## BOC launches online tracking portal for 'balikbayan' box deliveries

MANILA – The Bureau of Customs (BOC) has launched an online tracking portal for the door-to-door deliveries of “balikbayan” boxes to the families of overseas Filipino workers (OFWs) nationwide.

In a social media post, the bureau said the public may access <https://customs.gov.ph/home/overseas-filipino-worker-ofw/>, regarding the status of

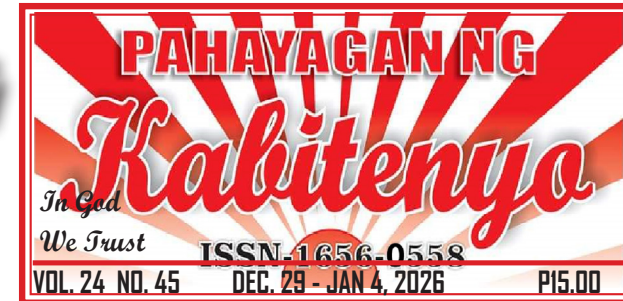
their boxes. Upon accessing the website, the beneficiaries will be able to get information including the Bill of Lading, the container number, consolidator, de-consolidator, country of origin, and the status of the delivery.

At the same time, the bureau reminded the public that no payment of fees will be required for the delivery of the boxes and

the site is continuously updated with each door-to-door rollout. The people are also advised to send an email to [bayanibox@customs.gov.ph](mailto:bayanibox@customs.gov.ph) for inquiries regarding balikbayan boxes.

Earlier, Commissioner Ariel Nepomuceno said the agency would be conducting door-to-door delivery of boxes sent by OFWs.

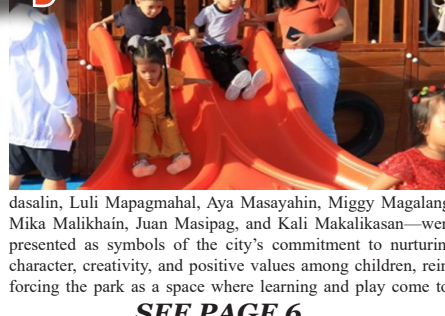

## Senator Allan Peter Cayetano: K-12 Education Crisis Persists Classrooms, Facilities, and Teachers Still Lacking a Decade On

More than ten years after the Philippines implemented the K-12 education program, the country's basic education system continues to grapple with the same structural problems that were highlighted at its launch: overcrowded classrooms, inadequate facilities, and a chronic shortage of teachers.

Despite repeated discussions, proposals, and government programs over the past decade, these chal-



lenges remain unresolved, leaving millions of students and educators frustrated and underserved. Recently, Congress introduced the Classroom-Building Acceleration Program bill, which aims to construct more classrooms across the country to ease congestion in public schools. While education officials and lawmakers have praised the bill as a sincere step forward, critics argue that it

is merely a temporary measure that fails to address the underlying issues that have plagued the K-12 system since its inception. This sentiment was echoed by Senator Allan Peter Cayetano, who has long raised concerns about the persistent deficiencies in the K-12 system. According to Cayetano, while the Classroom-Building Acceleration Program may be well-intentioned, it merely evades the deeper problem: the lack of full funding and support for the



program's comprehensive needs.

“There is no doubt that building more classrooms is necessary,” said Dr. Maria Santos, an education policy analyst. “But unless we also provide sufficient teachers, proper learning materials, and

## Protect and Repair Your Dry Hair

### HEALTH TIPS

Go ahead. Try a fun new hairdo. Take a dip in the pool or a vacation at the beach. But just as you'd slather on sunscreen to shield your skin, take steps to protect your hair.

Sun exposure, chlorine, and salt water can dry hair out. Heat-styling and chemical processing can lead to a string of bad hair days.

But there are a lot of things you can do to keep your hair smooth and silky. Even if you've already got split ends and breaks, you can use damage-control tricks to make it look healthier.

