

I was born on March 27, 1913, in the settlement of Harmony, nine miles north of Kinder, La. My parents were William and Emma Cole. I had a sister, Arrie, who was born in 1911, and the youngest in the family was my brother, Alton, born August 14, 1915. My grandmother was Angie Cole. In 1911 my father's nephew, Buddy Cole, and his brother were killed by lightning. They were sleeping under a tree when the lightning struck.

Alfred Cole, my dad's older brother and his wife came to visit the old home place. They lived across the river and had to come across by boat. They had five hundred dollars with them in a satchel. When she went to get in the boat, that was to take them to the other side, it slipped from her hand, and the strong current swept it away – never to be seen again.

The settlement of Harmony was named after a school teacher, Mr. Harmony, who taught the first school in our settlement. It was in a log house that was built in 1880. The school consisted of the first through the third grade, and the term was three months out of the year. The old log school burned down, and they built another one north of where I live now on the main road. I started to school in 1918 when I was five years old. We still had classes only three months out of the year. It would be in winter, so the children would be at home during the good weather so they could work in the fields. The teachers were not paid much, so there was little choice as to the ones we could get to teach.

They closed the school in the early twenties, and we went south three miles in a wagonette, which was a covered wagon pulled by two horses. The school was at Johnson settlement. This school was not as the previous one. The last term of the school at Johnson settlement was not very good. The train passed by in front of the school, and the teacher would get in the cab of the train with the engineer and ride off. After this they started running a school bus to Kinder High School.

The log house that I was born in was about one-half mile east of the school. My dad told me that Rev. Paul Leeds was the first preacher to come through that part of the country. He preached at the schoolhouse when my father was a boy.

The log house where I was born was on the main cattle trail. The round-up took place every year. They began the round-up as far as Gillis, and they drove the cattle north by our house toward Oberlin on the west side of the river. There was a corral there. They would brand and mark the cattle cutting out the older steers for the market. All cattle in that day was Longhorn cattle. I can remember when I was a small boy passing Mr. Bill Kingrey's slaughter pen and seeing a dozen pair of horns four feet from tip to tip.

I had a good friend named Will Platt who lived about three miles south of me. He was a good, hard working man who ran cattle on the open range from Kinder to Mittie. In 1930, while rounding up cattle he showed me a pin stump. He had hauled the log to the river on a two wheeled cart called a "Carry-All". It was the biggest log ever floated down the river to Lake Charles.

Will Platt was an excellent swimmer. In the winter, when the river was high, his mother became very ill. There was no bridge across the river, so Will swam the river to get to town to get her some medicine, and swam back, holding the medicine out of the water. He had to swim almost a mile each way. At that time the river had to be forded where the Kinder Canal Pump is located.

I remember a story told to me about my grandfather. It was about the Jay-Hawkers, a bunch of outlaws, who got together back during the Civil War. They consisted mostly of run-a-ways from the army, and criminals who got together to rob people who were older and stayed home from the war.

One day that will always be remembered by my family was when they came to rob my grandfather, William Cole. The Jay-Hawkers knew he had some gold at his house. He had five hundred dollars buried in the smokehouse. The Jaw-Hawkers tied my grandfather on a horse with a rope around his neck. They told the women if they didn't dig up the money they would hang him.

The money was dug up and he was freed. The Jaw-Hawkers burned down three big barns of corn and drove off all the stock.

Two old timers that lived on the cattle trail, told me that back in the 1920s their dad said that during the Civil War he had counted fifteen pack horses loaded with stolen goods going east toward Mamou. Another friend told me of a story he had heard. He said there was a Jaw-Hawker camp on the river near what is now the Pine Nursery at the Cole settlement.

After the Civil War was over, the south banded together and hunted down the Jaw-Hawkers. Two Jay-Hawkers were caught at Valentine Simmons home past the Cole settlement, and they were shot and then buried on the road. Later some women came and dug up the bodies and took them by wagon and buried them near Elizabeth, La. There is also some buried near Longville.

This group of out-laws terrorized this area. They has spies, both men and women, who would locate things of value and notify the criminals, and they would rob the settlers who were working hard to make an honest living.

