



Constitutional Act, 1791

The Constitutional Act received royal assent in June 1791 and came into effect on 26 December. It enshrined constitutional changes that were part of the reorganization of <u>British North America</u>. This took place as thousands of <u>Loyalists</u> were seeking refuge after the <u>American Revolution</u>.

Province of Quebec Divided


The bill had four main objectives: 1) to guarantee the same rights and privileges that were enjoyed by other subjects in <u>British North</u> <u>America</u>;

2) to give colonial assemblies the right to levy <u>taxes</u> to pay for local civil and legal administration, thus easing the burden on Britain's treasury;

3) to justify the division of the <u>Province of Quebec</u> into separate colonies (<u>Upper</u> and <u>Lower Canada</u>) with their own provincial legislatures; and

4) to strengthen the bonds of political dependency by fixing the constitutional weaknesses of previous colonial governments. This involved boosting the authority and prestige of the governor by making him a true representative of the <u>Crown</u>.

The Act guaranteed continuity of ownership of land held under the <u>seigneurial system</u> in <u>Lower Canada</u>. It also created the <u>Clergy</u> <u>Reserves</u> in <u>Upper Canada</u>.






Note Canada East (Lower Canada) and Canada West (Upper Canada), also notice: Alaska belongs to Russia until Oct 18, 1867

Bounded by Queenston in North and Chippewa River in South




Here is Stamford from the Stamford Green to the 5 Corners




U.S. independence in 1776 forced loyal British subjects to lose their land and move to Canada. These new Settlers in the Niagara Frontier and elsewhere were called UEL (United Empire Loyalists). The Stamford Presbyterian Church, built 1791 by the Scottish UEL settlers as the first church and grave yard in the township.



Governor John Graves-Simcoe was Anglican, the survey of land done under his command all included 1/7 clergy reserve for the Anglican Church.




St John's Anglican at Stamford Green




Saddlebag Preachers aka Circuit Riders

- This marked the beginning of what would become Stamford United Church.






On June 4th, 1925 an enthusiastic meeting was held in the Memorial Hall and a decision was reached for the organization of a Union Church at South End, Ontario. Speeches were made by the following gentlemen - Mr. Hugh Mitchell, James Depew and A.J.Potter, all who were in favour of having a Union Church organized here.

Moved by A.Arrowsmith, seconded by J.Hawken that we organize a congregation of the United Church of Canada at South End, Ontario.

Moved by J.Hawken, seconded by James Depew to hold their first service of the United Church of Canada at 7:00p.m. June 14th in the Memorial Hall.

The Rev. Dr. Hazen of London, Ontario and Dr. W.D.Lee of Thorold, Ontario officiated on this historic occasion establishing a United Church of Canada six days after the United Church of Canada came into being.




My math does not compute with Ormend B. Embelton here, as the calendar I downloaded shows Wed. June 10 as the first United Church service (also the day the United Church of Canada Act came into effect). The First United Church, Stamford, Ontario had its first service on Sunday, June 14 according to the book. This is only 4 days not 6 days after the church union.

In either case (4 days or 6 days), this makes a great argument that our church is one of the first United Churches of Canada to be organized and hold a service after the union.

I found Rev. G.N. Hazen in Strathroy, ON in 1895. Methodist Church - I presume he was a saddle-bag preacher on the London circuit.

Dr. W.D. Lee of Thorold not found yet, I wonder if he was a Reverend and if so, what church he may have represented at the meeting?




F. J. Fydell 1925-1927




F. J. Fydell was appointed minister of First United Church, Stamford Centre Ontario, on July 1, 1925.

At this time, meetings were held at: The Women's Institute Memorial Hall built after WW I, which became known as the Stamford Lions Memorial Hall.



The site today has been demolished and is awaiting a new purpose.



Reverend Fydell immediately started a building fund. 447 2/3 shares were purchased with the promise of 25 cents per month and no reduction in regular givings. 61 people participated.



On July 9th, 1925, it was moved by Mr. A. Arrowsmith and seconded by Mr. W.R. Boyce that in view of the new situation arising in our community, we the members of the Board of the Stamford United Church, formerly Wesleyan Methodist Church in a regularly called meeting do hereby enlarge this Board of Trustees in order to more adequately represent the new constituency.

Thus the first Board of Trustees to serve our church chiefly consisted of members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church whose history dated back to 1845 making our family tree years of service in this community.

On July 30th, 1925 Mr. Robert Mitchell was appointed to the Committee of Stewards.

Parade marks 2 anniversaries

History will repeat itself Sunday as a banner waving, hymn singing parade from Stamford United Church marches through the streets of Niagara Falls.

Held to mark the 140th anniversary of the church, as well as the 60th anniversary of The United Church of Canada, the parade is a re-enactment of a similar event which occurred Sunday, May 22, 1927.

On that day, church members made their way from the Women's Institute Memorial Hall, Portage Road, (now the Stamford Lion's Hall) where they had been holding church services, to the newly built sanctuary of Stamford United Church, St. Peter Street.