Protect Your Hair "Prevention is key," says Eugene Toye, senior stylist at Rita Hazan Salon in New York. His clients include Sofia Vergara and Neil Patrick Harris.

These simple tips can go a long way toward staving off damage:

- **S h a m p o o.** Choose a shampoo formulated for your hair type. Many shampoos have detergent-like ingredients called sulfates to remove excess dirt and oil, but these can damage hair. Look for formulas that say "sulfate free" and list dimethicone as an ingredient. It increases shine and manageability.

- **M o i s t u r i z e.** After every shampoo, use a conditioner designed for dry or damaged hair. Toye suggests also using regular at-home treatments like deep conditioners (also called protein packs). For mildly dry hair, you may need only one treatment a month. If your hair is very dry, use a deep conditioner once or even twice a week. Your stylist can tell you how often to use it.

- **C o m b c a r e f u l l y.** Dry, damaged hair is prone to breaking because it's so fragile. "Excessive pulling caused by using the wrong comb or brush is a main cause," says Debra Jaliman, MD, a

dermatologist and author of Skin Rules: Trade Secrets from a Top New York Dermatologist. Toye suggests using a wide-toothed comb or a brush that's labeled specifically for detangling hair before getting in the shower. It's more difficult to detangle wet hair without pulling, he says.

- **D r y g e n t l y.** Go easy on towel drying to prevent your dry hair from breaking. Instead of rubbing vigorously, Toye suggests squeezing out water softly -- as you would with a cashmere sweater.

- **S p a r e t h e h e a t.** Limit heat styling to once a week, and use the lowest setting on blow dryers, flat irons, and curling irons. To buy extra time between heat stylings, Toye suggests using a dry shampoo. After applying styling products like gel or mousse and before using heat, put a thermal-protection spray or serum on your hair. "These act like a buffer that prevents heat damage," Toye says.

Repair and Damage Control

"Dry hair worsens with time because of accumulated abuse," Toye says. The only real way to get rid of the damage is to cut off damaged hair.

If a dramatic chop isn't an option, use the prevention and protection techniques described above. They can improve the look and feel of damaged hair. There are a few other ways to make dreary hair look lively:

- **A t h o m e.** In addition to conditioning after you shampoo, use deep conditioning treatments that contain ingredients like wheat proteins, amino acids, or panthenol.

These will help make your hair softer, smoother, and shinier for a

few days. Jaliman also suggests using a leave-in conditioner to add more moisture, if necessary.

- **A t t h e s a l o n.** Keratin treatments are Toye's preferred method of smoothing dry hair. They coat hair with keratin protein, usually with the help of heat.

This helps smooth the hair cuticle, making your hair smooth and shiny for about four weeks. Don't expect miracles, though. "If your hair is slightly dry and frizzy, you'll see a dramatic difference," Toye says. "But if it's completely butchered, you won't."

It's important to know that the safety of keratin treatments has been questioned. Some may contain or release unsafe levels of formaldehyde, a chemical that has been linked to health problems, including cancer.

Healthy hair doesn't happen by accident—it's the result of consistent care and smart habits.

Just like your skin, your hair needs protection from everyday stressors and a routine that supports its strength and moisture. Understanding what causes damage is the first step toward preventing it, and with a few mindful changes, you can maintain hair that looks vibrant, resilient, and full of life year-round.

While no product or treatment can instantly erase years of damage, consistent care can make a noticeable difference over time.

By protecting your hair from environmental stress, minimizing heat and chemical exposure, and nourishing it with the right products, you can restore softness and shine while preventing future breakage. Healthy hair is an ongoing commitment, but with the right habits, every day can be a good hair day.

## The Travel Agencies

Dear PAC,  
Are travel agencies considered as common carriers?

