




The museum is open on Tuesdays and Thursdays 2-4 pm, and the 2nd and 4th Saturday 1-3 pm. Be sure to stop by!

South San Francisco's 1908 Incorporation

We are planning to celebrate our Historic 1920 City Hall later this year. But what caused little South San Francisco to incorporate in 1908?

In 1888, the Miller and Lux Cattle empire at Baden was waning after the death of Lux just as Gustavus Swift came West. He was a leader in the American meat industry and he came to investigate the possibility of starting a market and packing center near San Francisco. He found this area perfect for the meat business. It was only ten miles from the center of San Francisco and offensive odors would blow out into the Bay.



Swift started the Western Meat Packing Company in partnership with several other eastern meat companies. Following his success with South Boston and South Omaha, Swift decided to call this location South San Francisco. He brought Peter Iler from Omaha as his agent to handle things. Iler purchased land, including the former Lux Ranch.

Iler continued buying land under the name of The South San Francisco Land and Improvement Company. This company was made up of wealthy investors, including Swift's son, Iler himself, Miller and others. The Company held its first meeting in February 1891. They had a broad agenda. They planed to provide a deep water channel and railroad access for industries. They promised sewers, water pipes and concrete sidewalks for every residential lot. They made improvements in the area and boosted the reputation of South San Francisco as a place to live as well as a place to locate industry. W. J. Martin and E. E. Cummings were to carry out the objectives of the company, and eventually Iler returned to Omaha. In 1894, the company built a modest school, serving elementary through high school students.

In 1893, Martin succeeded in landing Steiger Pottery Works as the first new industry in South San Francisco. By 1895, South San Francisco was a family community with a population of 671; the majority of the men worked in the meat packing plant. There was also a transient male population of workers from other nearby communities and those staying in boarding houses and hotels. With this male population came an abundance of saloons and other establishments that gave South San Francisco a reputation for being a pretty rowdy town.

Fuller Paint was the next industry to locate in South San Francisco in 1898, followed by Pacific Jupiter Steel. Other early industries moved in. In 1906 the SSF Land and Improvement Company reached an agreement with Selby Smelting Company to build a huge smelting plant at Point San Bruno that would employ 3000 men. They sold land to Selby at less than one quarter of its market value. The recently negotiated relocation of the railroad was completed, putting the new line right next to South San Francisco's Industrial area.

When neighboring communities found out about the Selby deal, a groundswell of opposition developed. The wealthy estate owners on the peninsula as well as San Franciscans objected to the byproducts of a smelting plant. They felt it would harm the people and the environment. Along with the farming community, they formed the Home Protective Association and hired two Stanford Professors to press their case. These professors argued that the smelter would destroy the County with pollutants. They calculated the amount of sulfur dioxide as well as arsenic that would be produced daily. They pointed out that the wind at San Bruno Point offered only partial protection, and that fog and rain would compound the problem. South San Francisco's other industries also came to oppose Selby's plant. They feared that somehow their taxes would increase.

San Mateo County's Board of Supervisors got involved. They passed an ordinance in January 1908 that effectively prohibited a smelting plant being located anywhere in the County.

South San Franciscans were not ready to give up, however. They voted in March to incorporate into a city which would then not be restricted by the County ordinance. The town was to include the Selby property, the rest of the industrial area, and Tanforan Race Track.

The County had to agree to the act of incorporation, however. The Supervisors voted 4-1 to grant this accord, but they drew the city limits to exclude the Selby property as well as Tanforan. The rest of the industrial area would still be inside the town limits. September 3, 1908, the locals voted 218 to 36 to accept the compromise. The town now had a population of 1,989 and had 14 major industries as well as 18 saloons. It joined San Mateo and Redwood City as a new city. Selby's smelter was never built.

The South San Francisco Land and Improvement Company sued Selby Smelting and Lead Company for \$1,730,411 in damages because they did not build as agreed, They had sold the land below value to Selby because of the deep channel docks and other improvements they were expected to build. Selby countered that they had spent much money in preliminary work before the opposition prevented them from building.

Other industries did move in to South San Francisco and the city flourished. Steel, in the form of seven different manufacturing plants, became the dominant industry, bolstered by two World Wars and California's post-war building boom. Even shipbuilding occupied the deepwater berths during the wars. This lasted until the mid 50's.

Then South San Francisco inadvertently began a deindustrialization move. In the center of its industrial area, there was a solid rock hill 150 feet high covering 80 acres. The Utah Construction Company was granted a permit to blast away the hill, using the debris as landfill for nearby marshland. Development in this new area was restricted from having smokestacks or excess noise or pollutants. Cabot, Cabot and Forbes built a light Industrial Park. By 1958 there were 170 businesses located here. Traditional industry ultimately fled. Western Meat, Fuller Paint and Bethlehem Steel closed. Genentech, established in 1976, became the first Bio-Tech corporation to locate in South San Francisco because the rent was cheap. Today there are over 200 Biotech companies located in what is still The Industrial City.
