

Sunday of the Passion/Palm Sunday

Holy Week begins with the observance of the Sunday of the Passion/Palm Sunday at both services on Sunday, March 24. We begin with celebration as we gather outside the sanctuary with palms for the Palm Processional. After the reading of the Palm Sunday Gospel from Mark 11 and the Blessing of the Palms, we will process into the sanctuary waving palm branches. The service will take a more somber and serious turn with the reading of the Passion of Our Lord According to St. Mark, Chapters 14 and 15. We will use a Reader's Theater format for the reading, which will take the place of a sermon so that the congregation can reflect on Mark's Passion. Two volunteers are needed to read with Pastor Laura -one who will portray Jesus, and the other the Speaker. She will have the scripts copied soon.

Resurrection of Our Lord

The LYO will present the Sunrise Easter Service at 6:30 a.m. This will be followed by the LYO Easter Breakfast at 7:00 a.m. Breakfast will include pancakes, sausage, scrambled eggs, orange juice, milk, coffee, and hot tea. Donations will go to the LYO and will be used for the ELCA Youth Gathering and Young Adult Gathering.

The Easter Praise Service will begin at 8:15 a.m., followed by Sunday School for the children at 9:15 a.m. Joy and Tara are working on something special for that! "But this is the covenant I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people...for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more."

Jeremiah 31:33 and 34b, NRSV

Dear Friends,

All of our Old Testament or Hebrew Scripture texts during Lent are about the covenants and the promises of God. God kept making covenant promises, and Israel kept breaking covenant promises. It was enough to make God finally give Israel over to Assyria and Judah -- particularly Jerusalem -- to Babylon. God never stopped loving the people, but he felt discipline was needed to wake them up. They had been warned by prophets for years what would happen if they kept abusing the widow, the orphan, and the sojourner or resident alien. Their worship was surface. God did not want from them sacrifices but mercy. And they just didn't get it.

We have already talked about two of the covenants. The first was the rainbow. I can't even imagine how evil the people on earth were that God decided to pick out eight people and a bunch of animals to save while he flooded the earth. He told Noah to build an ark, which he did despite his neighbors mocking him. He, his wife, and his three sons and daughters-in-law boarded the ark, experienced torrential rains for 40 days and 40 nights, and then had to wait in the ark until everything was dry -- another few months. Finally the day came when they could disembark. Bad news for some of the animals as Noah made a sacrifice to God, but good news for the humans. And God said whenever we see his "bow" or rainbow in the sky, that is his covenant with us that he will never again destroy humankind by a flood. Yes, we still have devastating floods, but not a flood that destroys the whole earth.

The second Sunday in Lent, God was speaking with Abram again, and again he gave him the promise that he would have multitudes of descendants. Abram is a little skeptical since he is 99 and his wife, Sarai, is 90. But in the Second Lesson from that Sunday in Romans, Paul says, "Abraham believed, and it was reckoned to him as

righteousness." To put a fine point on this promise, God changes Abram's name to Abraham, and Sarai's name to Sarah. God will bless both of them with a son. Like the rainbow, this promise comes true with the birth of Isaac.

Many years later, after the Egyptians have made slaves of the Israelites. God chooses Moses to bring them out of bondage. After that happens, they walk to Mt. Sinai, also known as Mt. Horeb (which was Mt. Orab's original name). Moses goes up the mountain to talk with God. Moses brought A LOT of Israelites out of Egypt. Those Israelites were going to need laws so things didn't descend into chaos. They also needed to know who it was who was with them, who accompanied them in a pillar of cloud by day and a pillar of fire by night. They needed to know that the Lord their God was a jealous God and expected them to worship only him -- no other gods before him. And so he gave the Ten Commandments -- a covenant we still follow and on which many of our own laws and codes are based -- to Moses to share with the Israelites.

