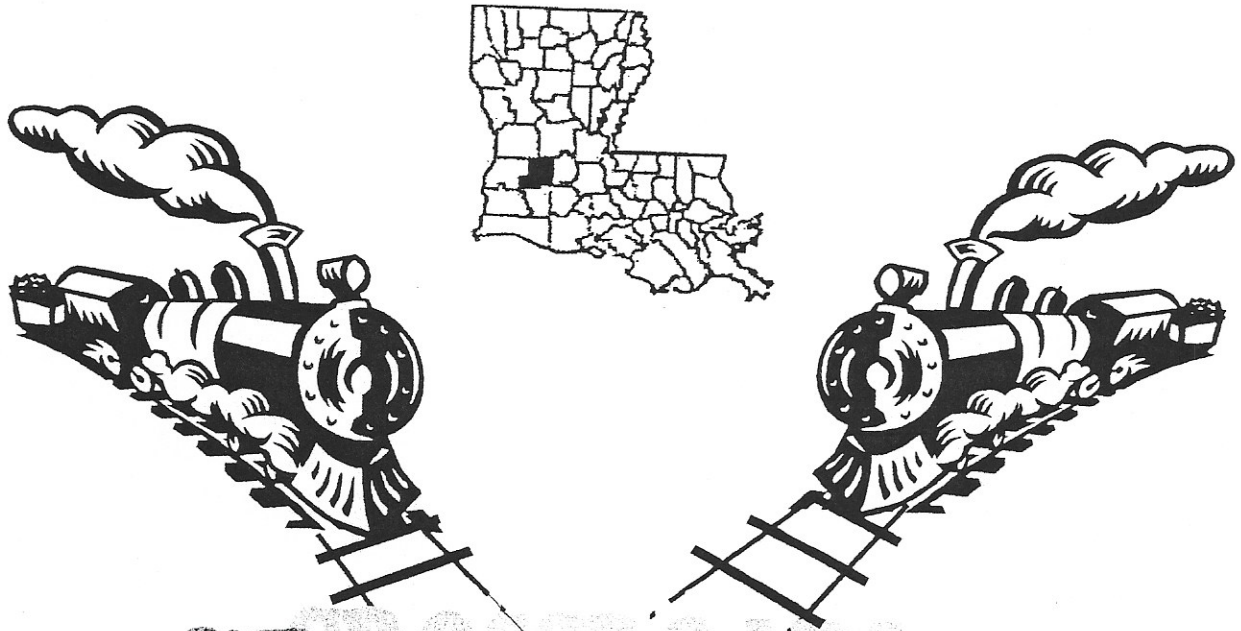

## Observations on Early Church and Judicial System

Essay submitted by Linda Durr Rudd of Jackson, MS  
A Genealogist researching and documenting her Family History  
In Copiah, Lincoln, and Jefferson Counties of MS  
She is currently transcribing the Union Presbyterian Church  
Session Records of Jefferson Co., MS for publication.

Linda has graciously given her permission for use of her Essay in CrossRoads.

### The Church and Judicial System

While going through the Union Church Presbyterian Church Session Records (1820-1865), I noticed that the Elders of the Church settled or attempted to settle immoral behavior and disputes among the members. Public drunkenness, excessive drinking, retailing intoxicating liquors on Sunday, gambling, neglecting the communion of the church, accusations of lying and being lied on, cussing, fighting, stealing, inappropriate behavior in public, unlawful marriage, allegations of rape which resulted in the birth of a child, land boundary disputes, etc, were all brought before the Session.

The Session (several church Elders) would require the accused, accuser and several witnesses to come before them on a specified date to be questioned. Absences of one or more parties would call for a delay and the Session would appoint another date. Once all parties were present, witnesses would answer questions presented by the accused and the accuser. Occasionally, the accuser and accused would question each other.

Many of these cases were resolved when the accused party admitted his guilt, asked for forgiveness, and the Elders would grant forgiveness and issue a warning not to repeat the behavior. Others ended in suspension from the church until the behavior was corrected. A couple cases ended in permanent suspension from the church. A few others were never resolved because the two opposing sides never met before the Session at the same time.

Was the Church the judicial authority in rural communities like Union Church?  
What was the norm in dealing with problems among people? Was there a judicial decision when the crime violated God's and man's law? I didn't see in the records where the Session waited on a judicial decision before making a decision or where any judicial officers were required to testify before the Session.

