called LeJeune. So my family line stuck with the LeJeune version of the name.

According to research, Lovenia Young was the daughter of Julian (Julius) Young and Louise Eliza LeJeune Young. Julian and Louise Eliza were married Sept. 25, 1827 in St. Landry Catholic Church. Julian's birth is listed as Aug. 23, 1806 in St. Landry Parish, La, and his name is listed as LeJeune. His death is listed as 1894 in Mittie, La, with name recorded on his grave marker as: Julian Young.

Julian was the son of :Joseph Ozier LeJeune and Euphrosine Carrier. Joseph's name is found as LeJeune in some earlier documents, and as Young in others. So the names were used interchangably for many years, and evolved over as many years, resulting in thousands of Joseph's descendants now being Youngs instead of LeJeunes. From some information sources, it appears that the name change was an "accident" which started at the taking of the 1810 census. The census taker seems to have translated LeJeune to Young, since the French word "Jeune" really means "young" in English. The family of Joseph's brother, Blaise, was not affected by this name change.

So in my limited research of the Youngs and LeJeunes, brought about by my interest in the Old Young Cemetery, I found that I am indeed related to Louvinia/Lovenia Young. Family Tree Maker relationship calculator figures I am 2nd. Cousin 4 times removed.

Family Tree of Julian LeJeune/Young and Louise Eliza LeJeune Young:

Julian Young was born: 23 July 1806 in Post of Opelousas, St. Landry Parish, Louisiana, and died 1894 in Mittie, Allen Parish, Louisiana. He was buried in Old Young Cemetery, Mittie, Allen Parish, Louisiana.

He was the son of Joseph Ozier LeJeune and Euphrosine Carrier.

He married Louise Eliza LeJeune Young on 25 Sept. 1827 in St. Landry Catholic Church, St. Landry Parish, Louisiana.

Children of Julian LeJeune Young and Louise Eliza LeJeune Young are:

- 1. Louiza Young b. 20 Nov. 1828 St. Landry, LA d. 10 Mar. 1886 in Calcasieu, LA. She married Jacob C. Simmons in 1844.

- 3. Amanda Young b. 18 Mar. 1833 in St. Landry, LA d. --- -married: Ezra Moss
- 4. Emilie Elizabeth Young b. 20 Jan. 1836 in St. Landry, LA d. 1908 in Allen Parish, LA. She married: Alexander Stine. They are buried: Simmons Cemetery.
- 5. Francois Stephen Young b. 2 Apr. 1838 in St. Landry, LA d. 28 Apr. 1902 in Allen Parish, LA. He married: Nancy J. Morrow.
- 6. Levina Young b. 11 Jan. 1840 in St. Landry, LA. d. Oct. 1881 in Mittie, LA She married: Andrew J. Young
- 7. Susanne Young b. Jan. 1842 in Calcasieu Parish, LA
- 8. Austin Young b. 25 June 1844 in Calcasieu Parish, LA. d. 24 Jan. 1923 in Beauregard Parish, LA. He married Nancy Thompson.

Early Overland Migratory Routes to Alabama

There were two primary overland routes used by Pioneers to move into the area now known as Alabama, the Federal Road and the Huntsville Road. In 1806, a horse path for postal riders through a Malaria-infested wilderness, was opened through the Creek Nation, stretching from middle Georgia to Coastal Alabama. It was widened into a military road starting in 1811 in anticipation of the War of 1812, running from Fort Wilkinson near Milledgeville, Georgia to Fort Stoddert at the Mount Vernon Landing on the Mobile River, just east of present day Mount Vernon, Alabama. The Federal Road carried thousands of pioneers and directly contributed to the dramatic increase in Alabama's population between 1810 and 1820.

The Federal Road was a major influence in the settlement of the Mississippi Territory during the period between the Louisiana Purchase and the removal of the Creek Indians.

The Huntsville Road was the main thoroughfare for settlers coming from the Tenneessee Valley into Alabama, running from Huntsville through Blountsville, Jonesborough and Bucksville into Tuscaloosa.

Many of the pioneers who settled in Mississippi and those who migrated on into Louisiana used one of these routes, thus they are extremely important to researchers of this area.

Kinder, Louisiana Smittie Says: By Elmer Smith

60 YEARS AGO

(1929)

Coming from almost every parish in Southwest Louisiana and with some from out of the state, members of the Chachere family, pioneer Louisiana family, held their annual meeting Saturday in Kinder at the Nolle Chachere farm.

Nearly 200 people, representing an age scope from infant to octogenarian, were present.

James O. Chachere of Opelousas was continued as president of the family association and the A. R. Burleigh place (the old Chachere home) in Opelousas, was selected as the next meeting place, August 25 is the regular date of the meeting.

It took two 16-month old calves, which dressed weighed 440 pounds, to feed the large gathering. The meat was skillfully barbecued by Madison Langley of Kinder.

In addition to the barbecue, 100 pounds of cakes, 100 loaves of bread, 100 gallons of lemonade, many gallons of coffee and a large amount of pickles were required.

A whole case of lemons was used, 490 in number, to make the large tank of lemonade.

The Chachere farm in Kinder is an ideal location for an out-of-door meeting, plenty of shade, long tables with seats, and two large barbeque ovens having been built for such occasions. One particularly interesting feature of the farm is a pen of about 100 wild ducks, which waddle around as unafraid as tame ducks.

Concerning the age of the custom of family meetings, James O. Chachere mentioned that the meetings had been going on before the time of his father who was born in 1801.

He was pleased with the number of his kinfolk who came from many parishes to be present, and is ready to begin work on the next meeting.

"Uncle Jim", as all who know him term Mr Chachere, is 84 years old. His philosophy of life is one of "don't worry", for he believes that worry kills more people and shortens more lives than anything else.

Directions to cemetery:

Going west on Hwy 190 from Kinder towards LeBlanc, turn right on Cappel Road. This road will dead end. Turn left and go over the bridge. The black top road will take a right, but stay straight-go on the gravel road. This road will take a sharp right. Proceed about 10 miles. There is barely anything but woods. Eventually there will be a clearing for power lines. Look to the left. The cemetery is situated about a block off the gravel road.
