We believe there should be a paid counsellor in every secondary school, academy, and further education college in England. It's the only country in the UK not to have government-funded school counselling services. The results of our survey of school staff in England help us make the case for greater investment in school counselling.

Increase in demand




95% of respondents whose school offered counselling say demand for this service had increased since the pandemic




12% of respondents whose school offered counselling say funding for this provision had increased since the pandemic, while 20% said it had decreased


Funding needs



96% agree that funding for mental health provision for students should come from Government




89% agree that additional funding for mental health provision in schools should be ringfenced so schools can buy in services




70% of those at schools that have never offered inhouse counselling say it was because they don't have the funding or budget


Not enough support



89% say children and young people's education is suffering due to a lack of mental health support




64% say they don't feel their school offers students enough mental health support




96% say children and young people should have access to counselling before issues become critical


Impact on school



75% say that the school counsellor is the staff member to whom they would refer students who presented with symptoms of emotional distress, bereavement, selfharm, an eating disorder, depression or other issues