Excerpts from one of Rev. Paul Leeds' early Congregational Churches  
In the Allen Parish, Louisiana area.

Discipline of Church members for improper conduct  
Meeting of Feb. 9, 1913

At the close of the morning service the church was called to order for the regular Business Meeting. After prayer, the question of church discipline was brought to the attention of the church and the names of C. Buller, Mrs. Mary Bushnell and Monroe Perkins were considered; and by vote of the church these three were suspended for 3 months from fellowship, until they gave satisfactory evidence of repentance and made full confession. The following officers were elected:

Deacon (to succeed C. Buller)	Emile Buller
Trustee (to succeed M.J. Perkins)	Ivans Bushnell
Clerk	Frank J. Nevils
Treas.	Pierre Nevils, Sr.
Deaconess	Mrs. J.B. Baker

Some comments by researchers of Church Discipline:

"While the Church had only the threat of loss of church membership to back their wishes, in a small rural community that could have a very strong effect on the person's whole life style. That person may not be welcome in most of the community homes, as it was feared that the sinful person would entice others into their un-churchly ways".

"Church discipline was just that—for church members only, and resulted in warning of removal from fellowship or suspension, or expulsion by the church—not legal action. To be "brought up before the Church on charges" was at the least embarrassing", and was only bound by their desire to retain fellowship".

Although these customs have just about faded out, each Church Organization still has it's Policies and Rules of Conduct.

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Excerpt from Rev. Paul Leeds' Indian Village Congregational Church of Earlier Years  
Indian Village, located near Kinder, Louisiana

Meeting of January 22, 1911

After prayer, minutes of last meeting were read, report of Treasurer was given showing financial work done the past year. It was the first year in the history of the church in which any systematic financial work was done. Pastor was paid \$34.20 salary for the year; song books—\$3.00; Lamp Oils, etc—\$5.00. Some money was raised during the year by box socials. By general consent it was decided that the ladies should set a hen and sell chickens, giving the proceeds to the church building fund, and that the men should fatten a hog for the same purpose

After prayer, the meeting was adjourned.

Richard Eugene Oden, Allen Parish, Louisiana

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Richard Eugene Oden, sheriff and ex-officio tax collector of Allen Parish, has been three times elected to that office, and has enjoyed a number of other official honors and responsibilities. His participation in public affairs began while he was busily engaged in the practice of medicine and surgery, and in late years he has largely given over his professional career.

Doctor Oden was born on a farm in Talladega County, Alabama, November 4, 1866, son of John Lafayette and Nancy Elizabeth (West) Oden, both natives of the same locality. His mother died at the age of fifty. His father was a Confederate soldier, was a farmer and planter in Alabama and in 1876 moved to Louisiana, where he continued the same occupation until his death at the age of seventy-six.

Richard Eugene Oden was three years of age when his parents moved to St. Landry Parish, and he finished his early education in the common schools of that parish and Avoyelles Parish, also attended school at Auburn, Alabama, and at Fort Gibson, Mississippi. He completed his preparations for his professional work in the Louisville Medical College, where he was graduated Doctor of Medicine in 1892. Doctor Oden for a brief time practiced in Rapides Parish, three years in St. Landry Parish, and in 1896 moved to Kinder, Calcasieu Parish, where he performed all the offices and duties of a capable country physician for twenty years or more. For twelve years he was mayor of Kinder.

After Allen Parish was created, his home at Kinder made him a citizen of the new parish, and in 1916 he was elected for his first term as sheriff and tax collector. He was reelected in 1920 and 1924, and has since given practically all his time to his official duties at the county seat at Oberlin. During the war he served as a member of the Allen Parish Draft Board, and he is a member of the Sheriff's Association of Louisiana.

Doctor Oden still retains his residence at Kinder, and is a member of the Masonic Lodge there. He married at Alexandria, Louisiana, in 1895, Elsie Lee Jessup, who was born and reared in Kansas. Her father is Lawrence Jessup, a veteran railroad man, who was engaged in railroading in Kansas, Oklahoma and Louisiana, and now lives retired at Kinder. Doctor and Mrs. Oden have eight children: Alma Glyn, Melva, John, Neva, Richard Eugene, Andrew Jackson, William Henry and Frederica Elizabeth. The daughter, Alma Glyn, is the wife of R. Y. Hancock, a pharmacist at Jasper, Texas.

Richard Eugene Oden, M.D.

