The Akao Family Reunion had its humble beginnings in 1978. Earlier that year, Uncle Bill Viveiros amputated his left leg due to gout. In September, Lucille called the Viveiros family to get together for Christmas, like a reunion because of concerns for Uncle Bill's health. Aunty Violet Francisco asked if the extended Akao families could join in. The families were notified and those who lived on the outer islands all came. The siblings of Aunty Kau'i and their families and the siblings of Uncle Bill and their families came to that Christmas reunion.

The activities started on Saturday, Dec. 23, 1978 at the Francisco's home up on the hill, downhouse. It was called genealogy night, tracing our roots. I do remember the families standing on the steps outside the sliding door to the family room and taking pictures. The menu was Hawaiian food and everyone was happy to be together at Kuku's home.

On Sunday, Dec. 24, the events were held at Walter and Lucille's home, down at the subdivision. This was the night for the Christmas program. The menu was shortribs, noodles and vegetables, turkey with all the trimmings, kalua, desserts, salad and rice. There was an introduction of families, entertainment by the families. Christmas caroling, Santa's visit, and who was Santa?, then opening of gifts.

On Monday, Christmas Day, the Chungs hosted an Aloha brunch, the second time around. It was decided at that time that the Akao 'Ohana would hold a family reunion every 5 years. And so the Akao family reunions were held in 1983, with the Kona family at the Hilo Lagoon Banquet room, 1987 in Kona at the Kona Lagoon Hotel, 1992 at the Hilo Hawaiian Hotel with the Kona families, the families of Charles Akao, Kuku's brother and the families of his sister, Mele. Over the years, we lost family members like Aunty Kau'i, Cousin Bill Viveiros, Aunty Clara Akao, Aunty Kay Andrade, and Uncle Joe Andrade. Uncle James Akao and Cousin Carol Farias died in 1995 and Uncle Sammy Akao died in 1996.

It was therefore decided that the family reunions would be held every three years. The next reunion was held in 1997 at Kuku's/Francisco's home in Laupāhoehoe, and at the Kilauea LDS Stake Center. In 2000, the reunion was held at Laupāhoehoe and at the LDS Stake Center in Hilo and on Sunday, the luncheon was held at Mohouli Park with picking the chairs for the next reunion in three years.

The 2003, 2006, 2009, 2012, 2015 and 2018, and 2023 reunions were all held at Laupāhoehoe Point. all hold very fond memories of camping, visiting graves, team building activities, family service projects, horseback riding, swimming, talk story, family history, Hawaiian arts and crafts, hula lessons, kickball, volleyball, and cooking together. This year, the committee has something new in store for us in Kona. You can always count on a fun and memorable time no matter where we go.

In 2022 , our family started a decade-long fundraising contract cooking the food for the Merrie Monarch Festival in Hilo. It is a highly anticipated weekend for community, but especially for our family to gather and spend a week preparing and cooking food- something we do best! Many laughs are shared, drops of sweat are poured, and memories are made during this week. If you've ever spent an hour or more with us down at Aunty Sally's kitchen, you know the work that it takes to make it a success. You can count on seeing Sean and Uncle Kaihi cooking endless batches of rice, Viliam and Leiola making the famous "Merrie Monarch Squid Lu'au", Nicolas and Ka'eo preparing the hot food, Kerr's and Loa's mixing salad, cupping poi and delivering food to the concessions, the first cousins talking stories while wrapping utensils, Ulu organizing the kitchen, and Arrke and Anela overseeing the entire operation. It's become a family tradition that we love (and maybe somewhat dread) and hope all of our family members get the opportunity to come and partake in the best week that Hilo has to offer!

Our Akao family reunion has spanned a period of nearly 50 years. Each reunion brings us together as family. The teamwork, collaboration, sharing, love, and support from each family member working together is uniquely special. We should all feel proud to be a part of a strong and undying legacy of service and love.

