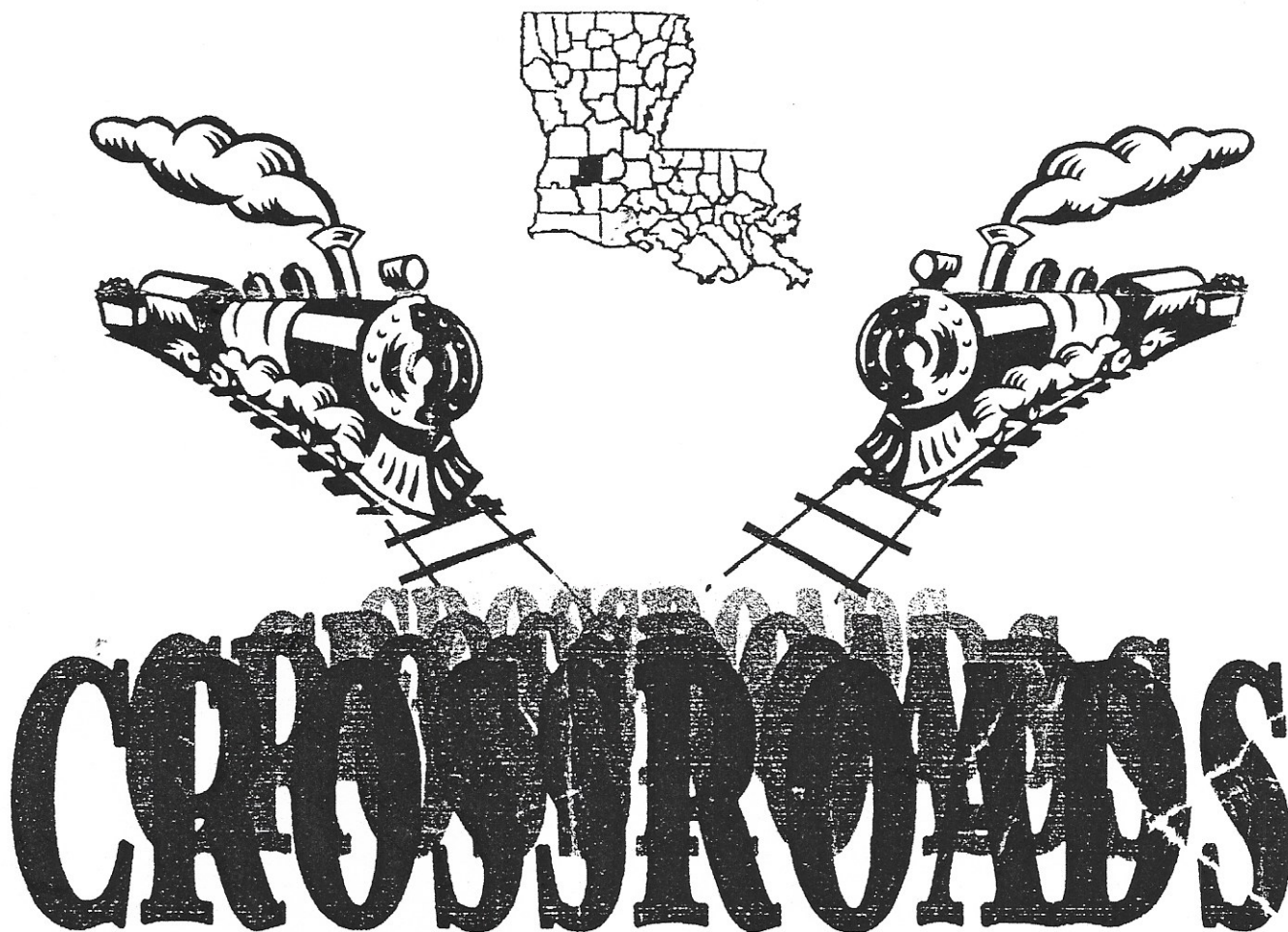

WHY WOMEN TAKE HUSBANDS' NAMES.

The custom which makes it proper for the wife to assume the name of her husband at marriage is involved in much obscurity. A recent authority advances the opinion that it originated from a Roman custom and became common after the Roman occupation of England.

