Defendant Sentenced for Bank Robbery...

CASE SPOTLIGHT

United States v. Juan K. Simpson 24-cr-256

What's the Basis?: On November 25, 2024, Simpson entered a Capital One Bank location and handed the teller a demand note, which stated "Can I borrow 2k this is a robbery." Simpson then waited in the lobby of the bank. While waiting, police officers arrived and took Simpson into custody.

What's the Violation?: Mr. Simpson pled guilty to Bank Robbery, in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 2113(a).

What's the Punishment?: The Honorable Judge Darrel J. Papillion sentenced Mr. Simpson to a term of 48 months of imprisonment and 3 years of supervised release.

From 2000 and 2024, the Federal Government has reported between 1,200 and 1,500 criminal cases annually involving robbery. These cases included taking property from financial institutions, post offices, carjacking and other related offenses. The majority of robbery charges (over 60%) involved the use or brandishing of a firearm or dangerous weapon. Approximately 20% of these cases involved a victim that was abducted or physically restrained. According to the United States Sentencing Commission ("USSC"), the median loss associated with these robberies was a little above \$2,000.00. Less than 10% of the convictions were associated with losses exceeding \$95,000.

Over 90% of those convicted of robberies were male, and the average age was 33. The USSC also reported that these convictions were most likely to occur in districts in New York, Florida, Pennsylvania, and Texas.
