USA v. Jiminez-Centeno Judge Brandon S. Long Case #: 23-cr-6

Defendant sentenced to **TIME SERVED** and **3 years of Supervised Release** after pleading guilty to one count of **Reentry of a Removed Alien**, in violation of 8 U.S.C. § 1326(a), (b)(2).

USA v. Cerrato Judge Nannette J. Brown Case #: 25-cr-97

Defendant sentenced to **TIME SERVED** and **3 years of Supervised Release** after pleading guilty to one count of **Reentry of a Removed Alien**, in violation of 8 U.S.C. § 1326(a), (b)(2).

USA v. Carter Judge Nannette J. Brown Case #: 23-cr-22

Defendant sentenced to **97 months of imprisonment** and **3 years of Supervised Release** after pleading guilty to two counts of **Conspiracy to Distribute and Possess with the Intent to Distribute Cocaine**, in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 922(g)(1) and 924(a)(8).

USA v. Torres Judge Eldon J. Fallon Case #: 23-cr-152

Defendant sentenced to **TIME SERVED** and **10 years of Supervised Release** after pleading guilty to one count of **Possession of Materials Involving the Sexual Exploitation of Minors**, in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 2252(a)(4)(B) & (b)(2). Defendant also ordered to pay **restitution in the amount of \$3,000.00**.

Did You Know?

The United States Sentencing Commission publishes "Quick Facts." These facts give readers information about specific areas of the federal criminal sentencing process. The facts can be found at ussc.gov/research/quick-facts.

In June, the USSC focused on Prison Contraband (items that can pose a risk to security or the prison environment). **Did you know** that over the past five years, more than 850 people have been sentenced for prison contraband? The most common violation dealt with cell phones. Drugs and weapons rounded out the main causes for the violations.



USA v. Cockheran
Judge Susie Morgan
Case #: 23-cr-142

Defendant pleaded guilty to multiple counts and was sentenced as follows: **262 months of imprisonment and 8 years of Supervised Release** for one count of **Conspiracy to Distribute and Possess with the Intent to Distribute Cocaine**, in violation of 21 U.S.C. § 846; **48 months of imprisonment and 1 year of Supervised Release** for one count of **Unlawful Use of a Communication Facility** in violation of 21 U.S.C. § 843; **262 months of imprisonment and 6 years of Supervised Release** for one count of Possession with the Intent to Distribute Cocaine, in violation of 21 U.S.C. § 841(a) and 841(b)(1)(A); **180 months of imprisonment and 3 years of Supervised Release** for one count of **Felon in Possession of Firearm**, in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 922(g)(1) and 924(a)(8).

Sentences to be served **concurrently**.

USA v. Gilchrist
Judge Susie Morgan
Case #: 24-cr-169

Defendant sentenced to **3 years of Probation** and a **\$4,000.00 fine** after pleading guilty to one count of **Falsely Impersonating a Federal Officer**, in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 912.

USA v. Williamson, Jr.
Judge Nannette J. Brown
Case #: 23-cr-169

Defendant sentenced to **120 months of imprisonment and 10 years of Supervised Release** after pleading guilty to one count of **Possession with Intent to Distribute Controlled Substances**, in violation of 21 U.S.C. § 841(a)(1) and 841(b)(1)(A).

USA v. Adamesc
Judge Nannette J. Brown
Case #: 24-cr-217

Defendant sentenced to **27 months of imprisonment and 3 years of Supervised Release** after pleading guilty to one count of **Conspiracy to Commit Access Device Fraud**, in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 1029(b)(2). Defendant also ordered to pay **restitution in the amount of \$250.42**.