Thus, Julia and Octavia, married to Pompey and Cicero, were called by the Romans Julia of Pompey and Octavia of Cicero, and in later time the married women of most European countries signed their names in the same way, but omitted the "of."

In spite of this theory, it is a fact that as late as the sixteenth century and beginning of the seventeenth century a Catherine Parr signed her name without any change, though she had been twice married. We also hear of Lady Jane Grey, not Dudley, and Arabella Stuart, not Seymour, etc., says the Philadelphia Inquirer.

Some think that the custom originated with the Scriptural idea that the husband and wife are one. This was the rule of law as far back as 1200, and it was decided in the case of *Van vs. Smith*, in the reign of Elizabeth, that a woman by marriage loses her former name and legally receives the name of her husband.

Origin of Surnames

A brief Dissertation of Names: from George Elmore Bushnell

Santa Monica, California-----1948

Author of Bushnell Family Genealogy (Published—1945)

Before the Norman Invasion of England and for some time after, given names only had been customary in that country, but by the end of century xii a great change had taken place in English nomenclature, and the Saxon and Teutonic single names had been replaced by those given names which have come down to our times. At a later period surnames began to be adopted, and by the end of century xiii, were becoming hereditary, and in centuries xiv and xv came the great formative period for English family names.

Many of these surnames denoted some phenomena of nature, or personal description, vocation, locality, or names of birds, animals, etc. and while nobles and land owners had been designated as “de”, “de la”, or “of” etc. others had been called “atts” (at the), or had perhaps assumed his father’s name with the termination “son”, or “ham”, (hamlet), or “ton”, “tun”, (town), or various other descriptive terminations, or had perhaps added a given name to his father’s name.

It is presumed that the pronunciation of these names remained fairly constant from the earliest time, with perhaps a slight modification to conform to changes in the language or dialect, but the spelling often varied, dur no doubt to the fact that few could read or write, and the spelling would naturally be phonetic, the scribe would spell the name as he heard it, or more often as it pleased his fancy.

On Wednesday, September 17, 2003 at 10 AM, the official Ceremony was held on the Kinder Library grounds with John Sneve as Master of Ceremonies. Kinder Mayor, Fred Ashy, was presented a Plaque by Marion Bowles of the Chamber of Commerce in recognition of his 22 years of service. Guest speakers included Betty Sarver, President of Allen Genealogical & Historical Society, and Betty Wilhelmi, former city council member. Rev. Rudell Kirklin and Rev. Kinder celebrates 100 years

KINDER Area residents are being invited to a very special birthday celebration, Sept. 15-19 at the Kinder Library.

The town's growth through the years will be showcased in a special exhibit at the Kinder Library to mark the centennial of the town of Kinder (1903-2003).

The exhibit entitled, "The Way We Were: Happy 100th Birthday Kinder," recounts 100 years of the town's colorful history from past to present.

The exhibit will be open to the public from 9-4 p.m. Sept. 15-19.

A special centennial dedication ceremony will be held at 10 a.m. Wednesday, Sept. 17 at the library. The celebration will feature the Kinder High School Band, a Color Guard, dignitaries and refreshments.

Library Branch Manager Lettie Marcantel said the exhibit features memories from the collection of several long-time Kinder residents.

"There's a lot of memories here," Ethel Fontenot Sacker, 78, said as she recently helped set up the display.

"I'd love to have some copies (of the photos) because I remember so many of the things and so many of these people are part of my family."

Among the items on display will be a coffee bean grinder, branding iron, homemade horn from the early 1900s and early maps of the town, including an

original map from 1938.

Several yearbooks, including an original handmade yearbook from 1941, will also be on display.

Other items include family history books, old photographs and newspaper clippings. A special genealogy collection featuring family histories and reference books will also be featured.

The exhibit also brings back special memories for Bill

Fawcett, 74.

Fawcett reminisced as he viewed old medical memorabilia from the Chappel Drugstore. Fawcett worked in the store in the 1940s and 1950s.

Fred Ashy, who is believed to be the town's 12th mayor, said the exhibit marks the growth of Kinder.

"I think it is going to open people's eyes to see how we were and where we are

today," he said.

