The SAL (Sons of the American Legion) Scholarship application is open. We will be giving away two \$500 scholarships to eligible graduating seniors from Hayfield High School.


We donated \$100 to a group working on restoration of Civil War headstones in cemeteries around the state.

Nancy Haukom February Veteran of the Month

Nancy (Jensen) Haukom graduated from Austin High School in 1969. She worked for Owatonna Canning Company for several months before signing up for a three-year enlistment in the WAC (Women's Army Corp), with a guarantee for training as a Medical Lab Technician.

On January 22, 1970, Nancy reported to Fort McCellan, Alabama (near Anniston) for her basic training. She remembers it being chilly and rainy much of the that time. They did much the same as the male recruits with lots of marching, calisthenics, KP, and the gas chamber, but no weapons training! She was promoted to E-2 upon completion of basic and had a brief leave back home.

Haukom's next assignment was to Fort Sam Houston, TX in late May 1970 for Medical Tech training. Many Vietnam veterans with serious burns came through this post. Nancy was promoted to E-3 upon completion of her training.

She was transferred to Fort Belvoir, VA and worked in the DeWitt Army Hospital lab for six months. She was then attached to Vint Hill Farm Station dispensary, an Army security facility and home of the Morse Code Interceptors, whose assignment was to monitor messages from all over the world. Nancy was the Lab Tech for the facility, so she "did it all". In January 1971, she was promoted to Specialist 5.

A highlight for Nancy was to be among five WACs who conferred with Brigadier General Mildred Bailey regarding their concerns, discrimination, and opportunities with WAC.

Haukom remembers a bomb scare in 1972 which caused a "lock down" of the post. At that time, she was supposed to be meeting her mother and her sister at the airport! It caused considerable stress until they were cleared to leave the post!

Nancy was released from active duty as a Spec-5 and used the GI Bill for additional schooling. She briefly attended Austin Community College taking prerequisites for a major in Medical Technology. Haukom changed majors and attended Rochester Community College to earn her RN degree, and she worked for St Marys Hospital/Mayo Clinic in Rochester for 35 years. During this time, she earned a Bachelor's degree in Nursing from St. Catherine College in St. Paul.

Nancy met Larry Haukom at the Austin American Legion while at a Vietnam Appreciation event. They were married in August of 1975, and raised two daughters: Lisa and Laura.

Doug Kiser March Veteran of the Month

Doug Kiser graduated from Hayfield High School with the class of 1970. In December he, and Wayne Otterbein, (from Waltham), signed up for a three-year enlistment in the army on the "Buddy System". They reported to Fort Campbell, KY for Basic Training after Christmas. The guys were immediately split up into two different companies! It turned out that Bob Wildeman (from Sargeant) was also stationed there with a different training company

Kiser finished Basic Training and had a short leave back home before reporting to Fort Leonard Wood, MO for his AIT (Advanced Individual Training) as a Company Clerk. Upon completion of his training Doug was promoted to PFC. He received a number of additional "shots" since he was destined for Vietnam, through Fort Ord, CA. Upon arriving at Fort Ord, the army had lost his medical records, so he received all the shots again!

While waiting for his "shipping out" orders, the military had begun reducing the troops being sent to Vietnam, so Kiser was sent to Fort Dix NJ. After more processing for European duty, along with more shots, since his medical records didn't show that he'd received them. . . again! Doug flew 26 hours to England, then to Baumholter, Germany with an assignment to the 78th Engineer Company located at Rheinland Kaserne near Ettlingen, Germany.

The company needed a new mail clerk, so this became Doug's assignment. He would go into town every day to pick up the mail and return to the base for sorting and distribution. With that job completed, he would take a deuce and a half truck to a distribution center to pick up supplies for the mess hall kitchen, then return to his mail room for the rest of the day.

Kiser was promoted to Spec-3 in mid-1971, and flew home for Christmas that year. He used some 3-day passes to do some local sightseeing while stationed near Ettlingen.