Now, 58 years later, the congregation and Sunday school will repeat that march in style. Led by antique cars and waving specially made banners, parade members will be decked out in their oldest hats.

All church members, past and present, are invited to this special event. Festivities start at 9:30 a.m. at the Lion's Hall where light refreshments will be served. The church service follows the 10 a.m. parade. A pot luck

luncheon will follow.







Some Items of Interest

1. The membership of the church in 1925 was 100. In 1951 it was 368.

2. The Church Notice Tablets at the front and the side entrance of the church were made and donated by Mr. A. M. Elkins.

3. The maple trees around the Church property were planted in 1928 by members of the Board. Mr. Arrowsmith often pointed out his tree on the south-east corner of the lot.

4. The first wedding of the Church was that of Mr. and Mrs. W. Meadows in 1927. The minister was Rev. H. F. Dellar.

5. The Pulpit was donated by the Yottometus Club in 1927. Later they also donated the Bible for the Pulpit.

6. The Pulpit lamp was a gift of the Woman's Association in 1935.

7. The small mirror and lamp on the organ, also a chest of drawers for our silver in the kitchen were made and donated to the church some years ago by Mr. J. Oakes.

8. The carpet on the centre aisle and pulpit platform were donated by the Woman's Association in 1935.

9. The Sunday School attendance on April 19, 1931, was 191.

10. Roger Dickson accompanied the piano for the hymn singing in the Sunday School when it was held in the Memorial Hall.


11. The curtains on the platform in the basement were purchased by the Woman's Association.

12. The cupboards in the rear of the basement were built and donated by Mr. J. J. Webb and Mr. C. Beckett.

13. The Guest Book in the vestibule was donated to the church by Mr. W. Olsen and Mr. Jack MacKenzie. The stand for this book was made and donated by Mr. Pineo.

H. F. Dellar served the church for a few months in 1927 between Rev. Fydell and Rev. Graham. (These dates are mine and disagree with Mr. Embelton's which has a chart showing Rev. H. F. Dellar at Stamford United Church for 3 months in 1925) This does not work if the Church Union was June 10 and Rev. Fydell was hired July 1/25 until 1927.

Rev. Dellar, may have been a Queenston Circuit Preacher, who served at the church after Rev. Fydell left before Rev. Graham arrived. At that time the First United Church of Stamford severed ties with the Queenston Circuit on July 1, 1927 with a cheque, and the church became a separate unit of the United Church of Canada. Rev. H. F. Dellar left Canada for work in the United States from Stamford United.



Membership in the church at this time was just over 100 and the depression was causing financial hardship.

The minister's salary was at the minimum.

Miss Mary Mitchell acted as pianist and choir director for gratis for many years starting in 1927. She became the organist when an organ was installed. Mary also led the Mission Band

Mr. Wm Mitchell (known as Bill) carried out the duties of custodian for no renumeration. Bill was also a trustee, elder and steward.

Robert Mitchell was treasurer from 1928 to 1942, also a member of the Stewards and Trustee. He was a member of the session in 1959 and sand in the choir until 1964.

Janet Mitchell taught Sunday School from 1925 to 1963 and sang in the choir until 1951

Mr. A. J. Potter was influential in the Sunday School and helping with expenses passed away in 1929

Rev. A. Graham resigned in 1933 due to ill health.

Pulpit supply was arranged until the end of June, when Rev. W. D. McIntosh was installed.



The first 5 Annual Reports in our archives. Note the annual report of 1927 states it is the 3rd Annual Report. This means we do not have the first two annual reports which would have taken place at the Womens' Memorial Institute before the church was built.




W. D. MacIntosh 1933-1937



William Donald MacIntosh, born Bruce County 1881 had a conviction growing within himself that "God was calling him to gospel ministry". He went to high school in Port Elgin, then to Queen's Arts then Theology graduating in 1910. He was ordained and installed July 26, 1910 in Sarnia.


Married in 1914, had 3 sons.

In 1924 while working at Knox Church in Milton, he presided over the congregational meeting to join the church union. The congregation voted against union so he resigned!!

He went to the Methodist Church in Wingham and then to the Knox Church in Embro which was a union of 2 congregations.

He showed "wise and tactful leadership" and was keenly interested in religious education giving the Sunday School invaluable assistance. The young people of the church recognized him as one of themselves.





Mr. Depew left the bulk of his estate (\$60 000) to the church.




R. H. Parr 1937-1941



Rev. Parr began his tenure by working on settling the Depew estate. He paid off a bank note for \$3000 and purchased the Manse from Janet Mitchell the Sunday School teacher. Bill Mitchell had built the home for Janet beside the church.

Rev Parr sold building lots across from and behind the church and sold the Depew homestead to the Stamford Lodge. (Not clear if this was the Masons or a nursing home).

Also, organ chimes were installed while Rev. Parr was leading the church.

Memorial To Be Dedicated



New organ to honor war dead

More than two years planning will culminate Sunday when the new \$30,000 Walcker pipe organ in Stamford United Church will be heard in performance for the first time.

