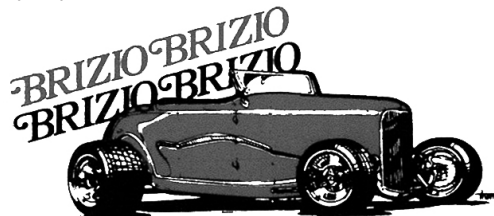


Program for September General Meeting

Magnolia Senior Center, 601 Grand Avenue, South San Francisco

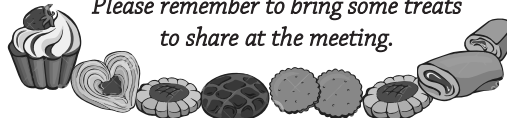

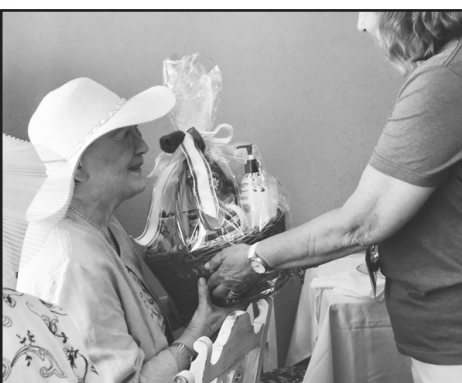


PLYMIRE-SCHWARZ HOUSE Tea & Boutique

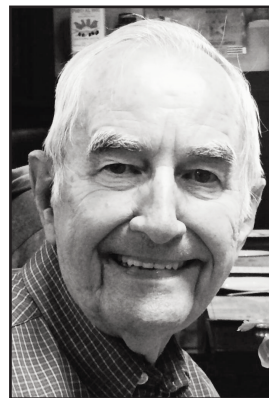

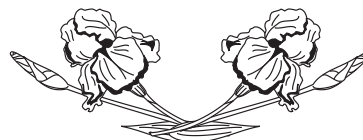

Ray was born in Swoyersville, PA. He is survived by his loving wife Marie of 61 years, and his three children, Viola Weber (Ken), Raymond, Jr. (Tana) and Kathleen Hoffman (Gary), two grandchildren, two great grandchildren.

Ray and Marie relocated the family to South San Francisco in 1965. Ray was an electrician by trade for nine years and later employed by the City of South San Francisco as a building inspector for 22 years. He was active in many social and professional organizations throughout his life, including the Young Men's Institute Council 32, Elks Club Lodge 2091, SIRS Branch 91, IBEW Local 617 Retirees Club, South San Francisco Conference Center Authority (board member), North Peninsula Boys and Girls Club (golf committee), and National Electrical Contractors Association (NECA).

Ray was very engaged in the Plymire-Schwarz House and South San Francisco Historical Society serving as president from 2008-2010, received the Victor John Feudale Award in 2008, and the Lifetime Achievement Award in 2018.

2019 Recipients of the Victor John Feudale Award



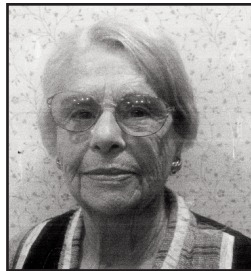
Lynn Boldenweck was born in Madera CA in 1936. Her family settled in Daly City in 1941. Lynn graduated from Jefferson High School in 1955. She worked a summer job at Dun and Bradstreet which was where she met her husband, Bill. She married in 1958 and has two sons, Bill III (1959) and Stephen (1962). She moved to South

San Francisco in 1963. Both sons went to South City schools and graduated from El Camino High School.

Lynn's volunteer work started with the PTA and the South San Francisco Community Scholarship Assoc. She worked on the Christmas Tea At Molloy's and Annual Chili Cookoff fundraisers when they first started. She worked as a sub yard supervisor for the S.S.F.U.S.D. and volunteered in classes at Serra Vista. Working for the school district turned into a full time job as a clerk/registrar at Buri Buri. Lynn retired in 2008.

Lynn is currently active with the Historical Society as a docent at the museum and a volunteer at Plymire Schwarz House events. She is also active with Friends of the Library, the Annual Chili Cook off for the Learning Center, Improving Public Places, the SSF Cultural Arts Commission - Chair, and art class with Buri Buri Kindergarten students.

Lois Severi was born on January 3, 1932, to Nello and Armida Lazzari at SSF General Hospital. She attended Magnolia Grammar School and then 7th-9th grade at SSF Junior-Senior High School. Her Grandfather, Amerigo Lazzari, opened the Corner Market at Maple and Commercial Avenues in the 1920's. Lois remembers fondly stacking

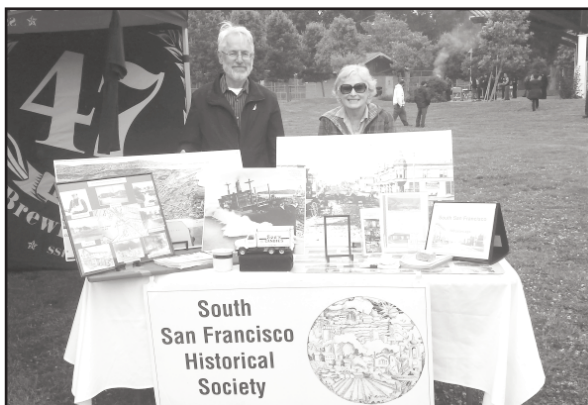
the shelves of the grocery store. In 1946, the family moved to Redwood City and she graduated in 1949 from Sequoia Union High School. She then attended San Jose State and later San Francisco State graduating with a bachelor's degree in education. She began teaching 1st grade in the SSFUSD in 1954 at Parkway. In 1955, staff moved to Sunshine Gardens and opened a K-3 school. She also taught kindergarten or 1st grade at Spruce and Monte Verde. In 1975-77 she returned to SF State and received her master's degree in early childhood education. She retired from the district in 1989 after teaching for 31 years.