HISTORY OF DAVID KAHEAOKALANI AKAO

David Kaheaokalani Akao was born on November 15, 1880 in Waiohinu, Kaʻū, in a grass hut. He was the second of two sons of Gabriel Mau Ling and Annie Kalamakuikekapualiʻi Akao. David was raised on fish, poi, taro, sweet potato, bananas, opae, wild pork and products from the sea such as ʻōpihi, limu, and other seafood. At a very young age, David worked in the taro and potato patches and the garden. He was taught to pound poi, fish and hunt. David attended Waiohinu School for a short time. The lessons were taught in Hawaiian and English languages. He claimed he was not too bright and was not very interested in school. David's brother, Charles, was a faster learner. David's first job was as a sailor moku on the inter-island boats. The boats went around the islands and he enjoyed this job. During their spare time, sailor mokus would play their guitars and ukuleles. David enjoyed music. His favorite song was "Papa Sia". At this time, David married his first wife, a Hawaiian girl. But it was a short marriage without children before they separated.

David then applied for work as a paniolo cowboy for Huehue Ranch at Hualalai, Kona. He enjoyed this job. In Kona he met Mary Kahaleohu of Laupāhoehoe. Mary and her sisters, Minnie and Esther, were vacationing with the McGuire family on the Ranch. David fell in love with Mary. When the sisters returned home to Laupāhoehoe, it was found necessary that Mary be married to David. William Kahaleohu, their father was a police officer and he summoned David Akao to come and marry his daughter. David took two days to get to Laupāhoehoe point. He spent the first night at Keʻeaumoku, a half way station. He started very early the next morning and by night fall arrived in Laupāhoehoe. William Kahaleohu was also an L.D.S. Elder so he performed the marriage uniting his daughter, Mary Kahaleohu and David K. Akao, as husband and wife, with no flowers or frills, in the fall of 1903. On January 10, 1904 their first child, a son, Samuel Keikioewa was born.

Being that the first son was named Sam, the working men thought that his name was "Sam" also. It was customary, at that time, that a first born son was Junior. So friends and neighbors called David "Sam" Akao or "Uncle Sam." Although David signed his name David K. Akao, he answered to "Sam" and did not mind at all.

David got a job with the Lāupahoehoe Sugar Company in Laupāhoehoe Valley. When the mill moved to Pāpāʻalooa, David was given a home in Spanish Camp. There Mary Kauikalamaonapali Akao was born in 1907 and David Punilei in 1910.

In 1913 David's second wife, Mary Kahaleohu Akao, died. Six months later David Punilei died. Samuel and Kau'i lived with grandparents, William and Isabella Kahaleohu.

As a result of an opening at the Laupāhoehoe Police Department, David got a job as a horseback police officer. His patrol area was from Oʻokala to Hakalau. As a police officer he met Mary Kapewalani Meheula Ah Chong. They courted and were married in 1915. This was Mary Kapewalani's second marriage. She had three children with Ah Chong. These three children later returned to China with their father.

At this time, the Manowaiʻōpae house lots were just opened. David purchased two lots at a very cheap price at that time. With the help of William Kahaleohu, David built his first home on the hill.

In 1919, David applied for and got a job with the County as a laborer. Eventually he became a steam roller operator and worked on most of the roads in the North Hilo district.

In 1925, David transferred, under the County, to a janitorial job at Laupāhoehoe School. He held that job for twenty-one years, retiring at the age of 65 on March 31, 1946 – one day before the disastrous tidal wave hit Laupāhoehoe Point claiming 26 lives.

In 1931, Mama, Mary Kapewalani Meheula Akao died, leaving Papa with nine children. The oldest, Kealoha and Maria, took care of the family. There were David Punilei, James, Samuel, Mary Ann, Violet, Ernest and Melva. Baby Melva died about a year and half after Mama.

David enjoyed his retirement for 26 years, in all, living a good and full life. He passed on to his heavenly home on July 12, 1972 at the age of 91 years old.

Mel was our older brother, kind, loving, caring and protective of his sisters. He was quiet, soft spoken, neat, organized, orderly, and somewhat set in his ways.

