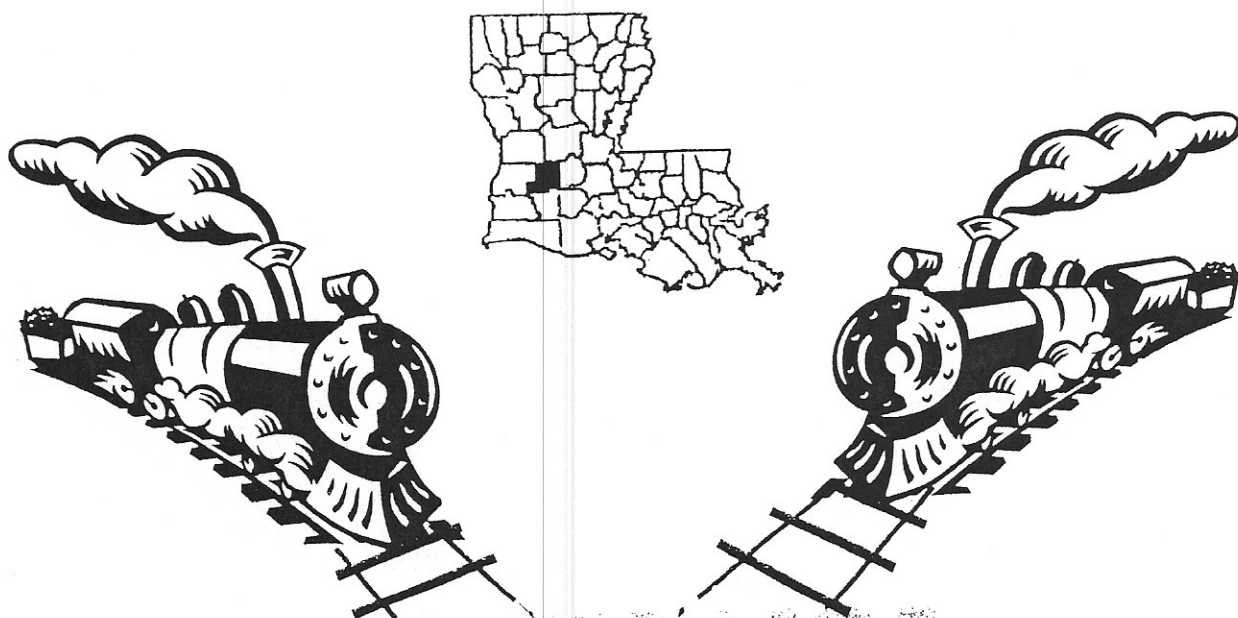

Welch, Buckley, Addison, Langton, Cryer, Calhoun, Bass, Whitley My family name is Welch, and my grandfather originally came to Vernon Parish from Oakdale. The oldest town in Allen Parish is Oberlin, Louisiana, incorporated in February, 1900, while still a part of Imperial Calcasieu Parish. A group of farm settlers from Oberlin, Ohio, bought land near the present site, but a couple miles west near the Calcasieu River at Oaklin Springs. They believed a railroad was coming through that area. When the railroad reached this area, some where in the 1890s, it was only a "turnaround" for trains to turn around and steam back to Lake Charles. The Watkins rail line was extended to Oakdale in 1893. Trains only ran six days a week because business could not be transacted on Sunday.

The first post office was established at Oaklin Springs in 1890 with Miss Reullas Binton of Oakdale as the first postmistress (a temporary position). Charles Powers was later installed as postmaster. A small school, church, and general store were added. In 1891, the streets for the present Oberlin were laid out, and Oberlin eventually became the Parish Seat in 1912, with it's beautiful, historic Court House, now on the National Historical Register.

### ***Wedded at the Fireproof Altar***

Taken from the Lake Charles Daily Advertizer, Feb. 11, 1903

The Court House was dedicated for matrimonial purposes last evening when Johnnie Marcantel led to the altar, typified in this instance by Doc Gill's desk, Miss Dora Martin.

