ATTENTION VETERANS & FAMILIES,

I'm sure you know that when you die, your family is entitled to a "**burial flag**" from the US Government. However, in order for the funeral director to get your flag, they need a copy of your **DD-214 (Separation Papers).** Our flags are distributed through the Hayfield Post Office ... **AND** they need a copy of your DD-214 to account for each flag given out! I have gotten several calls from family members hoping we have a copy of your DD-214 ... we do not!

So, please make a copy available to your family, or at least tell them where they can find it when needed. Thank you!

Duane Anderson March Veteran of the Month

Duane Anderson graduated from Hayfield Community Schools with the class of 1967, and went directly to work at the Land O'Lakes elevator in Brownsdale. He and a group of guys were renting an apartment above the hardware store in Brownsdale. All of their "numbers" were coming up soon, so they all volunteered to be drafted. They began their basic training at Fort Campbell, KY in February 1968. After basic they were split up, with Anderson doing his AIT in Infantry at Fort Polk, LA. Near the end of his training, the Sergeant told them the top five guys in a PT test would have a weekend pass! Duane qualified, but found out that it really meant he was fit for jungle duty in Vietnam!

Following a 30 day leave back home, he arrived in Saigon July 24, 1968. They "processed" at Camp Bear Cat where he was promoted to PFC. Anderson was assigned to "E" Company, with the 2/39th Brigade of the 9th Infantry Division. (Located at Rach Kein, 35-40 miles SE of Saigon) The Viet Cong were sending 70 mm mortars at them, and we were firing "four-duce" (4.2) mortars back at them. Much of their action was at night, using "Starlight Scopes" (early infra-red thermal imaging) to see what the enemy was doing. He asked a combat vet what he needed to know to stay alive. He replied "Follow me, do what I do, and stay off those nice dry rice patty dikes, walk in the mud!" Duane made Spec-4 a few months later.

Anderson had about six months to serve in Vietnam when he qualified for 5 days of R & R in Sidney, Australia. That was good duty! In October of 1969, he lost a friend from Austin and was asked to accompany the body home, but the CO nixed the idea. Duane did manage to stay in touch with the family.

Anderson was sent to Dong Tam for processing after his year of service "in country". They were loaded on a troop ship and measured for new uniforms for their arrival home. They flew home in five huge planes where they were "disinfected" with hand garden sprayers to make sure they weren't bringing back "something" to our country! After a 30 day leave, he spent six months at Fort Benning as an instructor in bayonet and hand-to-hand combat for OCS trainees. He was released as a Sergeant Feb. 20, 1970.

Anderson worked in sales for Hormel for five years, and Crowley Beverage for eight years, and began farming on his own in 1976.

Duane married Sally Crowley/Christenson of Austin in August 1970 and they raised two children: Heather and Neal.

Wayne Otterbein April Veteran of the Month

Wayne Otterbein graduated from Hayfield High School in the spring of 1969 and drove a semi tractor trailer for a year. His draft number was getting close, so he and Doug Kiser (Sargeant) talked to an army recruiter. They enlisted in December 1970, but didn't have to report until after the holidays!

They left Minneapolis in a blizzard and flew to Fort Campbell, KY to begin their eight weeks of basic training. Then it was off to Fort Polk, LA for eight weeks of AIT with 81mm Mortars. Otterbein was trained as a Forward Observer and also in the Fire Directional Center which directs the coordination of the mortars. The weather was very hot and humid. The training also included speed marches, artillery training, and jungle combat training, plus operation and maintenance of APC (Armored Personnel Carriers). He recalls the drill sergeant warning them to watch out for "Jake the Snake"! They were told they would all likely receive orders for Viet Nam upon completion of their training! Later, they learned that President Nixon was conducting an infantry draw down in Viet Nam, so most of them received orders for Germany!

Following a short leave back home, Wayne flew to

Fort Dix, NJ for processing before flying to Berlin, Germany. He was assigned to McNair Barracks located near the Berlin Wall. Otterbein was attached to the Berlin Brigade with Company B, 4th Battalion, 18th Infantry. He made PFC shortly after arriving. That unit was later retired, and they became Co. B, 4th Battalion, 6th Brigade. Wayne's main job was in the FDC (Fire Directional Center) as Assistant Computer and eventually Chief Computer. They would determine the precise settings for firing the 81 mm mortars. He made Spec. 4 in July 1971.

Every four months their outfit was assigned to stand guard at Spandau Prison in Berlin, which held one prisoner, Adolph Hitler's chief deputy, Rudolf Hess! (He had been sentenced to life in prison for war crimes.) Otterbein recalls seeing him a number of times while on guard duty.

During the 1972 Olympics in Munich, a number of Israeli athletes were massacred. Wayne's Battalion was put on alert and lockdown for days for fear of rioting.

Otterbein was released from active duty at Fort Dix, NJ in Dec. 1972 with the rank of E-5. He drove truck for about 10 years, and then worked for Akkerman Manufacturing building and operating underground boring machines. After retiring from the union, he worked at Mayo Clinic for another 18 years.

Wayne married Vicky Lonergan in 1972 and they raised 3 children: Trevor, Angela, and Nicole. He is now married to Pamela Lickteig of Brownsdale. We are again offering "In Memory of" or "In Honor of" crosses for a donation of \$5 each. These crosses will have the name of the person you are memorializing, or someone you wish to honor...living or deceased. (The person need not be a Legion member). Each individual named will have a cross. We would like to have these donations soon, so we can begin to create a wall "In Memory" and "In Honor" with these crosses at the Legion Club. 