He graduated from Kamehameha Schools in 1957. I remember Nana ironing his uniforms each night and making sure that his creases were sharp and exactly how he wanted his uniform to look. He married Betty in 1961 and together they had two children, Colin and Nicole. He later married Barbara Jean (BJ) in 1975 and together they had James, lovingly known by the family as “Kaaluea” in June 1985.

In his earlier years he worked at Hawaiian Electric. While at Hawaiian Electric, and through much sacrifice and continued desire, he earned his pilots license and joined Hawaiian Airlines. He flew with Hawaiian Air until the mandatory retirement age of 60.

Being a pilot was exactly suitable to brother as his favorite passion was racing cars. He and his friend, Richard, who was also a pilot with Hawaiian Air made a number of trips to the mainland to go to Formula One races and he followed the circuit on TV. I believe they even had an opportunity to drive at one of the raceway parks. They both enjoyed speed and adherence to the intricate rules and attention to driving one of these racing cars.

He was such a “straight arrow” never bringing attention to himself. BJ shared a special evening they shared while having dinner at Marakesh Restaurant, when a belly dancer invited him to dance with her and of course, he politely declined but after much encouragement he finally agreed. Per BJ she said this was so “out of character”. Needless to say he never danced again in front of anyone . . . not even family.

He lived a quiet life. I remember asking him why he didn't fly internationally and he said, “Sister, I want to come home to my own house and my own bed every night”. In fact he was somewhat of a “homebody”. At the end of his last flight for the day he walked off the aircraft and “called it a day”.

During the latter years, he would insist on taking me to dinner for my birthday and at the end of the evening while during hugs and kisses saying our goodbyes he would always whisper in my ear “Remember now, it's just you and me kid”.

Like my brother was in life, he passed quietly and peacefully on October 24, 2023. He was 84 years old. Families and memories are forever. We are grateful for all that we shared. A hui hou.

Our dad, Tevita Puloka Haunga, was born September 29, 1948 in the village of Hihifo on the island of Lifuka of the Ha'apai Island group of Tonga. Born of goodly parents, Salesi Tovo and Molimau Veisia Haunga, he was the youngest of five children. He was of quiet dignity and a humble servant to his fellow man.

At a young age, he was encouraged by his parents to pursue his education and a life outside of Tonga. He studied at the School of Fulton in Fiji and planned for higher education following his graduation. His parents sacrificed their family home in Tongatapu, selling it for \$600, so he could travel to Honolulu to attend the Church College of Hawaii in 1969. All of these sacrifices were made for him to pursue the American Dream. He was determined to make it to America, knowing that this opportunity would take his life to heights higher than he could ever imagine.

His perseverance and work ethic allowed him to achieve everything he set out to America for. He worked at the Polynesian Cultural Center villages and acquired some off campus construction projects to pay his way through college. There, he met his eternal companion, Sharman Kalaulani Francisco.