Dear Estela,

Please be informed of Article 1732 of Republic Act 386, otherwise known as the New Civil Code of the Philippines, which states that: "Article 1732. Common carriers are persons, corporations, firms or associations engaged in the

business of carrying or transporting passengers or goods or both, by land, water or air, for compensation, offering their services to the public." (Underscoring and emphasis supplied) Relatedly, in the case of *Crisostomo v. Court of Appeals* (GR 138334, Aug. 25, 2003, penned by Associate Justice Consuelo Ynares-Santiago), it is stated that: "By definition, a contract of carriage or transportation is one whereby a certain person or association of persons obligate themselves to transport persons, things or news from one place to another for a fixed price. Such person or association of persons are regarded as carriers and are classified as private or special carriers and common or public carriers.

It is obvious from the above definition that respondent is not an entity engaged in the business of transporting either passengers or goods and is therefore, neither a private nor a common carrier.

Respondent did not undertake to transport petitioner from one place to another since its covenant with its customers is simply to make travel arrangements on their behalf. Respondent's services as a travel agency include procuring tickets and facilitating travel permits or visas as well as booking customers for tours.

While petitioner concededly bought her plane ticket through the efforts of respondent company, this does not mean that the latter ipso facto is a common carrier. At most, respondent acted merely as an agent of the airline, with whom petitioner ultimately contracted for her carriage to Europe. In contrast, the

object of a contract of carriage is the transportation of passengers or goods. It is in this sense that the contract between the parties in this case was an ordinary one for services and not one of carriage." (Emphasis supplied) Applying the foregoing, a travel agency whose object of contractual relation is to facilitate booking, ticketing and accommodation in a package tour, is not a contract of carriage. On the other hand, a contract of carriage or transportation is one whereby a certain person or association of persons obligate themselves to transport persons, or things from one place to another for a fixed price.

Consequently, as elucidated by the Supreme Court in the above-cited case, a travel agency with such contractual relation is not a common carrier since it is not an entity engaged in the business of transporting either passengers or goods and is therefore, neither a private nor a common carrier.

In other words, a travel agency does not undertake to transport a person or goods from one place to another and only covenant with its customers to make travel arrangements on their behalf.

other essential facilities, we are just patching the system without fixing it."

The K-12 program, which added two years to the Philippine basic education curriculum, was introduced with the promise of producing globally competitive graduates.

Yet, ten years on, the additional years have become a source of strain rather than a symbol of progress. Many schools are forced to cram students into limited classrooms, while teachers juggle large class sizes without the support or resources necessary to deliver quality education.

A recent survey by the Department of Education (DepEd) found that some public high schools have classrooms accommodating more than 50 students, far beyond the recommended student-teacher ratio.

Meanwhile, laboratory equipment, textbooks, and learning materials remain insufficient in many regions, particularly in rural areas.

Senator Cayetano emphasized that there are only two realistic solutions to the ongoing crisis: either fully fund all the requirements of the K-12 program now, including classrooms, teachers, and facilities, or

reconsider the viability of the added two years of education.

"Evading the real problem will not make it go away," said Juan de la Cruz, a high school teacher in Metro Manila. "We can build classrooms, but if we don't hire enough teachers or provide proper equipment, the quality of education will still suffer. Parents and students are the ones who bear the consequences."

The debate over K-12 funding and structure is more than a bureaucratic concern—it has real consequences for students' futures. Overcrowded classrooms, inadequate learning materials, and overworked teachers affect academic performance, mental health, and long-term opportunities for Filipino students.

As the government continues to discuss incremental solutions, education advocates and lawmakers like Senator Cayetano are urging a bold, decisive approach to prevent the crisis from worsening. Without comprehensive action, the challenges that have persisted for more than a decade may continue to hinder the nation's ability to deliver quality education to every child.

MANILA – The Philippines is ready to mediate between Cambodia and Thailand should both parties seek Association of Southeast Asian Nations' (ASEAN) help once Manila assumes the bloc's chairship next year. "Following the discussions today, the Philippines said that it is prepared to assume the role of facilitator/mediator between Cambodia and Thailand should both parties decide to make use of the good offices of the Chair once the Philippines assumes the ASEAN Chairship in January 2026," the Department of Foreign Affairs (DFA) said in a statement on Monday.

