#### **City News:**

**Sam-O-Swim** is in desperate need of a new roof. The current roof is leaking and causing damage to the interior of the building. Consensus was reached by the City Council that the swimming pool is important to have in Baker City. City Council voted unanimously to award the contract to the lowest bidder Premier Roofing. The city had already placed \$450,000 in reserve for the repair but will need to budget another \$87,000. The project will span 2 budget fiscal years. While spending money on a tight budget is hard, the council felt that if we lost the swimming pool it might not be replaceable.

The City and Council are looking at writing goals for the future. These include annual goals and a vision for the future. The city manager has asked each councilor to write 3 each of short term, intermediate and long term goals. Citizen input would be great. #### Arts:

#### **Crossroads Carnegie Art Center**

Congratulations to Crossroads! City Council voted to approve Resolution 3972 designating Crossroads as the Local Arts Agency for Baker City. By making Crossroads an official LAA more grants are open for application. The responsibilities they have as being an LAA include: maintaining an arts library, keeping arts related directories, producing a newsletter, promoting the arts, maintain a central box office, marketing support, showcasing artists, supporting public art, and developing education programs.

## Powder River Music Revue (PRMR) Acoustic Jam:

PRMR brings music 2 nights per week to Baker City. The jams offer a chance for anyone to play. It is free to attend and listen to local musicians enjoying their craft. You can tap your toe to the music on Wednesdays at the VFW (open to the public, kids are welcome until 9pm) and Saturdays at Ison House. The music runs from 6 to about 9 pm.

#### **Healthcare:**

The single most important change in modern times for saving lives is clean drinking water. 1,000,000 people die annually from diseases caused by unsafe drinking water globally. If you look up old records about early pioneer life, dysentery was a major illness caused by bad food and water.

Otherwise, the number one medical intervention for saving lives is vaccines. Before the polio vaccine 16,000 cases and 1800 deaths were reported annually. This is just reported numbers. In 2023 the US had no reported wild poliovirus infections. If we take from 1956 (the year after Polio vaccine became available) and assumed no vaccine was invented and multiply those numbers to today (68 years), the vaccine has prevented 1,088,000 cases and 122,000 deaths. This is just 1 vaccine. There is a lot of controversy surrounding vaccines. If you are unsure talk to someone you trust that can read the information available and make an informed decision. Don't let false and misleading information that is prolific in fake news and social media be your deciding factor.