On October 6, 1973, Sharman and Puloka were married and started their life together in the up house of Laupāhoehoe. They raised four strong and spirited boys, Kealaka'i, Bronson, Viliam, and Tylan, in Laupāhoehoe and across Hawai'i, as his career took their family to many places around the islands. He was a faithful member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, and was sealed to his family for all time and eternity in the Lā'ie Hawai'i Temple. 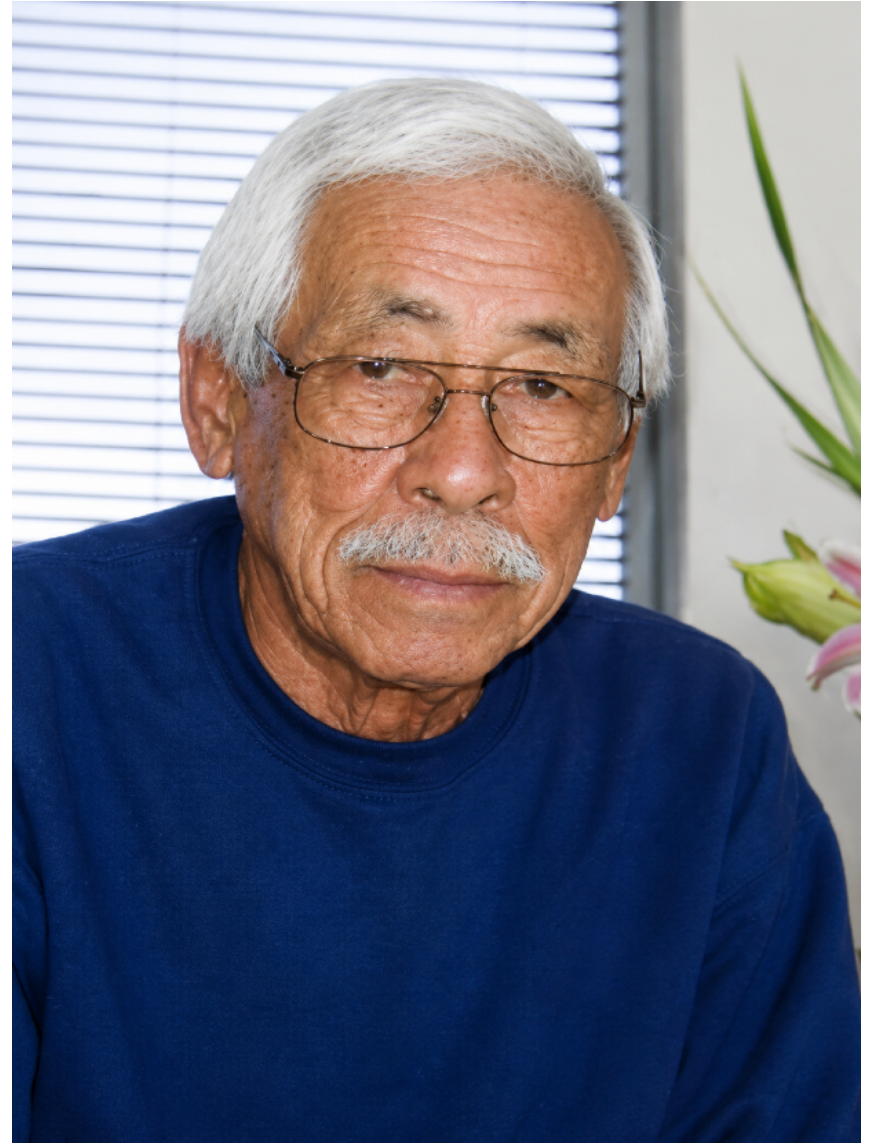
A Loving Tribute...

When I shared with my son Jake that I'd be writing a tribute about Grandpa, he remarked, "Man! Everything Grandpa did was large." As I thought about what he said, it wasn't long before I saw the truth in that statement, making a list of everything that was, indeed, large about Daddy—his love of family, his devotion to his military career, his adventurous spirit, his personality, his smile, his laugh, his cologne, and his enjoyment of food, especially Hawaiian and Southern cuisine.

Making a career out of the military was of great importance to Daddy, a career that, in many ways, defined him. It was a calling that enlarged and richly impacted his life. He served many tours of duty, including a deployment to Viet Nam in 1965 and Korea in 1974. One of the more interesting missions of his military career was Operation Deep Freeze, both an adventure and a service aiding the scientists stationed there. He was a true patriot and a dedicated serviceman in the field of aircraft maintenance, achieving the rank of senior master sergeant before retiring from the Air Force. Among his fellow military servicemen, he was affectionately known as "Pineapple."

Though military life had its challenges for us, this lifestyle gave us great adventures. Daddy's assignment to Germany for three years provided us with opportunities to visit many European countries and tour iconic attractions like the Vatican, the Sistine Chapel, the Coliseum, the Leaning Tower of Pisa, the Tulip Festival in the Netherlands, and many famous castles. It was his desire to take every opportunity to expose us to as much history as possible and to broaden our perspective of the world and other cultures. We continue to treasure those memories and rich experiences.

