City, State and Federal Covid-19 Responses, Issues:

The City Has Announced that it is Unlikely to Allow Indoor Dining Starting on August 1, as Previously Hoped: Coronavirus cases are on the increase nearly everywhere, fueled in part by a hasty attempt to return to normal in some locales. We are lucky to have public officials in Philadelphia who are both cautious and realistic, as they try to balance opening the economy with public safety. But our restaurants are hurting!

City SWEEP Teams from the Streets Department are Visiting Restaurants with Outdoor Dining and "Streeteries" to Provide Information and Issue Warnings for Any Non-Compliance: The Health Department and L&I also making inspections. Failure to comply with City regulations could result in a \$2,000 fine and or closure.

Many Federal Protections for Residents Adversely Affected by the Pandemic Are Set to Expire Soon; Let's Hope the State Keeps Many of its Own in Place:

When the initial federal pandemic relief legislation was passed, it was contemplated that the crisis would be easing by this time. But the opposite has happened. The virus is raging out of control in much of the country, just as some critical protections are schedule to end. These include expanded unemployment benefits, the Paycheck Protection Program, foreclosure moratorium on federally backed mortgages, eviction moratoriums for federally backed properties, and some student loan protections, among others. Let's hope the State will help provide some protection by extending its own moratoriums.

New Federal Pandemic Relief Legislation Has Been Bogged Down in Partisan Differences:

While critical relief measures are needed even more at this time to combat the ongoing, and growing, health and economic effects of the pandemic, the effort seems to be stalled in partisan difference. There has been an effort to end or reduce funding for testing and tracing, a move opposed by many in both parties. Some legislators want to end or lower expanded unemployment benefits to provide an incentive to go back to work. Some want funding for local governments to avoid a critical shortage of local services, others oppose. Congress recesses in August so there is little time left to iron out a multitude of issues to help the country weather the pandemic and to begin to get the virus under control again.

City Trash Collection Continues to Fall Behind During the Pandemic, Various Reasons Alleged:

Councilman at Large Brian O'Neill wrote a scathing letter to the Mayor regarding trash collection falling behind for days in some neighborhoods. The Streets Department says the problem is that 100 workers have tested positive for the virus and others have had to stay home to take care of children and family members. There is no social distancing on trucks with 3 crew members. Heat and storms have also contributed to the problem. However, some have alleged that the delays are caused by worker and union efforts to receive hazard pay. Hazard pay was provided to sanitation workers for a few weeks in March, and when that ended, a 2% pay raise. There has been a suggestion that private haulers be brought in to help, a move opposed by the union. We thank our sanitation workers for their hard work during this difficult time.

Governor Wolf Has Pulled Funding from Lebanon County for Refusing to Obey His Emergency Orders:

The Governor had long threatened to pull funding from cities, counties, and nonprofits that defied his orders designed to curb the spread of the virus. He did so last week for Lebanon County. Local leaders had voted in mid-May to lift the pandemic restrictions ordered by the Governor. He has withheld \$13 million in funding.

The Newly Mandated Postal Service Slow Downs Could Affect All Aspects of Life During the Pandemic, Including November Voting:

The recently appointed Postmaster General has ordered changes in how the Post Office operates, designed to save money. The effect has been a slowdown of mail delivery. You may already have noticed it. This could adversely affect online ordering of necessities during the pandemic, and the timeliness of receipt of mail-in ballots in

the November 2020 election. A bill to provide \$35 billion in funding to keep the mail flowing is stalled in Congress. A previously approved \$10 billion credit line for the Post Office remains unused based on restrictions imposed by the Administration. The volume of first-class mail has dropped dramatically during the pandemic.

The Philadelphia School District Has Opened Registration for its Digital Academy; the Deadline to Register is Tuesday August 4; However, the School District's Reopening Plans Are Now on Hold: The Academy will provide students with the option of 100% digital learning instead of the hybrid model which includes 2 days a week in-person learning. Students who enroll cannot switch to partial in-person learning until January 2021, if in-person classes are offered, see below. **Conversely, those students who do not apply now will automatically be assigned to the hybrid model and will have to wait until January to change to all-digital, if the hybrid model is offered.** *However, decisions about school openings are still very much in flux as the virus continues to spread, and after an 8-hour School Board meeting the night of July 23 where parents and teachers expressed significant concern about the safety of any in-person classes.*

The State's Largest Teachers' Union has Asked Governor Wolf to Order Schools to Plan for Online Teaching, Only, in the Event of a Continuing Increase in the Spread of the Virus: The union says that the distinct possibility of an increase in the spread of the virus could make it impossible to open schools for in-person teaching.

Bucks County Officials Will Provide Face Shields for all Elementary and Middle School Children if Schools Open in the Fall: It is not clear, however, whether face shields provide better protection, or even as effective protection, as masks, but they are easier to wear.

Governor Wolf Supports the Federal Bill to Aid Restaurants Hurt by the Pandemic: A bill has been introduced in Congress to assist restaurants hurt by the pandemic. It was co-sponsored by Rep. Dwight Evans of Philadelphia. Called the Restaurants Act for short, it would provide \$120 billion for a Restaurant Revitalization Fund. Grants would be available for the difference between what a restaurant made in 2019 vs. what it is expected to make in 2020. The money could be used for virtually all restaurant expenses including rent, payroll, food, PPE, and other costs. The bill has apparently garnered some bipartisan support.

Given the wide differences in Washington as to what the next round of relief bills should include, and what aspects of the pandemic they should focus on, however, it is not clear whether this bill has a chance of success.

PA's List of Self-Quarantine States is Still at 18, NJ is now at a Mind-Boggling 31 States, Including Delaware: Anyone traveling to one of these states and returning to PA or NJ must self-quarantine for 14 days to avoid bring the virus back with them. Other:

Mayor Kenney Has Rebuffed the Administration’s Threat to Send Federal Troops to Any Cities Experiencing Continuing Unrest: Federal agents have been sent by the White House to Portland, Oregon to quell protests and unrest, ostensibly under the guise of protecting federal monuments. They are now being sent to Chicago as well. Many allege that it is a gross abuse of power, and an illegal use of federal agents to deal with local City and State issues. In Portland, the agents were not identified as law enforcement officers, tear gassed protesters, and hauled protesters into unmarked rental vans. Pretty scary! Mayor Kenney says the City will oppose federal intervention here.

The City began negotiations with the Parkway encampment leaders and other homeless advocates to close down the site. (Last week's deadline for the occupants to vacate was postponed). The City has already placed some 40

residents of the encampment in other housing. The Mayor is mindful of the adverse effect the problem is having on the Fairmount Sports team, who are unable to use Von Colln Field because of the tents.
