#### Louis Ziegler September Veteran of the Month

Louis Ziegler graduated from Baie Comeau High School in Quebec in 1962. His dad was working for the Cargill Grain Company in Canada at the time. After graduation he moved to California for work.

Lou was drafted in May 1965, and was expecting to do his Basic Training at Fort Ord, California. However, they had an outbreak of Meningitis there, so he was sent to Fort Polk, Louisiana. He remembers the extreme heat and humidity at Fort Polk! He had a short leave following Basic Training, and went to Fort Sill, OK for his Advanced Individual Training in Artillery. He was promoted to PFC when he finished that training.

Ziegler was sent to the Brooklyn Army Base in New York for overseas processing. They boarded a transport ship and headed for Bremerhaven, Germany. He was assigned to the galley and managed to eat enough soda crackers to keep from being as sick as the rest of the troops!

There was more processing at Bremerhaven, and he was sent by train to Frankfurt and eventually to Hanau, Germany. (East of Frankfurt.) Ziegler was assigned to B Battery, 1st Cav, and 26th Artillery. He was the "Instrument Man" for their 12-man crew, and it was his responsibility to accurately level the howitzer before it could be accurately fired. The 26th Artillery had many field assignments at Grafenwöhr; a training camp is Eastern Bavaria.

Lou also spent some time as a driver for his Sergeant, who spoke fluent German, so they often took side-trips to explore the German villages!

Ziegler recalls a surprise meeting one evening with his cousin at the Enlisted Men's Club. Neither of them knew the other was in the area! Another pleasant memory of Lou's was the chance to see Charlie Pride in concert on their base! Lou also took advantage of several military R&R "breaks" in the Garmisch, Germany area!

In April 1967, he flew back to "the States", and was released from active duty as a Spec 4. He used his GI Bill to attend Los Angeles Harbor College at Wilmington, California. Ziegler was employed by Pacific Bell as a Lineman and Splicer. His work took him to Tehachapi, California, near Edwards Air Force Base and also to the Mohave Desert near Bakersfield to work with the space shuttle program.

Lou and his wife Kathy were married in April 1969, and have two sons: Steve and Karlin in Hayfield plus David and Melissa in Indiana.

#### **Tony Anderson October Veteran of the Month**

Anthony Anderson graduated from Ellendale-Geneva High School in 1962. He played Legion Baseball the summer after graduation and worked at a number of area jobs in the area until he enlisted in the Air Force in June 1964.

Anderson was sent to Lackland Air Force Base near San Antonio, Texas for Basic Training He remembers the extreme heat and humidity there.

Following a brief leave back home at Ellendale, Tony reported to Sheppard Air Force Base near Wichita Falls, Texas. He was assigned to the 3752 Student Squadron for training as a jet engine mechanic and in July 1964 he was promoted to Airman 3<sup>rd</sup> Class. In October 1964, Tony was assigned to 3560 Field Maintenance Squadron at Webb AFB, Big Spring, TX.

He was trained on the J-79 jet engine which is used on all F-104 fighter planes. These are the planes which fly surveillance day and night along our southern US border. He was promoted to Airman 2<sup>nd</sup> class when he completed his training.

Anderson had played a lot of baseball when he was in high school, in addition to Legion Baseball. So when he had an opportunity to "try out" for the team on base, he signed up and "made" the team! Tony would be assigned TDY to play baseball all over Texas and Oklahoma, and he played in front of numerous professional baseball scouts! He was promoted to Airman 1st Class in Octber 1966.

Anderson used a number of 3-4 day passes to explore the area from Arkansas to Texas, plus some longer leaves to come home to Ellendale.

In the spring of 1968, when Tony's enlistment was nearly complete, the company commander called him into his office and laid out \$3,800 on the table. He was told ... "That's yours AND a promotion to Staff Sergeant, plus a 60 day leave if you'll "re-up" for four years!" Tony says it was tempting, but he decided to get out instead! He was released from active duty at Webb Air Force Base in June 1968 as a Sergeant.

After his release, he played a lot of fast-pitch softball. Tony was the owner of Ellendale Hardware and Lumber for 8 years and later was a bartender at the Frontier Lounge. That's how he became a member of Post 330!

After a five-year stent with IFP at Oslo, he retired.