Ashy said it is important that the town's residents pay tribute to the town's forefathers.

"They are responsible for where we are today," he said.

"What they did really brought Kinder out. I feel we are the hub of south Allen Parish."

WHEREAS, the Village of Kinder was established on June 1, 1903; and

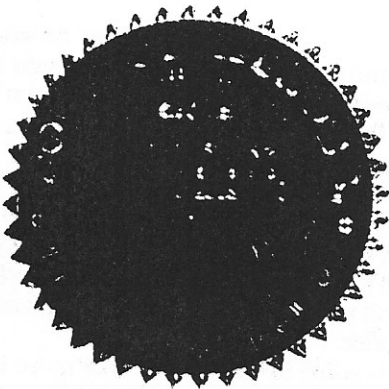
WHEREAS, its main resources were saw milling timber, rice farming, cattle, and logging; and

Oakdale High School—Early Graduates (Classes of 1910 – 1911 – 1912 - 1913)

Three Oakdale students received their high school diplomas at the end of the school year 1909-1910, thus becoming the first graduating class from the State approved Oakdale High School. One of those graduates, Coleman Lindsey (1892 – 1968), went on to serve for fifty seven years in the Legislative, Executive, and Judicial branches of Louisiana government. He served as Lieutenant Governor during the first term of the late Earl K. Long. Since 1910, approximately five thousand more have graduated in classes ranging in size from one student to more than one hundred fifty students.

Names of graduates came from records at Oakdale High School, courtesy of Mrs. Mailliw Ray. The married names of the Alumnae were obtained from the Oakdale Alumni Association, courtesy of Mrs. Jan LeBlanc.

