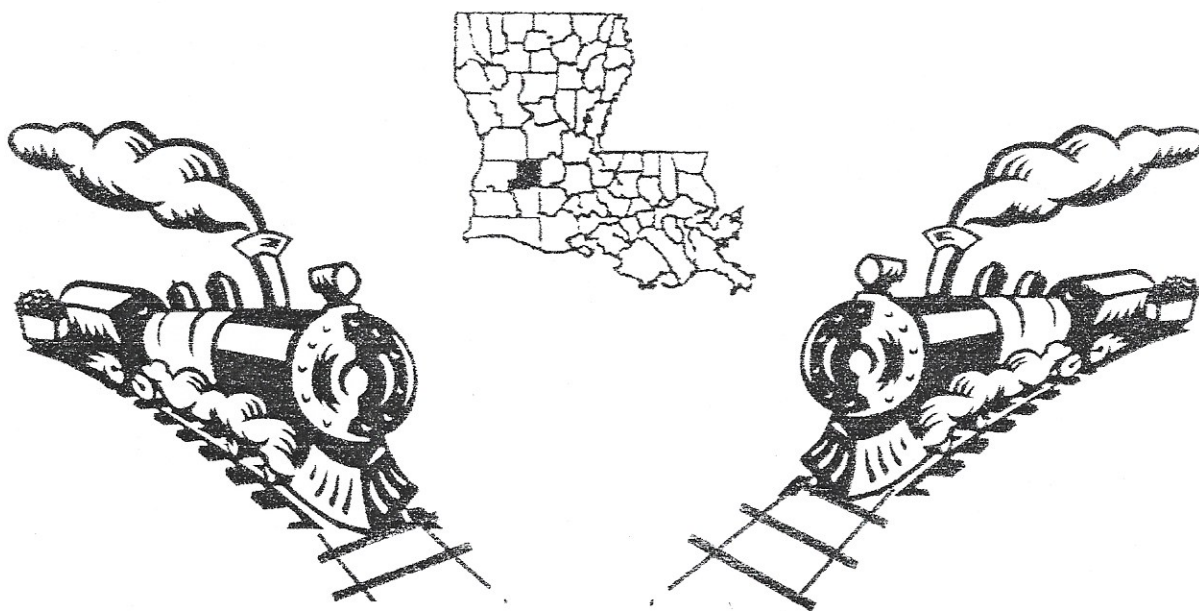

Old Imperial Calcasieu  
"First Patient"  
American Press Lake Charles, LA  
April 30, 1938

One Saturday morning more than 30 years ago there came a team of horses madly tearing out of the alley that still exists, leading from the courthouse to Pujoe Street along side the old Dr. E.J. Lyons home, now converted into a small hotel.

In the days when horses and wagons did all the hauling and delivering we had almost daily exhibitions of exciting runaways. Some ended up with only a smashed wheel or smaller loss. Others ended up disasteriously.

This happened to be a high spirited team hitched to one of the L.C.I.L. & W.W. Co. (Lake Charles Ice, Light, & Water Works), ice wagons and driven by Frank Mathis. He was driving through the Alley that morning between high growing weeds. One of the horses switched his tail into a bush inhabited by a big Wasp nest. The pests came out en masse and before Frank could get control, the horses were gone!

Pujo Street, at the end of this alley, had been paved just a short time before. When the team hit the pavement the horses couldn't keep their footing. They fell and skidded clear across the street. One hit his head against the opposite curb and was killed instantly. The other pulled through.

Frank was thrown out when the wheel broke. He landed in a pile of paving brick that had been laid aside by the paving contractor. His ankle turned and broke. He was rushed to the Sanitarium and found later he was St. Patrick's first patient

It crippled Frank for life. He worked for 10 or 11 years after. His foot kept getting worse, finally reached the point where he couldn't work anymore. That's why he is seen on crutches today. He still suffers considerable agony at times from the old break.