Daddy had a large presence about him enhanced by his outgoing personality. Everyone who met my dad loved him immediately. His broad smile, his easy laughter, and his teasing wit made him fun and enjoyable to be around. His laugh was big and loud, his eyes squinting and pouring tears, an infectious kind of laugh, a high-pitched hee-hee-hee signaling the grand finale. My siblings and I and even the grandkids have all inherited this trait of crying when we are bowled over with laughter. At family gatherings, he often sat quietly, often pensive amidst the activity, taking it all in, appreciating every moment. In the backyard of his home on Cedar Drive in Prattville, he was a familiar fixture as he sat in his lawn chair, waving at the neighbors and engaging in friendly conversation with anyone who strolled by. But he would not hesitate one bit to play the part of neighborhood watchman when someone drove by too fast, his signature high-pitched whistle, an expression of reprimand and staunch disapproval. In the sympathy cards we received after Daddy's passing, many of the neighbors wrote how they missed Daddy's colorful presence in the yard.

Another fond and prominent memory of Daddy was his getting-ready-for-the-day ritual, which was a full sensory experience for anyone who happened to be in the house. He loved to place a stack of Hawaiian records on the turntable of the stereo cabinet and turn up the volume, his bellowing and falsetto voice raised with passion as he sang the old familiar tunes of his island home, connecting his heart to his Hawaiian ohana. He didn't always need music backup. Sometimes, he would just start singing one of his favorites like "Pearly Shells," which he sang so many times, we were able to sing all the verses in Hawaiian when we were kids.

Also a part of this “getting-ready” routine, a favorite memory of the grandkids, is of Daddy mixing a concoction of colognes and aftershaves, which he splashed and slapped on himself liberally before putting on his shirt, the sweet scent wafting through the back rooms of the house and drifting and lingering there with the music. For Carol, the memory of his love for Hawaiian music looms large, the familiar Hawaiian songs, even today, a source of peace and comfort to her.

The biggest thing about Daddy, though, was his heart. I remember his letters from Viet Nam, in which he faithfully expressed his love to us in his unique hand, a flourishing mixture of all caps and cursive writing, signed faithfully in all his letters, “I love you heaps and heaps. All my love, Ken.” When Mom had to leave us with Daddy in Germany for two weeks while she made an emergency trip home to Alabama, I remember sitting on Daddy’s lap crying wondering how we’d manage without her. Daddy let me cry it out and he cried, too, assuring all of us we’d be OK, and of course, we thrived just fine in Daddy’s hands. David remembers Daddy’s expression of love one day while ice skating in Germany, his feet freezing and wet. David recalls how Daddy took off his skates and socks and just held his feet tightly between his big hands, the memory vivid of how incredibly warm his hands were, bringing him instant comfort at that moment. Daddy also expressed his love in big bear hugs, the grandkids, remembering how he wrapped his muscular arms around you in a tight squeeze, nearly taking your breath!

One special memory I (Karen) have about my dad was around the kitchen table one afternoon in 1995. During the summer of 1995, I attended a summer writing workshop at Auburn University. Our writing prompt one morning was to write about a magic childhood moment. The story I knew I wanted to tell occurred while Daddy was in Viet Nam, and it poured out of my memory that day onto the paper in just 45 minutes, a lost and found story about a little doll I had left on the playground and how it ended up in the music teacher’s nativity scene that Christmas—as the baby Jesus. I couldn’t wait to tell Mom this story when I got home the day I found her. It would be decades before I would write and then tell that story to my dad, never thinking how such a sweet and simple story would have such a deep effect on him. I stopped by my parents’ house one afternoon to share the piece I had written. As I read the story, my dad was wiping tears. “I never knew this story,” he said, the gravity of that thought hitting us both hard.