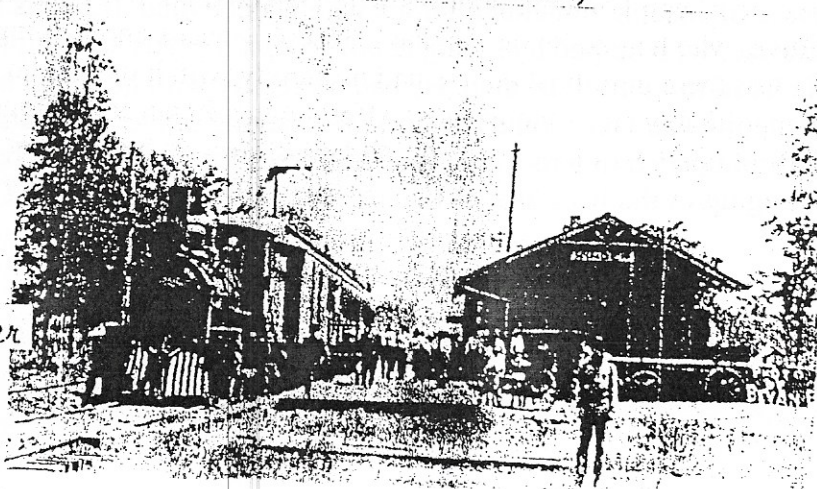
The young people came in on the Watkins train and proceeded at once to Clerk Gill's office. After the usual amount of grumbling and warnings, as to the risk they were running, Mr. Gill made out the regular permit. Believing that the genial clerk had all power in the matter, they asked him to perform the ceremony, but Gill called in Judge Wasey to act as his substitute. Quite a little crowd of spectators had gathered but the young people were too happy to care. After the ceremony the witnesses congratulated them and Mr. and Mrs. Marcantel went on their way rejoicing.

## Fontenot Family Cemetery

Friday February 15, 2002

Interview with Dennis Fontenot, son of Earl Fontenot and Laura Belle Lafleur.

Subject: Fontenot Family Cemetery; south of Kinder, LA on Hwy. 165

Bill Fawcett and I had made an appointment to see Dennis at his home. He and his wife, Dee, had just moved into his father's home on East Parish Line Road. Earl Fontenot, the son of Armand "Gisson" Fontenot, died on Oct. 28, 2001, and Laura Belle, daughter of Leon LaFleur and Ozite Ortego LaFleur, is in the Care Center at this writing. Dennis and his wife were most gracious and very willing to share their memories and history. Bill and I were especially interested in the history of the Old Fontenot Cemetery located on Fontenot Property on Highway 165, about 3 miles south of Kinder. The State of Louisiana began buying up property along Hwy. 165 in 1993, in order to widen the highway from I-10 to and through Kinder, so the Cemetery had to be moved.

Arrangements began with the Fontenot family in March 1993 to re-locate the graves to Carter Cemetery. Permits and signatures had to be obtained from all family members concerned. By March of 1994, all was in order, so the graves were moved to a special section of Carter Cemetery on Park Road in Kinder. It poured down raining on that first day, so it took a day or two, to complete the move. Dennis Fontenot said he was one of the family witnesses to the actual moving of the graves. The whole cemetery was placed in Carter in the exact same order as the graves were in the Fontenot Cemetery. A special place was designated in the East section of Carter so that all the Fontenot graves could be placed in one area.

The Fontenot Cemetery was started when Joseph Fontenot's wife, Mary Daleda "Daledé" Langley, died in 1928. She was first buried behind the house. Dennis said she was buried in a pine box for her coffin. That was pretty much the custom at that time. Later, when Emma, a daughter, died, it was decided to designate a section on the South side of the home for a grave-yard for other family members. So Daleda's grave was moved to this site. That was in 1931.

A son, Severin Fontenot, died in the war in 1914, but his body wasn't brought home until later; he was then buried in The Fontenot Cemetery. Through the years, as other family members died, they were buried in this Fontenot family Cemetery, ending up with 17 graves all together.

Dennis related the story of a man called "Nonc" Adam Langley, who came to live in the home of Joseph Fontenot after his wife Daledé died. It seems Nonc Adam was a distant relative, who helped by seeing about Joseph's needs and helping out around the grounds. He lived there until he died. He had no family with him, and he enjoyed going to Chatagnier to visit some friends. After having dinner in Chatagnier one night, he sat on the front porch in a rocking chair, and died. He was brought back to Gisson's house sitting up in the back seat of the car with his hat on his head. Of course this created much

excitement around the neighborhood. This story has been told and retold in the family many times with much French humor. Adam was first buried in the Fontenot Cemetery.

Dennis told about the large dipping vat that was located on the north side of Joseph Fontenot's property. It was used for cattle dipping for that entire area. The cattle would be rounded up by horsemen and herded to the dipping vat on that big day, and Telisma Fontenot, son of Joseph and Daleda Langley Fontenot, was the chief range rider for the event, along with other riders.