In 1920 we built a new home on the main road. There were few cars then, sometimes it was days before one came by the house. It sure has changed today. There is a lot of cars, and our community is protected from criminals.

Some Youngs and LeJeunes Submitted by: Ethel Fontenot Sacker

There's an old cemetery located off of highway 26 in Mittie, Allen Parish, Louisiana, known as the Old Young Cemetery. Only two marked graves are still found, but apparently at a much earlier time, there were many more graves. Time and the elements have destroyed all but these two.

The two remaining marked graves are: Julian Young b. 1802; d.1894 and his daughter: Louvinia Young b. May 1840 d. Oct. 1881

Supposedly the Cemetery was located not far from the Old Julian Young Home Place. Louvinia Young's name is found spelled in 2-3 different ways: Lovenia seems to be the most used spelling, although her grave marker has Louvinia. She was married to Andrew J. Young.

Searching the Simmons Cemetery between Oberlin and Mittie, Lovenia Young's grave is listed with no dates. Next to her is the grave of Andre Young b. Aug. 18, 1832 d. Mar. 3, 1920. His grave is marked (CSA Vet, Pvt. Co. A. 28 La Inf.) H/o Lovenia Young. Other members of her family are located in the same area of Simmons Cemetery.

Having LeJeune blood flowing in my veins, and being somewhat familiar with the interchangable use of "Young" and "LeJeune" surnames, I became a little fascinated by the tale of the Old Young Cemetery, with it's two lonely graves. Much has been written about the changes made in the LeJeune and Young names. My early ancestors were known as LeJeunes: Rodolph LeJeune born in 1860, in Church Point, LA, was my great grandfather (on my father's mother's side). Tracing the line back from him, I find the families were called LeJeune. So my family line stuck with the LeJeune version of the name.

According to research, Lovenia Young was the daughter of Julian (Julius) Young and Louise Eliza LeJeune Young. Julian and Louise Eliza were married Sept. 25, 1827 in St. Landry Catholic Church. Julian's birth is listed as Aug. 23, 1806 in St. Landry Parish, La, and his name is listed as LeJeune. His death is listed as 1894 in Mittie, La, with name recorded on his grave marker as: Julian Young.

Julian was the son of Joseph Ozier LeJeune and Euphrosine Carrier. Joseph's name is found as LeJeune in some earlier documents, and as Young in others. So the names were used interchangably for many years, and evolved over as many years, resulting in thousands of Joseph's descendants now being Youngs instead of LeJeunes. From some information sources, it appears that the name change was an "accident" which started at the taking of the 1810 census. The census taker seems to have translated LeJeune to Young, since the French word "Jeune" really means "young" in English. The family of Joseph's brother, Blaise, was not affected by this name change.

So in my limited research of the Youngs and LeJeunes, brought about by my interest in the Old Young Cemetery, I found that I am indeed related to Louvinia/Lovenia Young. Family Tree Maker relationship calculator figures I am 2nd. Cousin 4 times removed.

Family Tree of Julian LeJeune/Young and Louise Eliza LeJeune Young:

Julian Young was born: 23 July 1806 in Post of Opelousas, St. Landry Parish, Louisiana, and died 1894 in Mittie, Allen Parish, Louisiana. He was buried in Old Young Cemetery, Mittie, Allen Parish, Louisiana.

He was the son of Joseph Ozier LeJeune and Euphrosine Carrier.

He married Louise Eliza LeJeune Young on 25 Sept. 1827 in St. Landry Catholic Church, St. Landry Parish, Louisiana.

Children of Julian LeJeune Young and Louise Eliza LeJeune Young are:


1. Louiza Young b. 20 Nov. 1828 St. Landry, LA. d. 10 Mar. 1886 in Calcasieu, LA. She married Jacob C. Simmons in 1844.

- Thomas Jefferson LeJeune Dit Young b. 27 Nov. 1830 St. Landry, LA d. 1 Jan. 1913 in Beauregard Parish, LA He was a Confederate Veteran of the Civil War: Pvt. Co. A, 7th. La. Cav. He married: Henieretta Williams in Sugartown, LA. They are buried in Hyatt Cemetery, Beauregard, La.
- 3. Amanda Young b. 18 Mar. 1833 in St. Landry, LA d. --- married: Ezra Moss
