Free mental health help debuts on Massey campus

Students and young people aged 18-25 will now be able to access free counselling and mental health support on the Massey Wellington campus.

The mental health pilot programme Piki originally launched in Porirua in February and is now available through Massey's student health services as well as other providers throughout the Wellington region.

The programme is about early intervention to prevent mental health

issues, according to Health Minister Dr David Clark and Associate Health Minister Julie Anne Genter.

They said Piki would help up to around 10,000 young people in these areas with "mild to moderate" mental health symptoms.

Clark said the service would help people improve their mental health "without feeling judged".

Students will be able to refer themselves

for the service, ring helpline 1737, or seek help from their doctor or local hospital.

The programme is delivered through Tū Ora Compass Health along with other partners. At the end of March this year, Piki had provided just over 1300 therapy sessions to 609 young people.

All Piki counsellors will complete Cognitive Behavioural Therapy training at the University of Otago before working with students and young people.