Dennis related that after the vat was abandoned and destroyed, nothing green would grow in that section of ground. He figured it might be because the solution used as dip was so strong!

b. 23 April 1892 d. 06 February 1914. Killed in World War 1. His body was brought back to the States later; and he was buried in the Fontenot Family Cemetery. Reburied in Carter Cemetery.
4. Cora Mae Doise (5 year old daughter of Angeles and Alidia Bushnell Doise)  
b. 1913 d. 1918 Reburied in Carter Cemetery.
5. Lena Saucier McCauley Fontenot ( wife of Joseph Telisma Fontenot)  
b. 15 February 1904 d. 26 May 1936 Reburied in Carter Cemetery.  
She was the daughter of Joe Saucier, Jr. and Marie Vize Manuel Saucier.
6. Adam Langley (husband of Ophelia Doise)  
b. 17 November 1863 d. 24 December 1939 Reburied in LeBleu Cemetery, in Fenton, LA. Adam was the son of Eli (Hilaire) Langley and Malina LeBlanc.  
Ophelia was the daughter of Augustin Doise and Pauline Lafargue.
7. Walter Duplechain (known as "Tse Nome"; husband of Edith Lafleur)  
b. 29 August 1905 d. 30 September 1940 Reburied in Green Oak Cemetery  
He was the son of Polan Duplechain, Sr. and Julieen Marceneau Duplechain.
8. Joseph Fontenot (husband of Marie Daleda Langley Fontenot)  
b. 18 October 1863 d. 27 November 1947 Reburied in Carter Cemetery.  
He was the son of: Alexandre and Marguerite Doise Fontenot.
9. Ward Paul Fontenot, Sr. (husband of Jeanette Darbonne)  
b. 26 May 1926 d. 04 December 1947 Reburied in Carter Cemetery.  
He was the son of Armand and Lydia Sonnier Fontenot.
10. Angeles Doise (husband of Alidia Bushnell Doise)  
b. 01 July 1873 d. 28 May 1952 Reburied in Carter Cemetery.  
He was the son of : Christoval and Hermina Fontenot Doise.  
Alidia Bushnell was daughter of: Pierre Hardy and Alidia Veillon Bushnell.

11. Ralph Adam Nicholas (husband of Mae Fontenot )  
 b. 2 June 1882 d. 28 May 1955 Reburied in Oaklin Springs Cemetery, Oberlin, LA

 Mary Courville) b. 09 August 1898 d. 02 January 1956 Reburied in Carter Cemetery.

## Last day of school at Oaklin Springs

From LCDAP-May 2, 1910

Located near Oberlin, Allen Parish, Louisiana

The Oaklin Springs School closed Friday after one of the most successful seven months work that has ever been done at this place, so the patrons have agreed.

At the beginning of the term the pupils were graded and afterwards the course of study was closely followed. Considering the fact that this was the children's first work in a graded school, the teacher, Miss Gay Lyles, wishes to say that they did well, although only the following named 15 out of 33 enrolled, were promoted: Johnnie Gill, Brooks Burnitt, Edith Burnitt, Hamilton Garland, Clarence Payne, Mary Gill, Eusebe Brown, Della Brown, Edward Garland, Vesta Lyles, Johnnie Brown, Margaret Brown, Edward Burnitt, Maggie Garland and Elias Brown.

Two little prizes were offered to the second and third grades for excellent class work, won, respectively by Della Brown and Brooks Burnitt; Vesta Lyles making the highest general average, 93 3/9 percent in examination, won first prize. The whole school had a chance to race for this, as all were forced to take examination monthly.

Mrs. J. L. Garland, one of the patrons, surprised the school and teacher on the last day by coming and bringing a most delicious dinner, which was enjoyed and appreciated by the school, teacher, and also the visitors who were present.

## Obituary of Private Eway Rider of Basile

(4-5-1949 Acadia Parish newspaper)

The body of Private Eway Rider will be returned to Basile at 1:54 p.m. Thursday, April 7, for reburial near his home. Private Rider was killed in Belgium in December 1944, just nine months after he was inducted into service in March of the same year. He was the father of five children.

Funeral services will be held at 8 o'clock Friday morning at St. Joseph's Catholic church in Basile with burial in the nearby Catholic cemetery. Military rites at the gravesite will be conducted by Rougeau Post of the American Legion of Basile.

Survivors are his wife, the former Lucy Bellon; two daughters, Barbara Jane, 8 and Wilda Nell, 5; three sons, James Allen, 10, Herman Julius, 7, and Melvin Lee, 13; four brothers, Sadiou of Kinder, Willie and William of Lake Charles, and Saviou of Sulphur, and a sister, Mrs. Luke Bushnell of Kinder.
