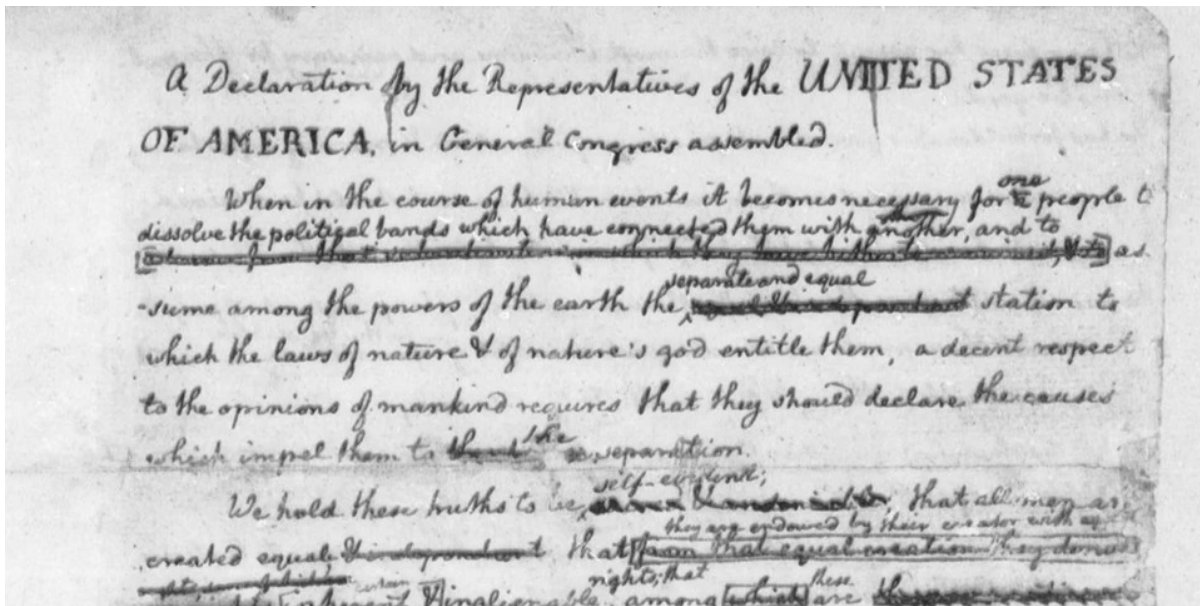
Semiquincentennial Celebration

Dear Friends,

Two hundred fifty years ago, a group of people risked life and health to gather and put their signatures to the *Declaration of Independence*, written by a young Virginian named Thomas Jefferson. The war they were in with Great Britain would continue another seven years until General Cornwallis surrendered in Yorktown, Virginia. Over the years, our founders wrote the Articles of Confederation, elected George Washington as president (they had wanted him as king, but he refused), and formed the basis of our government, the United States Constitution. Over the centuries since then, we, as a country, have celebrated July 4, 1776, the signing of the *Declaration of Independence*, as our Independence Day. This year's celebration—its 250th anniversary—is a mouthful—Semiquincentennial.

When I think about this holiday over the years, I think mostly about fireworks, family gatherings, and my excitement about being an American. My youngest brother, Craig, was not a fireworks fan, and when we would drive out to Bellbrook to see the fireworks, he could be found curled up on the floor of the car. We really had nothing like noise-canceling headphones at that time. I was the opposite. I loved fireworks.

On a particularly memorable Fourth of July when I was almost 6, we had just moved into our new ranch house in a new development in Kettering a month before, and my mother had just brought the aforementioned little brother home from the hospital on July 2. Because we were in a new development, we ended up having pebbles in the house. While we were having devotions on the evening of July 3, I picked up a pebble and put it in my ear, and out of my ear, in my ear, and out of my ear, in my ear...uh oh. My parents spied the guilty look on my face. There is a reason that they tell you not to stick Q-Tips in your ears. We headed to the doctor's office that Sunday night and met the doctor, who also could not remove the pebble from my ear. So it was off to Miami Valley Hospital on the Fourth of July with my dad and into surgery, where they removed the rock from my ear while I was anesthetized with ether. Ether and I never did have a good relationship.

We headed home, I walked into the kitchen, and...disaster. My poor mom, newly home from the hospital. Her baby was spectacularly good, but she had a 2 1/2-year-old rambunctious toddler. She did not need me adding to that. She tucked me in on the couch, and I slept the afternoon and part of the evening away. At this time, though, the Belmont Auto Drive-In Theater set off fireworks, and we could see them through the picture window in our living room. So, when I woke up, I was still able to see the fireworks.

I spent one Fourth of July in Canada! Pastor Ron and I had been married on June 30, and he wanted to go to Niagara Falls. We stayed at a bed-and-breakfast in Niagara-on-the-Lake in Ontario. But we did drive to a parking lot where we could watch the fireworks going off on the American side of the falls.