Daddy’s enjoyment of food and his preparation of it was also of grand importance in his life. He loved to fuss over big breakfasts for us. He was the early riser and had breakfast ready for us many school mornings. He taught us to love banana pancakes with a slice of Velveeta cheese on top, a tradition we have faithfully passed down to the second and third generations. And the preparation of his own breakfast was its own unique art form: a mound of leftover rice in the center of the plate, three fried eggs (yoke runny) overlapping atop the mound, tabasco sauce, the crowning touch.

Daddy also loved to pack huge lunches for us, even when we were in high school. A tuna salad sandwich prepared with plenty of mayonnaise was standard fare, and he always packed one and a half sandwiches. He seemed to relish preparing the size lunch he would enjoy, complete with cookies, chips, and fruit, filling each brown paper sack until it bulged leaving barely a half inch at the top to fold over. I’m certain we were the only teenagers with lunch bags stapled shut to contain the bounty. Telling him not to pack so much would be like telling him not to love us so much. And the grandkids still marvel how Grandpa could add milk to his coffee cup to the edge of the cup’s rim and still manage to transport the cup from counter to table without spilling a drop... every-single-time. Food prep to overflowing was among his many expressions of love for his family.

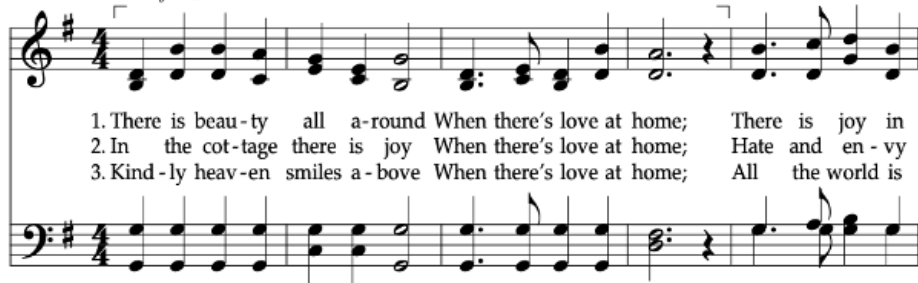
In 1992, Daddy acted on a big idea, and, with immense generosity, he offered to pay for our plane tickets so that his children and grandchildren could all attend the Family reunion that year. It seemed taking us all with him that year was of urgent importance, as though he sensed the need to seize this opportunity and make it happen. In his mind, it was time for us to learn more about our Hawaiian heritage and his Hawaiian home and share us with his extended family. How grateful I am that we made the trip. It would be the only time all of us enjoyed an Akao family reunion with him. This reunion planted seeds, giving our children the wonderful opportunity to get to know and love their Hawaii Ohana, forever bonding our families as relationships grew with each successive reunion. Now attending family reunions has become a tradition, a way to honor our dad and his legacy.

Time has seasoned our memories of our dad, bringing the essence of who he was into clearer focus. In so many ways, big and small, Daddy gave us the gift of love, the very title of the hymn sung at his celebration of life service. Like God’s love for each of us, his love was full and overflowing. It was a love that was the outpouring of what he had received from his own family, encapsulated in the family theme song “Love at Home” and now poured into the hearts of the successive generations. To all who knew him, Daddy was, indeed, large in his body, in his heart, and in his spirit.

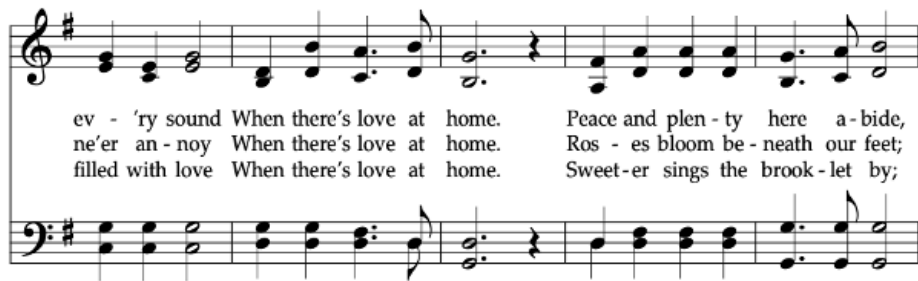