The DFA issued the statement following the ASEAN Foreign Ministers' meeting in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, where they discussed the border situation between Cambodia and Thailand.

The Thailand-Cambodia border dispute stems from longstanding territorial claims dating back to colonial-era demarcations, including areas near heritage sites such as the Preah Vihear Temple.

Despite a 1962 International Court of Justice ruling affirming Cambodia's ownership of the temple, unresolved boundaries and historical tensions have led to recurring clashes.

DOLE 12 assists 148,343 workers through TUPAD

MANILA – Close to 150,000 disadvantaged workers across Soccsksargen were provided emergency employment in 2025 with total funding worth PHP668.88 million, which helped families cope with economic shocks and emergencies while supporting community recovery.

In a statement, the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE) Regional Office 12 reported that 148,343 individuals were given temporary jobs under the Tulong Panghanapbuhay sa Ating Disadvantaged/Displaced Workers (TUPAD) program in the region.

Of the total assistance, a total of PHP660.71 million was released as wages, complemented by PHP8.16 million in Government Service Insurance System (GSIS) coverage to ensure beneficiaries' protection while performing community-based work.

In response to disasters, DOLE 12 also extended TUPAD assistance to around 9,782 families or 18,659 individuals affected by typhoons and "habagat" (southwest monsoon) that struck various parts of the region during the year.

The affected residents were able to earn income while contributing

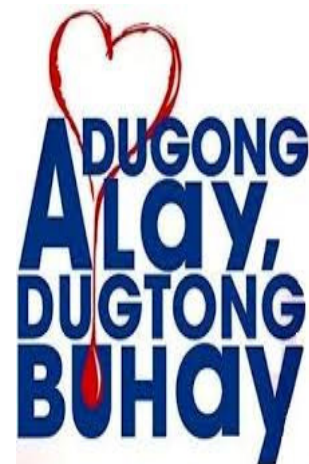


to community recovery through labor-intensive activities such as cleanup, clearing operations, and rehabilitation of public spaces.

It reported that the program likewise prioritized vulnerable and special sectors, reinforcing DOLE's inclusive social protection mandate. Beneficiaries included 488 persons deprived of liberty (PDLs) who received PHP3.9 million, 121 Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino Program (4Ps) members who earned PHP576,200, and 643 former combatants who were provided PHP2.39 million to support their transition to peaceful and productive civilian life.

Officer-in-charge Regional Director Raymond Fel Sajor said TUPAD remains a critical safety net for workers facing sudden loss of income, while also serving as a platform for social development, disaster response, and peacebuilding.

The DOLE official said the interventions were implemented in close coordination with local government units and partner stakeholders, enabling swift and targeted delivery of aid at the grassroots level. (PNA)

Go backs tax exemption on socialized housing projects

MANILA – Streamlining of tax exemption application process for socialized and economic housing will help boost development of housing projects for low-income households, Finance Secretary Frederick Go said Monday.

In a statement, Go said the move of the Bureau of Internal Revenue to streamline the processes for tax exemption for these projects is aimed at enhancing efficiency and ease of doing business.

"I fully support the BIR in this effort, as it is my commitment to enhance

the ease of doing business for our partners in development. This way, we can provide more affordable homes for low-income Filipino families," he said.

A proposed Joint Memorandum Circular (JMC) is set to be issued by the Department of Human Settlements and Urban Development (DHSUD) and other government agencies that will introduce "the One-Stop Shop Processing Center (eHOPC) platform which will generate the required documents to enable more efficient processing of applications."

The JMC sets new maximum price ceilings for new house-and-lot packages at PHP950,000 from PHP850,000, for subdivision packages, while the ceiling for condominium units with land developments remains at PHP1.8 million.

Applicants for the Certificate of Tax Exemption (CTE) must submit a Socialized Housing Certification issued by the DHSUD.