I had a friend whose daughter had been born three months prematurely, and just before bringing her home, they found that her retinas had detached from the pure oxygen. My friend took her child to Boston twice a year for exams and treatment. They were there over the Fourth of July and went to hear the Boston Pops give their annual concert. Of course the Boston Pops always closed with Tchaikovsky's 1812 Overture, with the end mimicking cannons and they shot off fireworks.. Katie could only barely see the fireworks, but she loved the "boom-booms!"

We celebrated the Bicentennial the summer I graduated from college and started my first job as

a newspaper reporter. I remember so much excitement for that, and watching the special Bicentennial locomotive come into Dayton. Church choirs joined together for great musical programs. It was a very exciting time.

When we lived in North Star, and for a couple years thereafter, we waited in anticipation of the "Pre-Fourth Celebration" hosted by my parishioner Debbie Niekamp and her husband Gene, who attended the Catholic Church. They had acres and acres, and if you wanted, you could fish in the pond and even bring your camper and spend the night. It didn't matter how far away you had to park, a golf cart would be headed your way to pick you up. Fresh fried fish were on the menu as well as hamburgers and hot dogs. Everyone brought a dish or two, so there was plenty, as some years more than 200 people attended. It had the feeling of a big block party. There was music and square dancing, but mostly visiting with friends and neighbors and parishioners. Father Dave Zink and I took turns giving the grace. To show you how much pastors love saying grace off the tops of their heads at big gatherings, here was the conversation between Father Dave and me: "I think it's your turn this year. I'm pretty sure I did it last year." "No, you can go ahead and say grace." "No, you do it so much better than I do," The evening ended with fireworks set to patriotic music. The Niekamps finally called it a day a few years ago. We miss it.

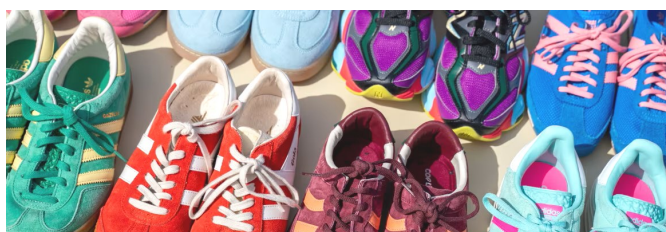
Before I go on, I want to tell you how much I love my country. My parents taught us to love our country, and we did a lot of traveling through this great land. My father is a history buff, especially if we're talking about the Civil War and World War II (which of course he lived through). I had great-uncles who were veterans of World War II, and although they took part in all the activities of the Fourth, they would not often talk about their time in Africa or Italy or Europe. They fought so that no one would have to fight again. World War I, of course, was called "The War to End All Wars."

I loved the stories of people in history. Eventually I found out that our founders were slave-holders and that some of them were not necessarily Christian and did not want to form a Christian

nation, but a nation where "freedom of religion" was invoked. I found out that manifest destiny had worked against indigenous people whose families had lived in this country for millennia. My history teacher was honest about the greatness of our country and the times it was not so great. I know that Charles Lindbergh thought Hitler was doing a great job with Nazi Germany. I learned all these lessons, but I never felt bad because I was white, and my ancestors might have been involved in unsavory dealings. "Those who do not learn their history are destined to repeat it." I still loved my country. I still joyfully sang, "God Bless America," reveling in the fact that it was written by an immigrant named Irving Berlin. When I lived on Staten Island and rode the ferry back and forth past Liberty Island, the Statue of Liberty never failed to take my breath away.

This year, I am trying to find excitement as we celebrate the Semiquincentennial. I hope our special service will help me do this. We have spent time putting our country ahead of God. We have spent time forgetting the words on the Statue of Liberty, "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to be free." We have forgotten that God said to take care of the widow, the orphan, and the alien in our land. We have forgotten that every "neighbor" out there is a child of God. I love my country, especially the beaches and the mountains, our green hills here, the animals that run through the field in back of us, the variety of birds. I do not love my government, and I do not love what we are doing to others in this world because it is so far from Jesus' words to his disciples, "Love one another. Even as I have loved you, love one another." We are giving lip service to the psalm above: "Blessed is the nation whose God is the LORD." Our God should be our only Lord, and as the First Commandment says, "You shall have no other gods before me." My prayer also is that our leaders—and also us—may remember the words of Micah: "For what does the LORD require of you but to do justice, love mercy (kindness), and to walk humbly with your God." I pray for this sea change in the future, and that we can find excitement this year in bringing our country back to God.

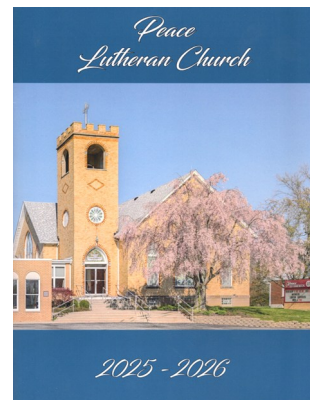
Vacation

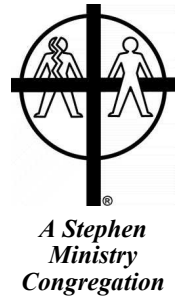