Although born in Alabama, he spent his early life near the Atchafalaya River in St. Landry Parish. He attended Louisville Medical School in Kentucky and came to Kinder in 1898, the first doctor in this area.

He married Elsie Lee Jessup in Alexandria, Louisiana Sept. 4, 1895 (another source has year 1900).

They spent all of their married life in Kinder. He first started his practice in a large frame building on the corner of Fourth Ave. and Hwy. 165. It was destroyed by fire and replaced by him and later housed the Cappell Drug Store.

Dr. Oden was a civic leader, becoming one of Kinder's first mayor, and serving as sheriff for twelve years, from 1916-1928.

He and Mrs. Oden had eight children: four daughters, and four sons.

Richard Eugene Oden, Jr. died in action in WW11 in US Navy on July 4, 1943 (in Battle of Kula Gulf in the Pacific. He was "lost at sea".

Fredericka Elizabeth Oden

Dr. Oden was the typical "Horse and Buggy" doctor, taking care of the sick under adverse conditions.

He died Dec. 9, 1932, and his wife died Jan. 17, 1963.

Both are buried in the Kinder Cemetery with some of their children.

*Dr. R. E. Oden, Allen Parish Coroner, Is Dead*

Kinder, La., Dec. 9.—Dr. Richard Eugene Oden, 68, coroner and former sheriff of Allen parish, died at his home in Kinder at 8:40 a.m. today.

Services will be held Sunday at 3 p.m. at the First Congregational church in Kinder, with Rev. Paul Leeds officiating, and with Masonic burial in Kinder at 3 p.m.

Dr. Oden was born in Talledega county Alabama on November 4, 1895. He was graduated from the Louisville Medical college in 1892, and since that time has practiced medicine in Rapides, St. Landry and Allen parishes.

Dr. Oden married Elsie Lee Jessup in 1895. She was born and reared in Kansas. He and his wife moved to Kinder in 1898 from St. Landry parish.

He served 12 years as mayor of Kinder, while practicing medicine there, but soon after Allen parish was created out of Old Imperial Calcasieu, in 1916, he retired from the medical profession, at which time he was elected to the office of sheriff and tax collector of Allen parish, in which office he served until 1928, being reelected in 1920 and 1924.

Dr. Oden became coroner of Allen parish in May.

During the world war Dr. Oden was a member of the Allen parish draft board.

Dr. Oden is survived by his wife, and eight children, Mrs. R. Y. Hancock of Jasper, Texas; Mrs. L. W. Pruitt, of Sulphur; John L. Oden, of Lawrenceburg, Ind.; and Neva, Fredericka, R. E. Jr., Jack, and William Oden, all of Kinder.

# U.S. Cadet Nurse Corps - World War 11

The Cadet Nurse Corps was a massive and important federal program for the training of American Nurses during the Second World War. In the few years (1943-1948) of the program's existence, it graduated some 124,000 nurses at a time when nursing services were especially crucial to the nation. Most of the cadets went on to have productive careers in the nursing profession, making valuable contributions to health care in the United States.

The administration of the program was vested in the Public Health Service, under the leadership of Lucile Petry.

This law gave women as young as 17 years of age the opportunity to serve their country in uniform as nurses. The Recruiting slogans "A Lifetime Education-Free" and "The Girl with a Future, Be a Cadet Nurse" appealed to young high school graduates.

To become cadet nurses, young people—mostly young women—first enrolled in state-approved schools of nursing participating in the Corps program. When they joined the Corps, tuition, books, a stipend, and a uniform were provided. In return they promised to serve as nurses for the duration of the War, which included serving in a civilian or military hospital, the Indian Health Service, or other public health facilities.

During the years of training to be a nurse under the Cadet Nurse program, Cadets participated in Patriotic events, marching in parades in Uniform, limited drills, participating in lectures by Military Personnel, and Patriotic tours. Summer and winter uniforms were gray trimmed in red. Gray symbolized mercy, serenity and understanding; red—strength, courage and inspiration. The left sleeve patch was a symbol of the Knights of Hospitalers of St. John, and the cap bore a shield and eagle symbolically American, and a Caduceus; together these promised healing to service of their country.

World War 11 united citizens across the length and breadth of the nation in a common cause—winning the war. Women answered the call to duty with many joining the Corps and fulfilling their obligation in either civilian or military nursing. Yes, the Cadet Nurses knew there was a war on. They proudly served their country!