Doug's brother was in a serious accident in the spring of 1973, so Doug requested, and was granted, an "early out" to go home to help his dad with the farming. He mustered out at Fort Dix in June of 1973 as a Spec 3.

Doug married Angie Perrigo on Aug 11, 1984 and they raised three children: Heather, Megan, and Nate.

Steve Wiste April Veteran of the Month

Steve Wiste graduated from Adams High School in 1969, and went to work for Osmanson Brothers Construction of Adams.

Steve's lottery number was 27, so it was only a matter of time before his being drafted. So, he looked up the Air Force recruiter, and enlisted in the Air Force for four years.

Wiste reported to Lackland Air Force Base, San Antonio, Texas for his Basic Training. He was attached to the 37th Training Wing. Since he was in good condition from his work on road construction, the physical training was not difficult for him! Steve got his first stripe when he completed Basic in early January 1970. He used his leave time to go home to Adams and see his family.

Steve reported to the 4756th Engineer Squadron at Tyndall Air Base at Panama City, Florida for On-The-Job Training on heavy equipment including motor graders, loaders, dozers, trucks, and mowers. Wiste was promoted to Airman First Class in January 1972.

Wiste was stationed at Tyndall Air Force Base for the rest of his enlistment, although he did put in for a transfer...which was turned down!

Steve came home twice during his enlistment, and his dad made a trip down to see him while he was in Florida, otherwise he stuck pretty close to the base.

Wiste remembers a very hot, sticky, day in Florida, when his crew decided to cool down a case of beer, using the CO2 from a nearby fire extinguisher. They got caught by the Commanding Officer and were chewed out royally, for their lack of discretion!

The need for additional troops in Vietnam was declining, so Wiste put in for an "early out", which was granted. He was released from active duty in July of 1974 as a Buck Sergeant. His first job was with Wilson Packing Company at Albert Lea, but he was soon hired by the Minnesota Department of Transportation, out of Austin, where he spent the next 43 years.

Steve, and his wife, raised five children: Steve Jr, Greg, Matt, Jenny, and Joe.

VA Compensation

Types of Compensation

VA disability compensation provides monthly benefits to Veterans in recognition of the effects of disabilities, diseases, or injuries incurred or aggravated during active military service. The program also provides monthly payments to surviving spouses, dependent children, and dependent parents in recognition of the economic loss caused by a Veteran's death during military service or, after discharge from military service, as a result of a service-connected disability. A summary of VA's disability compensation programs is below.

Disability Compensation

A tax-free monetary benefit paid to Veterans with disabilities that are the result of a disease or injury incurred or aggravated during active military service. The benefit amount is graduated according to the degree of the Veteran's disability on a scale from 10 percent to 100 percent (in increments of 10 percent). Compensation may also be paid for disabilities that are considered related or secondary to disabilities occurring in service and for disabilities presumed to be related to circumstances of military service, even though they may arise after service. Generally, the degrees of disability specified are also designed to compensate for considerable loss of working time from exacerbations or illnesses.

Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC)

DIC is a tax-free monetary benefit generally payable to a surviving spouse, child, or parent of Servicemembers who died while on active duty, active duty for training, or inactive duty training, or to survivors of Veterans who died from their service-connected disabilities. Parents DIC is an income-based benefit for parents who were financially dependent on of a Servicemember or Veteran who died from a service-related cause.

Special Monthly Compensation (SMC)

SMC is an additional tax-free benefit that can be paid to Veterans, their spouses, surviving spouses and parents. For Veterans, Special Monthly Compensation is a higher rate of compensation paid due to special circumstances such as the need of aid and attendance by another person or by specific disability, such as loss of use of one hand or leg. For spouses and surviving spouses, this benefit is commonly referred to as aid and attendance and is paid based on the need of aid and attendance by another person.

Claims Based on Special Circumstances

Veterans may be eligible for other types of disability compensation once a disability has been determined to be service connected. Special VA disability compensation programs include: individual unemployability, automobile allowance, clothing allowance, prestabilization, hospitalization, convalescence, dental, and birth defects.
