# Mya Dunn Wins Prestigious Irene Ryan Award



Zeta Tau Alpha proudly celebrates Mya Dunn, a junior, for winning the esteemed Irene Ryan Acting Scholarship. This prestigious honor recognizes outstanding collegiate actors nationwide, and Mya's exceptional talent, dedication, and hard work have distinguished her as a rising star in the theater world.

Many may remember Irene Ryan as "Granny" from The Beverly Hillbillies. A celebrated actress whose career spanned from the 1940s until her passing in 1973, Ryan's legacy continues through this scholarship, which supports excellence in collegiate acting.

Mya earned first place out of 290 competitors, securing a \$500 scholarship. The competition took place in Des Moines, Iowa, where she spent a week in January refining her craft. She delivered a compelling monologue, It's Terrible Being Nice, from Goodbye Charlie by Gabriel Dans, and performed a scene from John Quincy Adams by Aaron Posner alongside her partner, Kian Foster. She was nominated for this prestigious

competition by Trevor Belt, Professor of Theatre at Baker University.

The Irene Ryan Acting Scholarship is awarded annually through the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival (KCACTF), which provides students with national recognition and career advancement opportunities in the performing arts. Many past recipients have gone on to successful careers in theater, television, and film, and Mya is poised to follow in their footsteps.

Looking ahead, Mya will compete in April for the National Irene Ryan Scholarship in Washington, D.C., where she will be one of only eight finalists.

Zeta Tau Alpha is incredibly proud of Mya's remarkable achievement, and we eagerly anticipate all that she will accomplish. Please join us in congratulating her on this outstanding success!

# FINANCIAL REALITIES

The financial picture for the House Corporation has not changed much since a year ago, as the chapter is still small in numbers. For several years, during COVID and since, the House Corporation has done what it can to help by lowering the rent the chapter pays for use of the facility. The normal rent at this point should be more than \$100,000 - as it was in 2019. Since then, the chapter rent has been as low as zero, meaning they've used the facility for free. Currently, chapter rent is \$25,000. With routine operating costs of more than \$65,000 per year, it's easy to see the stress on the House Corporation reserves.

The window replacement project was put on hold during and after COVID. But this summer, for the preservation of the facility, we are moving ahead with replacing 11 windows on the northwest side of the house. Siding, window coverings, collateral damage requiring repair and paint on affected rooms will also be done. Some of the funds necessary for this have been in reserve for some time. This project is in addition to the regular operating expenses of the House Corporation.