On the following page is a copy of Cadet Cards, from the Federal Archives of Washington, D.C., of four (4) area Cadets.

Three are from Kinder, and one from Cameron;  
Rosemary Cronan Hamilton, Jo Helen Richard, Ethel Fontenot Sacker,  
and Sybil Baccigalopi Clark.

As of the past year (2003), there is a Bill before Congress to give Veteran Status to all Cadet Nurses who completed the program. Former Cadet Nurses all over the country are rallying to support this important Bill.

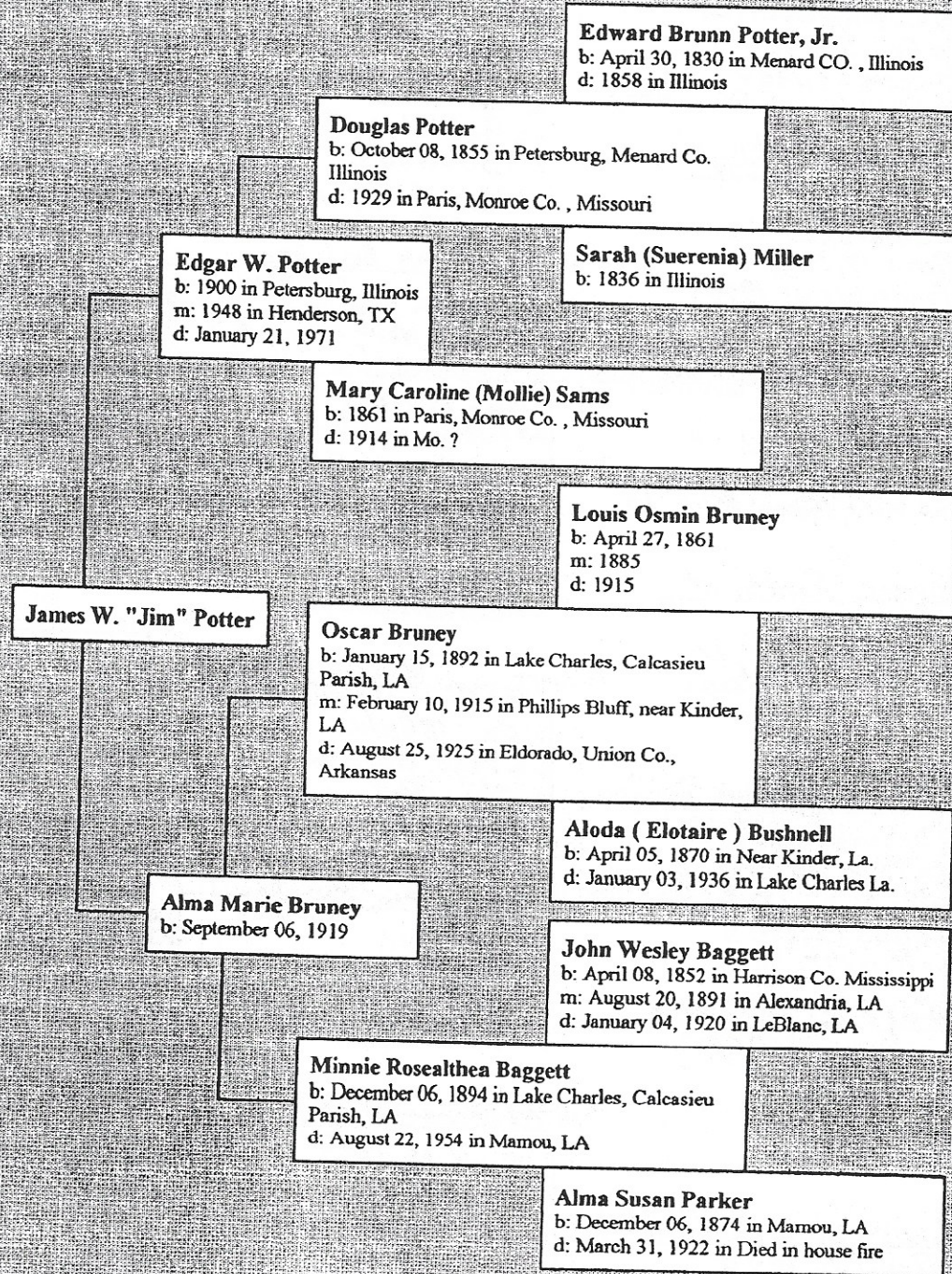