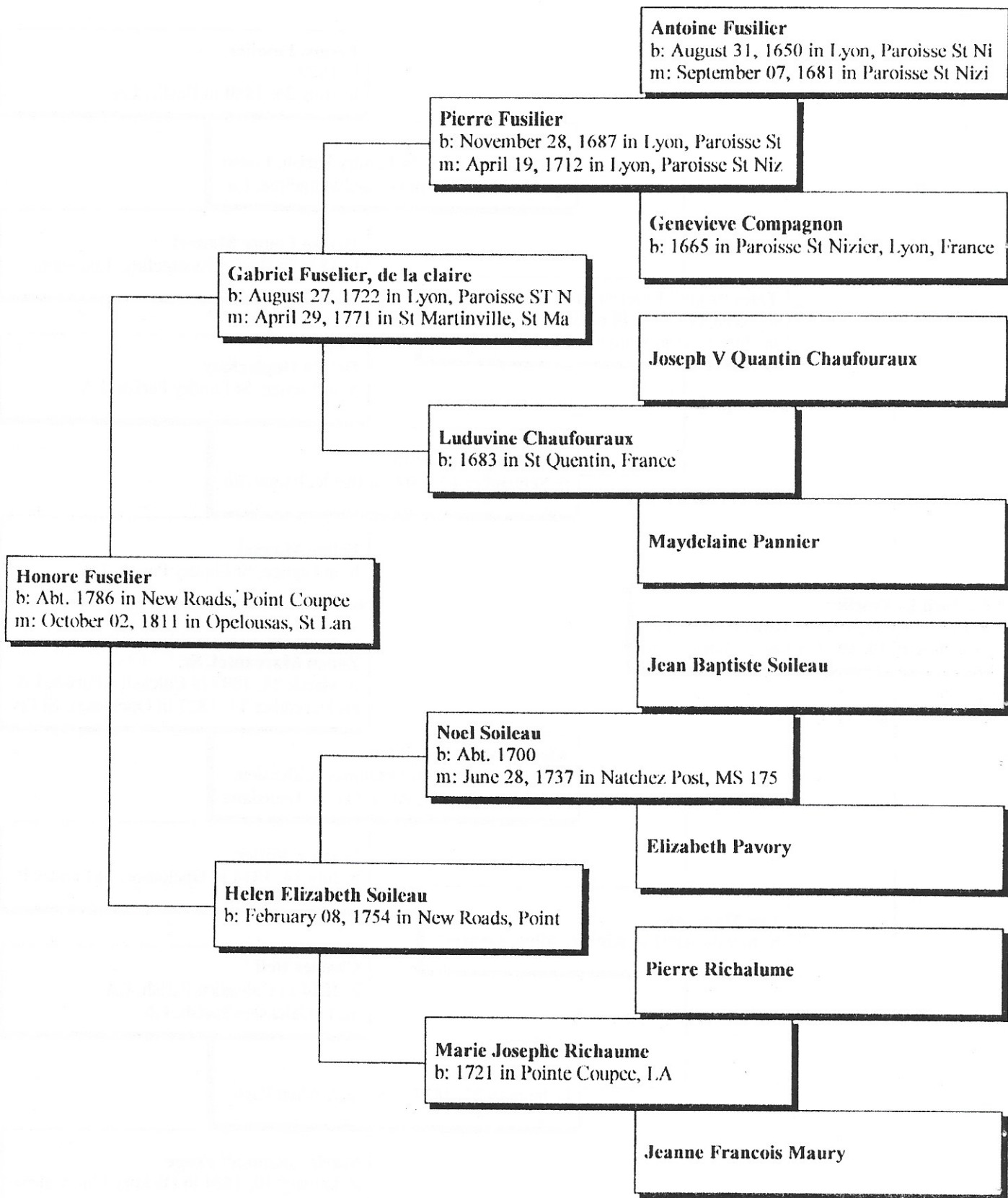

LUTZ - On the 2nd day of April, 1873, Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Lutz, wife of Frederick W. Lutz, of St. Landry Parish, Louisiana. Mrs. Lutz was the daughter of William H. & Sophia Louis of Bayou Boeuf. She was born May 2nd, 1839. She has left her husband and eight children to mourn her loss.

IN MEMORY OF FREDERICK W. LUTZ

On Wednesday, Sept 9, 1914, at his home in the town of Lecompte, Rapides Parish, La. occurred the death of Mr. Frederick W. Lutz at the age of eight years.

He was born on March 4, 1834 at Opelousas, La. where he lived for a number of years. He moved with his father to Bayou Chicot, where he also resided a long time. He was married to Miss Mary Elizabeth Lewis on Feb. 23, 1857. There were born to them eight children, of whom five are now living. Their names are Mrs. Abel Hoffpauir of Rayne, La., Mrs. Jackson Lewis of St. Landry, La.; Mr. Charles Lutz of Whitville, La.; Mr. F. L. Lutz of Lecompte, La.; and Mrs. Joe E. (Florence) Buller of Kinder, La.

He moved with his family and Negro slaves during the Civil War to Texas, where he lived until 1871. Then moved back to Louisiana. His wife died April 2, 1871. He then married Eliza Graze Wooters, widow of James Wooters, in 1873. She still survives him. The children of their marriage are: Mrs. Frank (Lizze Orenda) Rials of Lecompte; Mrs. F. M. Lyles (Evie) of Loyd, La.; Mrs. Charles E. West ((Lucy) of Meridian, Miss.; Mrs. Silas C. Carroll (Adeline) of Sour Lake, Texas. He also has two sisters living at Dallas, Texas, Mrs. Davidson and Miss Ora Lutz.

He united with the M. C. Church in 1873 and was a true Christian until his death. The last few years of his life were years of great suffering, and God alone knows what the awful ordeal meant to him and his loved ones as step by step they watched the end slowly come. He was confined to his bed for eighteen days. Everything was done for him that loving hearts could devise or money procure, but tender care, nursing, and medical skill all proved to no avail and the fondly loved father grew worse until the morning of Sept 9th when he closed his eyes to the things of earth. His sun has gone down while it is yet day, though he was spared to live to a good old age.

He lived to brighten the hearts of lives of his dear ones through 80 years. He was the sunshine of the home, kind, cheerful and affectionate to all. His love for that home and those dear ones was something beautiful and touching. None can ever fill the place in that circle that he has left.

Long will they mourn for the touch of vanished hand, the sound of the voice that is stilled. But farewell must be said on this side of the river. On the other side we will forget the world. Over there a new life is breathed into the hearts, a new name written on the forehead. He is in the Tender Shepherd's care. To Him we must leave him and look

forward to a glad reunion on the over shore where we no longer weep for what has been, but smile at what must be. The grave is not the end - beyond is the land of rest, of perfect health and joy.

