Spring Garden CDC's Covid-19 Neighborhood "Navigation" Guide October 30, 2020 Weekly Update

VOTING: The Big Day is Almost Here; at This Point, Deliver Your Ballot, Don't Mail it, if You Want It to Count! Or Vote in Person

If You Are Using a Mail-In Ballot, Don't Mail it, it's Too Late; Put it in the Drop Box Outside Eastern State Penitentiary, or Another Drop Box, or Deliver it to a Satellite Election Office: Click [here](#) for locations. Everyone must deliver their own ballots, with exceptions for disabled individuals (for whom paperwork must be filled out). Drop boxes are available 24 hours a day.

October 27 was the last day to request a mail in ballot. If you didn't do so, you must vote in person unless you qualify for an emergency absentee ballot by reason of an unexpected hospitalization or disability. If you requested but didn't receive your mail-in ballot, you can request a replacement at a satellite office, fill it out, and return it there.

Philadelphia Has Spent Millions of Dollars on High Speed Mail-in Ballot-Processing Machinery, Set up at the PA Convention Center. Hundreds of election workers will be sorting and counting the ballots using the new machinery, in a space the size of 2 football fields. Under current PA law, the counting of mail in ballots cannot start until 7 AM on November 3. In previous elections, including

the June Primary, it was all done by hand. The funding was provided by a nonpartisan grant.

The PA Supreme Court Unanimously Ruled on October 23 That PA Election Officials Cannot Reject Mail-In Ballots if the Signature Appears Different From that On Record or If Third Parties Challenge Votes on That Basis.

However, the U.S. Supreme Court Could Still Invalidate PA Ballots Received By Mail in the 3-Day Period After 5PM on November 3, as Initially Allowed by the PA Supreme Court: The U.S. Supreme Court recently refused to stay, in a 4-4- decision, the PA Supreme Court’s decision allowing 3 extra days for PA election officials to receive mail-in ballots mailed by Election Day. However, last week, certain parties asked the Supreme Court for a rehearing on the substance of the PA rule and to invalidate it. Yesterday, the U.S. Supreme Court refused to hear the PA case before Election Day. ***However, the Court left open the possibility that it could hear the PA case, and revisit the issue, AFTER the election, which could result in invalidation of PA ballots received after November 3.*** The newest Justice did not participate in the case but may do so after the election. Some Justices made it clear that they thought the PA rule was an improper overreaching by the PA Supreme Court, contrary to the State’s election law as enacted by the PA legislature. ***PA election officials have been told to segregate mail-in ballots received after November 3.***

The Warmdaddy's menu will be Southern-inspired and will also feature items from the Green Soul menu. They may reopen Green Soul in another location, at a later time. A big welcome to Warmdaddy's!
