Dan Wilson Jan. Veteran of the Month

Dan Wilson says his "growing up" years in Cloquet, Minnesota helped to prepare him for the challenges he would face in Vietnam. His explorations in the big woods surrounding their home, his encounters with the hobos who frequented their neighborhood and racing stock cars, all just for the thrill of it!

Wilson graduated from Cloquet, High School in the spring of 1966, and attended the University of Minnesota Duluth for two years. During that time, Wilson was a life guard and a Water Safety Instructor for the college which helped to cover his college tuition.

In the spring of 1968, with his draft notice in his hand, Dan enlisted in the US Navy for four years

. He reported to the largest naval base on the West Coast, Naval Base San Diego, for ten weeks of Boot Camp. Because of his excellent swimming ability, he came within 1/100 of a second of setting the record in the fifty-yard swimming competition at the base! He smiles, as he remembers putting on a friend's dog tags and taking the swimming test for the fellow who couldn't swim! When Wilson completed his 16-weeks of AIT, he was assigned to the USS New Jersey for a short time.

Dan was sent to Vietnam, landing at Da Nang, and spent some time at Sadec and Bo Dee. Wilson was helo-lifted to Saigon, and eventually made his way to Tan Son Nhut. He was assigned to Coastal Patrol 13 and later to the Inland Patrol using "Swift" boats, equipped with M-60 machine guns. Wilson navigated the rivers while searching for the location, and/or activity, of the Viet Cong. Dan had very high praise for the Montagnard troops, (usually 3 to 5 men), who would accompany him on these forays into the jungle. Dan received shrapnel in his shoulder and in one knee during action in Vietnam.

In 1971, Wilson left Vietnam, flying to Japan and into McClellan Air Force Base at Sacramento, CA where he was released from active duty as an E-4.

He worked as a manager for the Pamida Corporation, and eventually went into business for himself when he founded "The Rusty Nut"; making clocks out of old automobile hubcaps, which he marketed all over the world!

Dan married Bette Frantum from Albert Lea and they raised three children: Tarissa, Thomas, and Dusty.

Dave Santjer Feb. Veteran of the Month

Dave Santjer graduated from Renville High School in 1968. At the time he had three older brothers who were serving on Active Duty or in the Reserves at Willmar.

Dave was among six seniors who all signed up together with the 825th Supply Reserve Company at Willmar, and left for Basic Training at Fort Bragg, North Carolina the end of June 1968. They were all assigned to the same training outfit. Santjer remembers the really hot, "sticky" weather, and the salt pills that were issued every noon! Another memory is when the drill sergeant had the platoon "police" the area for cigarette butts, bury them, and dig them up again! They were all in good physical condition and "survived" the rigors of Basic Training.

Dave graduated the end of July and had a ten day leave back home before reporting to Fort Lee, Virginia for Advanced Training in Supply Management. They had more free time now so they did some sightseeing in the area. There were also some fellows from New York in their unit, so they made some trips to see the city, and experience swimming in the salt water ocean, and riding the subway, a new experience for these boys from Minnesota!

Santjer finished his "supply training" in November of 1968, and was surprised to "fail" his eye test, and needing glasses. He hung around the base for several days before they told him he could leave. They would mail the glasses to him!

Santjer was released from active duty and reported to the 825th Supply Company at Willmar for monthly training sessions and summer camps at Camp Ripley, MN and Camp McCoy, Wisconsin. He made the rank of Spec 4 that winter back at Willmar. They also did some "Winter Survival" training in the Willmar area.

With his farm background Dave was shifted into the Motor Pool when the Sergeant discovered he could back up trucks, and semi-tractor trailers with precision! He fulfilled his six year obligation to military duty in June 1974 and was released from the Reserves at Willmar, with the rank of PFC.

Dave graduated from Canby Vo Tech in the Fertilizer and Agronomy program and worked for a time at Terra Inc. in Marshall. He was hired by Bill Reese to come to work for Reese Farm Center in April 1974.

Santjer served as mayor of Hayfield for twenty-five years, and was also a member of the Hayfield Fire department for twenty four years.

Dave married Ruth Dewitt of Canby in May 1971, and they raised four children: Amy, Bill, Joe, and Mark.
