

CHARITABLE OBJECTIVES

The main purposes of Urban Christian Outreach are: to establish contact with those in the city of Ottawa who are struggling to survive spiritually, physically, or psychologically; and to mitigate the effects of urban isolation on the life of the individual.

We do this by pointing people towards a relationship with God through faith in Jesus Christ, and by offering ongoing pastoral and practical care, including Christian education, street literacy and life-skills tutoring.

Urban Christian Outreach staff engages in mobile outreach on the streets, and in the coffee shops, parks and other communal places of the city. We especially (but not exclusively) develop ongoing relationships with those whose fragilities make it difficult for them to function in group settings. We seek to be present to their need, even when there are no apparent solutions, thereby offering hope, respect and dignity to the individual.

Urban Christian Outreach works in co-operation with other agencies by referring clients to social, medical, shelter, educational, employment and Christian organizations that will further expand the individual's personal network within the community, and will serve his/her various needs.

The heart of the work is relational. However, from time to time Urban Christian Outreach may develop structured programs and projects that are in keeping with the central focus of enhancing the well-being of those who are experiencing urban isolation and deprivation. This will be done according to the needs of the clients and the qualifications of current staff.

The geographical area of outreach and projects is within a five-mile radius of Parliament Hill (Ontario only). Follow-up may take us into other areas of the city, for home, hospital and jail visits.

We engage in dialogue and speaking engagements with individuals and groups, to promote a wider understanding of existing needs, and to search out possible solutions.

2021 Annual Report from the Executive Director

(Based on a 28 – hour salaried week)

'... for I was hungry and you gave Me food; I was thirsty and you gave Me drink; I was a stranger and you took Me in; I was naked and you clothed Me; I was sick and you visited Me; I was in prison and you came to me. Then the righteous will answer Him, saying, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed You, or thirsty and give You drink? When did we see You a stranger and take You in. or naked and clothe You? Or when did we see You sick, or in prison, and come to You? And the King will answer and say to them, 'Assuredly, I say to you, inasmuch as you did it to one of the least of these, My brethren, you did it to Matthew 25:35-40 NKJV Me.'

Dear Friends in Christ,

Peace and Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ!

As we soldier on through yet another year of the COVID pandemic, God has been teaching me about suffering – the suffering of those whom we are privileged to share, and also about the suffering of those who appear to have so much. None of us are immune to suffering, and this has become more evident as we venture into our third year of this pandemic. It has become an equalizer, I think, and has caused us to consider just how much alike we are, and that so little really separates us from those whom we are called to come alongside on the sidewalks of downtown Ottawa. In illness and in death, in poverty and in wealth, in feast and in famine, there has been a shift, and so when we offer the Peace and Grace of our Lord to one another, it becomes more than a greeting; it becomes our liturgy, where we long to lift one another up before our Lord, and to trust that He alone can be the game changer in our lives, right now, and for all of eternity- in our circumstances, in our comings and our goings. No matter how we suffer, we can now relate to one another in a new way, with compassion and empathy.

I see a change as I walk the sidewalks and enter into relationships with those whom the Holy Spirit brings us to. The poor, while weary from restrictions, seem more at peace with their plight, as they know they are not the only ones suffering. Others who are marginalized, who often fall through the cracks of our society, appear to have this unspoken grief; many have fallen into depression.

In addition to introducing our friends on the sidewalks to Jesus, we try to build up a support network around them, so that they have the supports in place in order to navigate the systems around them. We do this by building relationships with those whom we meet and by introducing them to Jesus, the only One who will save them, comfort them, fill them with Peace, and offer the Grace that only He can give.

Sidewalk Outreach and Pastoral Care

I met Bob (not his real name), on the sidewalks many years ago, and I have written about him in the past. I thought Bob was a pretty scary guy when I met him. You could barely see his face from his massive beard and long hair. He was a man of few words, and wasn't prone to sitting very long, and so I had to pretty much run to keep up with him if I wanted to spend time with him. He would walk for miles and I would join him. Bob was homeless, jobless, moneyless, and without friends or a support system. He was suffering from untreated mental illness and it took many years to build a relationship with him, and for him to come to trust us. It took a year and a half for him to let us treat him to a haircut, and years of getting to know him before he would see a doctor. By Grace, we were able to help Bob with a number of legal issues, as Bob was a victim of human and drug trafficking, financial fraud and a home-takeover. The poor are vulnerable in these matters. We visited Bob in prison, accompanied him to many legal, medical, dental and other appointments, and set him up with food banks, etc., and yet I would say that while these very practical helps played a role in helping Bob to be where he is today (he now has supportive living housing, receives his medications regularly as they are administered to him, is provided with 3 cooked meals a day, he is out of the downtown drug scene, and he is actively looking for work), it is by the GRACE of Jesus Christ, and the relationship that Bob has with Him, that has been the biggest factor in Bob's life. What an enormous privilege it has been to walk with Bob, and to introduce him to the only One who can give him Peace and Grace. Jesus, our Provider, our Saviour, our Redeemer, is in the process of Restoring Bob. We don't always get to be the planters, the waterers and the harvesters of our labours, but we have been invited to the Table of our Lord in knowing Bob.

The heart of our work is Jesus, and we strive to build relationships with those in need, to be the hands and the feet of Jesus. We wait on the Lord, and to the best of our ability we try to be obedient to the leadings of the Holy Spirit, our Friend, Advocate, and Helper.

Bible Study

We are so blessed to be able to meet with our downtown friends to study God's Word written. Sometimes we will focus on just one verse, other times a chapter or more. In our study with one client, we have been reading through the Bible from the beginning of the Old Testament, and at the time of this writing, we are at the end of Zecharaia, with just four chapters of Malachi left to read. UCO will continue to read the New Testament with our client. What an enormous blessing this has been to both her and to me. We have learned so much, and pray that God will write His words upon our hearts.

Sunday Online Church Services

During the pandemic, we have continued to connect those without computers, via telephone to an online church service. This has been a blessing.



UCO/ROMHC Adult Education Classroom

We have been blessed to have a unique partnership with the Royal Ottawa Mental Health Centre, where we work alongside Occupational Therapists (OT's) and volunteers to provide an Adult Education Program in a classroom environment. We are grateful to Paula Osborne, OT Tech, and to Anie Charlebois, OT. Normally, enrolment is ongoing throughout the school year; students are not restricted to the September to June schedule offered by the school boards. However, due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, since March of 2020, our classroom has been closed to outpatients and all non-staff, which includes UCO, as my salary is covered by Urban Christian Outreach. The classroom has been reduced considerably at this time, and limited to those who are in-patient only.

I miss the students and the staff, and hope that we are in a position to be able to resume our classroom by the fall. In the months prior to being shut down due to the Pandemic, students worked on a variety of subjects including math, history, science, English reading and writing, Food Safety Training, computer skills, and G.E.D. (High school equivalency) as well as I.L.C. (Independent Learning Centre) credits.

Speaking Engagements, Advocacy, and Community Networking

As the pandemic continues, we are challenged to find speaking opportunities in person, but we are so grateful for the opportunities to speak to congregations and small group via Zoom meetings and services. We are grateful for the many churches and organizations who continued to bless us through their Missions tithes and offerings, especially during these challenging times, by praying for UCO's needs, by their generosity of financial donations and tithes, for providing Zoom service connections in which to meet as a Board, and for gifts of clothing and winter attire for the poor.