Despite the Ten Commandments, which the Israelites committed to at first, they were whiners and complainers, speaking against God and Moses. They didn't have the right food, they detested the miserable food they did have, spoke against God and Moses, and finally drove God to send down poisonous serpents. They bit the people, and many died. Others repented and confessed their sin, hoping Moses would pray to God to take the serpents away. God did not take

the serpents away -- that punishment stood. The LORD told Moses to make a poisonous serpent of bronze and set it on a pole; and everyone who was bitten would live. This promise was fulfilled. The people lived, but they had to suffer. Also on the Fourth Sunday in Lent, the Gospel will be from John 3. We are all familiar with John 3:16, but John 3:15 goes along with it: "Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life." The poisonous bronze snake that saved pointed ahead to the cross that saved.

Finally, in Jeremiah 31, on the Fifth Sunday in Lent, we see the covenant God decided to make. This covenant would not be dependent on the people. God would make sure of that. This is the Scripture we have on the Feast of Reformation each year in October. "The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah." Jeremiah goes on to say that this will be a different covenant from the many that Israel and Judah broke. This time, God will write the law on their hearts and will be their God, and they will be God's people. Everyone will know what God wants and will do it. But most wonderfully, the LORD says "I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more." Just think, when we repent and we confess, God completely forgets our sin. We might carry it around, but God has already forgotten.

But this was not the final covenant. The final act was for God to come to earth as a human, and finally to die on a cross for our sin. It is good to have a Lenten season where we review God's covenants and to finally realize that great grace that God has given us.


Also, thank you to the LYO families who did the cooking to make this happen... this was truly a divide and conquer effort and it would not have been possible without you!

Maundy Thursday

We remember Jesus' New Commandment as well as the First Communion in the Upper Room and "the night in which he was betrayed" on Maundy Thursday, 7:00 p.m. Thursday, March 28.



The word Maundy comes from the Middle English "maundate" or mandate. Jesus gave the disciples a New Commandment at the Last Supper: "Even as I have loved you, you too should love one another." His second commandment during the breaking of the bread and drinking of the wine was "Do this in remembrance of me."

We will celebrate Holy Communion and experience the laying on of hands. Worship will end with the stripping of the altar as we read Psalm 22. Everyone is welcome to take part in the stripping of the altar. Once it is stripped, we leave in silence.



Good Friday Tenebrae

In sorrow, we remember Jesus' death with our Good Friday Tenebrae service on Friday, March 29. The word Tenebrae means "shadows." The sanctuary will have all lights on when you enter as well as the Tenebrae candelabra with seven candles lit.

The pastor will read the Passion of Our Lord According to St. John in seven sections. At the end of each reading, a candle is extinguished and a hymn sung until at last the sanctuary is completely dark. This is a service that stresses God's grace and Jesus' sacrifice. This is another service well-loved by those who attend it. The depths of sorrow on Good Friday add to the complete celebration of Jesus' resurrection on Easter Sunday.

Lenten Devotionals

Check the Access Hallway table for Lenten devotionals: "Guided to the Cross" for adults; "Sow, Now It's Lent" for teens and young adults, and "Cross My Heart" for children and their families with an accompanying mobile to add onto each day.

Families, it doesn't look as if the children's devotionals have been touched! Please pick up a devotional and accompanying mobile for your children or grandchildren! This is a way to have time together -- probably no more than 10 minutes each day -- and start your children or grandchildren on their way to a deeper faith.

Agape Stations of the Cross

Peace will host the Agape Palm Sunday Stations of the Cross service at 7:00 p.m. Sunday, March 24. These are not the Stations of the Cross that surround Good Friday, but we will follow Jesus from that joyful moment of entering Jerusalem through the events and encounters leading to the Upper Room, where he shared the Last Supper with his disciples. Through fourteen readings from the Gospel according to Mark, we follow Jesus to the Passover. Agape members and Pastor Greg from Sardinia Hope Church have volunteered to read, but we also need volunteers from Peace. Last year, several people said how much this service means to them and how they wished others would come so they would know what they were missing. Dorcas Circle will serve light refreshments following the service.