## THE LEBLANC FAMILY REUNION – by Ethel Sacker

It was a strange area. I had never been there before. As I traveled down the country road, following directions, my anticipation grew. I was looking for the Ouiskachitto Methodist Retreat Center outside of LeBlanc, La. Now, LeBlanc is such a small community, one could hardly get lost, but strange surroundings usually give that 'lost' feeling. To my right, I finally saw a large sign telling me to turn right or east, to get to the Retreat Center. Gradually I entered a beautiful, wooded section, and came to a large, overhead sign telling me I was entering the Retreat Grounds. It was a beautiful sight. There were rustic buildings scattered back in the woods, so I drove on until I saw several cars parked near a large, rambling building. That was it; that was where the LeBlanc Family reunion was to be held. Although I was not a LeBlanc descendant, I had been invited by a friend, and since family reunions are a weakness of mine, I decided not to miss this one.

This was only the second time to hold the LeBlanc Family reunion at this location, and I could see why it was unanimously chosen by the group. The large meeting/dining room was equipped with a separate kitchen, and volunteer groups from the Center had prepared the food and made all the arrangements for serving all those LeBlancs and their friends and families. Large family type tables were already set, family style, with stacks of eating plates, glasses, and flat ware. At the far end of the large room was a stage, equipped with a PA System. Display tables were set up with family books, pictures, and presentation posters.

I quickly found my friend Brenda Fuselier, and she began introducing me around. I met Mary LeBlanc Nevels, who has done much research on the LeBlanc family, and is doing her family history book in a very unique "Scrap-Book" fashion, with many pictures and documents. She had three large albums filled with pages and pages (in chronological order) of her line of the LeBlanc family going back to John Peton LeBlanc (1811) and Denise Fruge of St. Martins Parish, La. Mary stated that much of her research was done by interviewing relatives and acquaintances, seeking pictures, stories, and any documents possible. She roamed through Cemeteries, gathering names, dates, and histories. And looking through her book, it was evident that she was very successful in her treasure hunts. Mary was taking orders for her book which she plans to publish soon. Ann Bruning, who helps organize and head the Reunion, was everywhere, visiting with people, keeping things running smoothly, and generally seeing about everyone.

Upon finding out that I was associated with the Allen Parish Genealogical Society, many people began visiting with me and discussing family genealogy. I learned so much about this LeBlanc family line; especially how knowledgeable people are of their heritage. Many of the ancestors of this group are buried in the LeBlanc Cemetery located not far from the Retreat Center. It is an interesting cemetery filled with history.

Lunch was served in the old-fashioned way. Everyone was told to be seated at a table, to help themselves to the plates, glasses, and flatware, and they would be served by the volunteers, who were mostly young people. Food was brought to the tables in large platters and bowls; and the food was passed on from person to person at that table. Conversation was animated, and the atmosphere was relaxed and friendly. I got the impression that much reminiscing was going on in everyone's mind.

After lunch, a program was started by Ann Bruning. Names were drawn and door prizes were given out; family groups were assembled for family pictures, with a spokesman for

each group to identify each person and which ancestor they were representing. Many pictures were taken. I noticed many notes being taken in the audience.

Next came special speakers with brief histories of their LeBlanc family line. Mary LeBlanc Nevels spoke on her pending book, with emphasis on her direct ancestor, Louis Loni LeBlanc, who married Marie Louise Bureau/Buro.

Brenda Fuselier gave a brief talk on her connections to the LeBlanc family, including a graphic display of the lineage.

To my surprise, I was called on next, to talk on my work in Genealogy, and my interest in the LeBlanc Family Reunion. A genuine interest was shown by the group as I expressed a desire to write an article on this family reunion for a future issue of the 'CrossRoads' Quarterly Publication of Allen Genealogical & Historical Society. Of course I signed up for one of Mary LeBlanc's books. It will be a unique addition to our Library in Kinder.

The LeBlanc Family Reunion will be held every two (2) years (on the odd years) at the Retreat Center in LeBlanc It is a truly heart-warming experience, as are most family reunions. These gatherings are important in keeping families in touch, and helping form bonds with the younger generations.