His remains were interred in the Baptist cemetery at Cheneyville, La. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. Neal, the M. E. pastor of Lecompte.

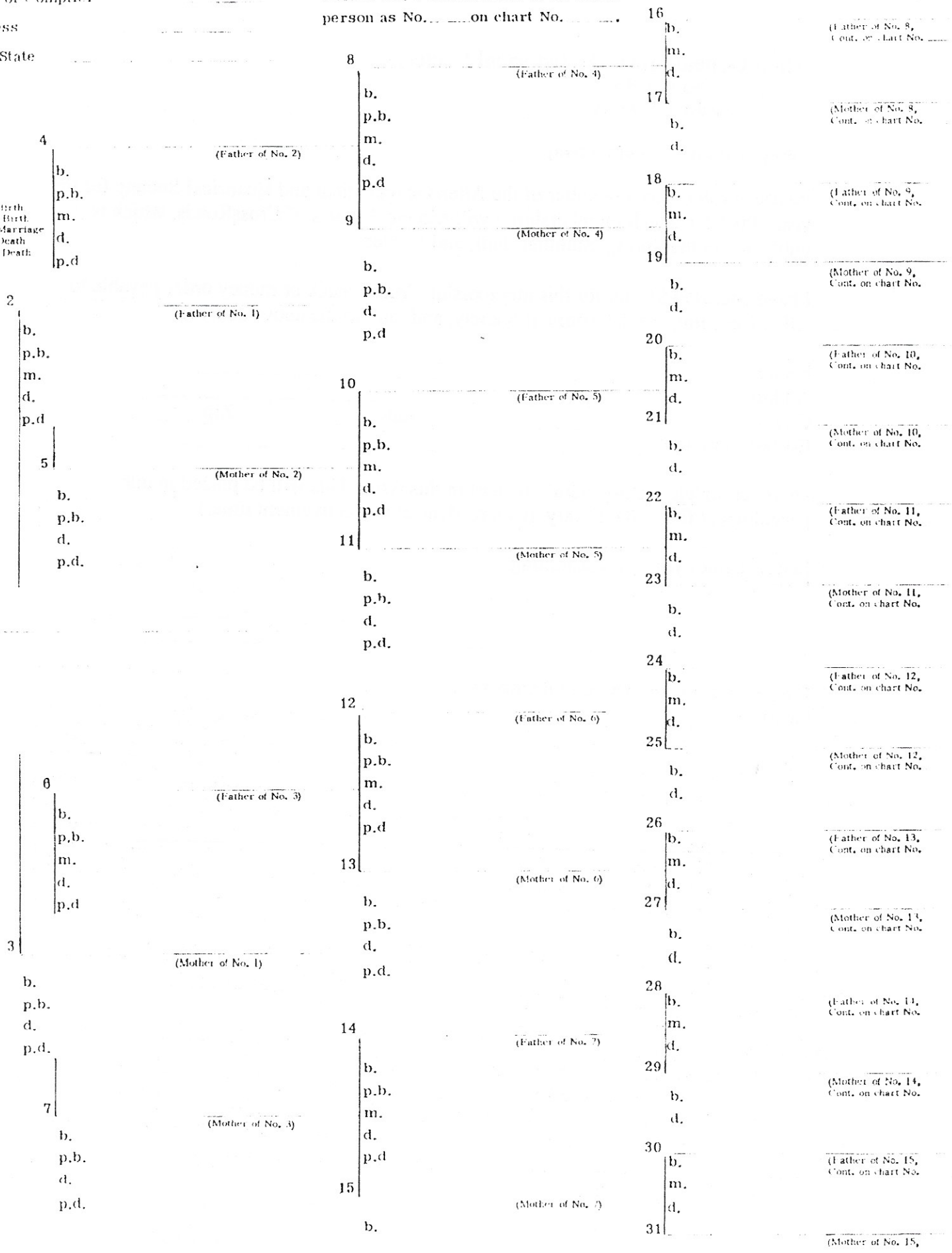