In 1955, Lois married Richard Severi and they had three children: Mark, Lori and Scott. She has six grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. In retirement she began to care for three of her grandchildren and did some traveling.

In 2014, Lois discovered the Historical Society and has been volunteering organizing the museum's warehouse. She has thoroughly enjoyed her time at the museum. She is also a member of All Souls Catholic Church and the California Retired Teachers Association.

TOWN OF BADEN – CAPTURES GERMANY’S ATTENTION

“Not many folks remember the place called Baden. Fewer yet know about the notorious events occurring long before the farming community was absorbed by South San Francisco. Baden’s beginnings were boisterous and frantic as any frontier western town inhabited by characters larger than life.” (June Morrall, San Mateo Times correspondent, 3/1/2002.)

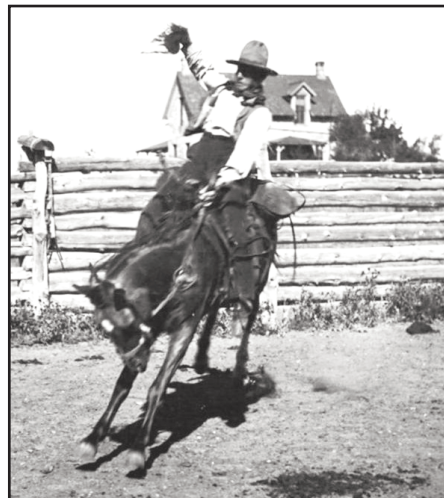
At the turn of the 20th Century, Baden was the Peninsula’s major hold-out to the Old West and home to many cowboys. It became the perfect place for a new industry to develop at the Miller and Lux Ranch – transforming bucking broncos into war horses. In July and August 1900, W. R. Grace & Company of San Francisco, began construction of strong wooden corrals on scores of acres, for the purpose of equine education. Three hundred men were hired to break 5,000 horses and mules for the use of the German army in China. (Germany was a member of the Eight-Nation Alliance fighting near Peking, China, in response to the Boxer Rebellion.) Horses were being brought fresh from the ranges of Montana, Nevada and Northern California.

The contract with Germany was to supply horses and mules, six to ten years of age, weighing about 1,050 pounds or more, and free from blemish, by the end of October. Mr. John Loggan, working for the German government visited Baden in September, to inspect the horse corrals and meet the vaqueros – he found the business running smoothly and on schedule. Locals found it to be an on-going Wild West Show. With the influx of workers and visitors, nearby hotels were filling up. Grace & Co. quickly constructed a boarding house specifically to house and feed 75 to 100 horsemen.



Local merchant, Julius Eikerenkotter, visited Lux Ranch on one particular Wednesday and reported to the Enterprise Journal, that he had the privi-

lege to watch Pete Broner, Al Turner, and John Clueford, among twelve to fifteen other vaqueros, giving a star (and free) performance with dexterity and lightning-like rapidity as they roped, saddled, bridled and broke the untamed colts. Vaqueros, occasionally injured by horse kicking, or, by their own carelessness, were skillfully attended to by Dr. H. J. Plymire, who would put them in bandages and take them out of spurs for a few days. Horses and mules were routinely seen by San Francisco veterinary surgeon Mr. E. J. Eney. There were only a few cases where a horse was so seriously injured, he needed to be put down. Other notable horse lovers in attendance were Supervisor Howard Tilton, Mr. Terrence Masterson of San Bruno House, Mr. Jack Halton of Union Coursing Park, and Captain Rehberg of Baden.



It was a rough and tumble business from beginning to end. The work was done quickly without wasting time on sugar and coaxing. The horses and mules were urgently needed in China, so the breaking in of such a large number means a minimum of time for each. The vaqueros put on a splendid exhibition of rough-riding and reckless nerve for those spectators who purposely made the travel to Baden.

Once the tamed animals were ready for travel, bands of 200 horses and mules were driven down Grand Avenue and up the bay shore to San Francisco. After a

few days they were inspected by the German Government and as soon as accepted they were put into a huge enclosure aboard steamers, such as the Bosnia and Frankfort, for their long ocean journey to China. The choicest specimens were separated and given special attention as they were to serve as officers’ horses on the battlefield.

As the end of October drew near, management commenced reducing the work force as the breaking of horses at the Lux corrals approached completion. W. R. Grace and Co. reported between seven and eight thousand horses and mules were handled at the horse-breaking corrals. Baden’s Wild West Show became a thing of the past, and soon the picturesque vaqueros and their fiery steeds were missed from the streets.