LeBlanc – A Brief Acadian History – excerpts from "Origin of LeBlancs"

An Ancestor who knew the family of LeBlanc was Pierre of Grand Pre. He was born in 1719. With the help of Jacques LeBlanc & Elizabeth Boudrot, all of them came from Grand Pre. Later a marriage took place on Oct. 4, 1745, where Pierre married Marie Madeleine Babin, the daughter of Joseph Babin & Angelique Landry. They raised a large family of 10 Acadian children. In the dispersion, the family was deported to Salem, Mass. After the great deportation, and wandering in Exile for a decade, Pierre and his friend Francois Doucet returned to Acadie to the Bay St. Marie, arriving in the Spring of 1771. They were so discouraged by the rocky coastline and uncleared land of Pointe-de-L'Eglise; so unlike the fertile homelands the British stole from them, and the loss of their people who had been deported, that the men broke down and wept. To help bring this group together, Madeleine, Pierre's daughter, took an axe and cut down the first tree.

"We've cried enough", she said, "Now let's build a shelter for the evening." They were all encouraged by these words, and quickly constructed a place to spend the night.

Later, in 1775, they received land, a total of 1735 arpents.

Before the Expulsion, they were farmers, but because of poor soil and heavily forested land, they became lumberjacks and wood-workers.

So the first families to come to the Pointe de L'Eglise (Church Point), Nova Scotia, were the LeBlanc and Doucet families.

(Jacques' father was also named Jacques LeBlanc, and his father was Daniel LeBlanc, the father of the LeBlancs in Acadia.)

Ignace Rhodrigues critically ill

Ignace Rhodrigues, who has been critically ill for the past ten days, is not expected to live throughout the day. He has been in a coma for the past several days.

LCAP – July 02, 1935

I. RHODRIGUES Funeral Service 4 this afternoon.

Ignace Rhodrigues, 84, died yesterday evening at 7:40 at his home at 501 Lawrence, corner of Hodges, following a two week illness. The immediate cause of death was pneumonia, which developed a few days ago.

Funeral services will be held at 4 o'clock this afternoon at the Church of the Immaculate Conception, the Rev. Mathias Cramers, assistant pastor, officiating. Interment will be in Graceland cemetery, directed by Burke and Trotti. Pallbearers will be; Lennox Brown, Henry Buller, Donald Hagan, Jack Perkins, Athan Coe, Fred T. Smith.

Mr. Rhodrigues was a member of a New Orleans family, his father a Spaniard, and his mother a Frenchwoman, having moved to that city from Europe upon their marriage. He was born in Madisonville at his parents' country home.

During the War Between the States, his father and eldest brother serving with the Confederacy, his mother moved with him to Rapids Parish, near what is now the Community of Canton. Reaching manhood he moved to old Calcasieu Parish 60 years ago, and in which he has since resided.

Fifty-eight years ago last March he was wedded to Theresa Hebert, daughter of the late Francois and Denise Miller Hebert, founders of the Hebert Settlement, north of Iowa, where they moved from near Opelousas.

Mr. Rhodrigues spent the larger part of his active life as a timber and log man on the Calcasieu river.

Besides his wife, he is survived by one son, Frank Rhodrigues of Lake Charles, and four daughters; Mrs. Adam Buller of Iowa, Mrs. Frank A. Smith of Lake Charles, Mrs. Frank J. Hixon of Turrell, Ark., Mrs. H. J. Jessen of DeQuincy, and the following grandchildren: Henry Buller of Iowa, J. Bryant Horne, Jackson, Miss., Mrs. W.L. Brown, Alexandria, Mrs. Dr. Raymond Wallace of Knoxville, Tenn., Fred T. Smith of Lake Charles; Margaret Jessen, DeQuincy; Bernice Buller of Iowa; Harold Rhodrigues, Lake Charles; four great-grandchildren also survive.

