Food

Big Shout Out to Rohner Farms for the HUGE potato donations. Many people in Baker are having food drives, including: D&J Tacos, Crossroads Carnegie Art Center, Goodfellas, Saint Alphonsus, May Day, Community Connections, Baker County Democrats.

Food can also be taken to the Baker City Compassion Center, May Day, Blue Mountain Food Pantry.

Help at restaurants: The Mother Lode is having a pay what you can meal daily. If you can help them feed people stop by and have lunch, maybe pay for someone's meal. D&J Tacos is offering special meal deals and discounts.

While SNAP benefits have been loaded for November, we still have Federal employees without paychecks and heating assistance/ HUD payments are on hold.

Cash Donations can be huge at Oregon Food Bank Network. Our local Community Connections buys from the network. Typical pricing that they can get items for:

Frozen ground beef 30 lbs. for \$5.70

Canned vegetables 50 lbs. for 7.50

Pork steaks 76 lbs. for \$11.40

A little money goes a long ways. An entire truckload might be \$124.00.

Saint Alphonsus has signed a new contract with Humana Health Insurance. Saint Alphonsus's providers and facilities will be in-network.

Health Care

One of the hurdles in negotiations to end the shutdown is healthcare. The Affordable Care Act (ACA) also nicknamed Obamacare had tax credits for eligible people. These credits applied to individuals as well as small businesses. Examples of possible changes in 2026:

- Single person making \$28,000: \$325/month increasing to \$1562/month
- A 59 year old widow making \$63,000: \$5355/year increasing to \$14,213/year
- A family of 4 making \$60,000 (2 adults working full time above federal minimum wage): \$250/month to \$600/month

The cuts to Medicaid that will start in 2025 are expected to cost Oregon \$1.4 billion per year with up to \$16 billion over 10 years. An estimate of 200,000 people will eventually lose coverage in Oregon.

These cuts and difficulties surrounding them like potential hospital closures and cuts to services

lead to a discussion about healthcare. **On November 22nd there will be a community meeting**

on healthcare at 11 am at Community Connections. Another place to go to learn about a