The instrument will be inaugurated at 10 a.m. worship replacing the church's normal two morning services. Wallace Laughton, church organist, will be at the console and climaxing the day's celebration will be a public organ recital at 8.30 p.m. by Clive Jacklin, organist and director of music at Drummond Hill Presbyterian Church.

The redecorated sanctuary, with new organ case work done in oak, new choir lift and clergy platform, high organ porch and new lighting, represent approximately \$55,000 with the organ. The instrument is in memory

of those from the church who died at war.

Custom designed in every detail for the church the specifications were drawn by Mr. Jacklin in conjuction with Werner Knoch, Knoch Organ Co., of London, Ontario. The organ works were constructed by German's famed old E. F. Walcker firm.

The impact as one looks up to the organ porch is massive. Two sections of pipes - Great and Pedal - are in the open as part of the sanctuary's architecture. The third division - the Swell - speaks from a chamber behind a ceiling to floor decorative screen.

The sound impact is even greater. As opposed to the smooth sentimentalism of many organs this one follows 17th and 18th century concepts — true classic. Its lippy "spit" and "chiff" have little in common with romantic organ sounds with which most of its voicing is in direct revolt, but not all of the instrument follows radical difference. It has murmuring strings to cuddle the softness of sensitive accompaniments.

Its two powerful open reeds snarl with great authority, slightly nasal. The organ, up to its brilliant mixtures, is designed for richness. Its flutes ping and sing with varying colors.

The organ's concept is functional. It is a different genre of sound, character and ethos, perhaps in some ways apart from common organ tone conceptions, providing performers with authentic sounds to use the instrument in the true dignity of classic organ repertoire, though still not nullifying its utilitarian value in the sensitive whispers of accompanimental and related music.

Its dramatic climaxes reflect the value of the open pipes which soar high in the church unobstructed.


Each of the organ's 1,341 pipes was hand-made to exacting proportions for the church and then "given voice" in the church. The design used fundimental principles in craftsmanship practiced in Europe hundreds of years ago which are now enjoying a renaissance in so many organ installations in North America. 





FAMILY HISTORY

A history of the Mitchell fam-ily shows that the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Mitchell, were born in Stamford in the years both in Stanford in the years, 1844-6. Grandfather Mitchell came from Lanarkshire, near Edinburg, Scotland, in 1825, and proceeded to clear the forest on what became the forest on what became the family farm on Dorchester Road, just south on Dorchester Road, just south of Monroe's fruit farm. Grand-father William McMicking (mother's father) came to Stamford in 1780 as a United Empire Loyalist. An uncle wa' a Rev. John Russell who als has a street named after him. There were ten children in the Mitchell family, three of whom died early in life. There were seven boys and three girls. The Mitchells farmed and operated a dairy.

They were originally member: of the Stamford Presbyteriar Church but in 1909 transferred to Drummond Hill Presbyteriar Church. In 1925 they voted for church union. The parents and family, Janet, Mary, William and Robert became charter members of First United Church, Stamford. Gordon be came an active member of Mor rison Street United Church. He passed away in 1962.

Mrs. Hugh Mitchell and Mrs McMicking participated in the cornerstone laying of the pre-sent church in 1926. William Mitchell was a member of the

first Trustee Board, served as a steward and elder, built the house (which is now the manse) for his sister, Janet, who sold it to the Church in 1937. He passed away in 1942.

WAS PIANIST

Mary Mitchell served as pian-ist and director of music from 1927, and became organist in 1933, for a period of one year following the gift of an organ by the late James DePew. She also was in charge of the Mis-sion Band. She passed away in 1956.

Janet Mitchell sang in the choir until 1951 and taught Sunday School from 1925 until her retirement in 1963. Thousands of girls and boys sat under her leadership in the primary department.

Robert Mitchell was church treasurer from 1928 to 1942 and during the depression years the Mitchell family provided free janitor service. He has been a member of the stewards, is on the trustee board, and a member of the session since 1940. He became clerk of session in 1959 and sang in the choir until 1964.

The Stamford United Church congregation is greatly indebted to a number of pioneer families whose descendants still provide leadership in the congregation, but none has done more for this congregation, without any thought of praise, than the Mit-chell family.



Music has always played an important part at Stamford United even with other choir directors before me."



The style and colours of the design match the other windows that are already present in the church.



area of the world at present could explode into a great disaster for the entire Middle East, with dire effect on the rest of the world," the council said in a statement re-leased to the news media. "We urge the government to

act immediately through the United Nations, to dispatch a peace (keep-ing) force to the area before the world sees a repetition of the recent massacres in the Balkans and Africa." The council — made up of Islamic, Jewish and Christian leaders in the region — says there are extreme con-sequences of doing nothing. "We have to learn the lessons from

"We have to learn the lessons from places (like Rwanda) and prevent this from getting far worse than any-one could imagine, which I think is where it is going," said Reverend Harvey Tobey of Stamford United

and Islamic communities.