\*\*Genealogical Note:

There is much family history in the obituary of Ignace Rhodrigues, which includes the Hebert, Hagan, Buller, Gordon, LeBlanc & Coe families. Next issue of CrossRoads will attempt to follow up on connections to these family lines.

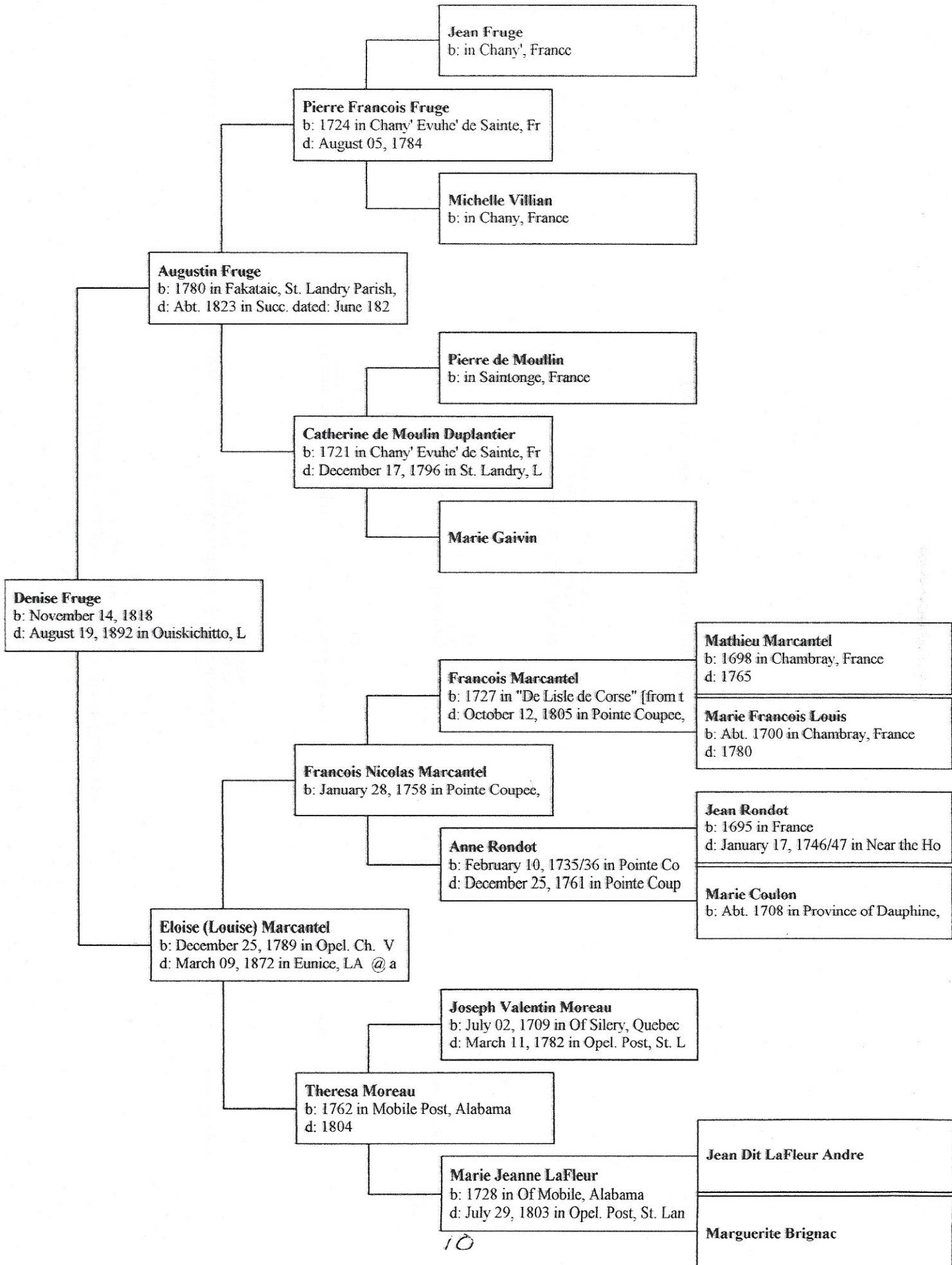

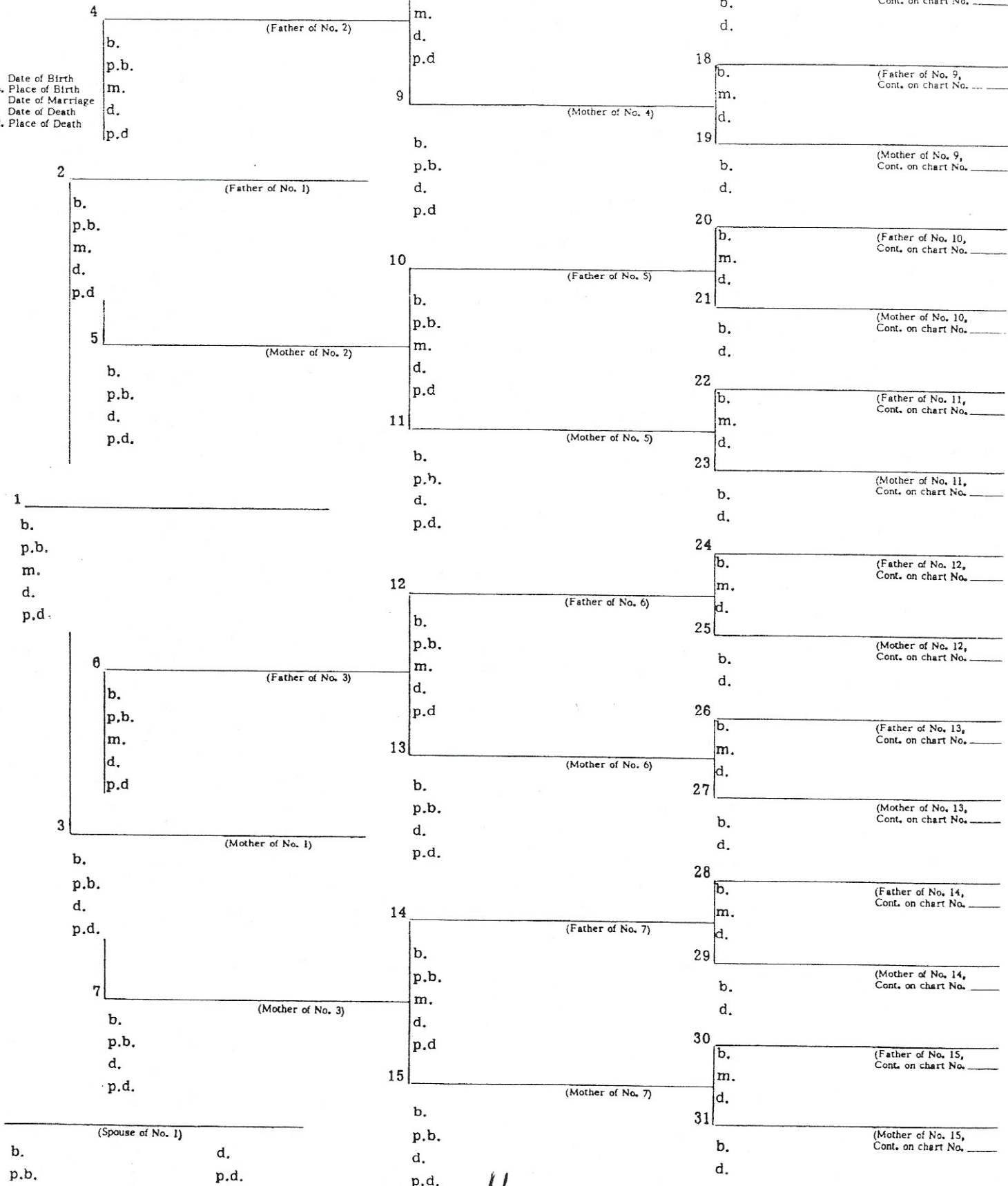
