
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Happy New Year!, سنة جديدة سعيدة, Maligayang bagong Taon, C новым годом, Šťastný nový rok, and Buon Anno!

## News from Ukrainian Language Classes for Adults (ULCA)

Due to COVID protocols, classes are not being held during the 2021-22 fall/winter term. However, we wish to share our Ukrainian Christmas traditions with you.

Many Ukrainians still celebrate Christmas according to the Julian calendar. In welcoming the Christ Child, Christmas Eve or *Cemuŭ Beчip*/Sviatey Vechir, meaning Holy evening, is observed with great solemnity and joy on January 6<sup>th</sup>, or on December 24<sup>th</sup> according to the Gregorian calendar.

Because Ukraine is an agrarian country, Christmas traditions include products of the land. A sheaf of wheat, ∂i∂yx/didukh, is placed in a corner under an icon of the Virgin Mary and Christ Child. The grains represent ancestry. A round bread, колач/kolach, or three-tiered

representing the Holy Trinity, form the centrepiece. The candle is representative of Christ, as the light of the world.

The meal begins when the children see the first star in the sky. The family assembles around the table singing 'God Eternal'- Бог Предвічний/Воh Predvichney, the most famous carol which has hymn-like status. This is followed by the proclamation: Christ is Born! *Xpucmoc Родився!*/Khrystos Rodyvsia and responded with Let us Glorify Him! Славім Його!/Slavim Yoho!

The Christmas Eve supper is made up of 12 lenten dishes, meatless and dairy-free, commemorating the 12 Apostles of Christ. It is the last day of a 40-day advent fast in which almsgiving, prayer and personal reflection dominate. The Christmas Eve meal begins with a serving of cooked wheat, poppy seed, honey and nuts which represents ancestry and a wish for prosperity and a bountiful harvest. Additional dishes include variations of *bopul*/borshch, fishes, *nupoeu*/pyrohy with varied fillings, *eonybul*/holubtsi - cabbage rolls, mushroom gravy, seasoned mashed white beans, fruit compote, poppy seed rolls and buns with fillings.

Piздво/Rizdvo or Christmas Day is celebrated by attending the Divine Liturgy at church. People break their fast with other traditional foods and visit extended family and friends. Carollers go from house to house proclaiming the birth of Christ in songs and greetings.

Joyous Holidays! *Beceлux Свят!*/Veselykh Sviat! May 2022 bring you Peace and Joy!

The project was created in collaboration with a school in Siedlee, under supervision of Stowarzyszenie Wspolnota Polska and financed by the Ministry of Education in Poland.

respective cities. Later, we organized a poster contest titled "My City Through My Eyes", where students presented their visions of the city they live in.

As part of this project, we also completed creative workshops where students built models of the two city halls - the Edmonton City Hall and "ratusz"—the city hall in Siedlce. We then took part in a downtown tour of Edmonton where students visited the biggest landmarks in and around Churchill Square and became acquainted with their history and meaning.

Students from both schools found the exchange interesting and worthwhile to their learning.







#### **News from Henryk Sienkiewicz Polish School**

For the first time in the history of the Henryk Sienkiewicz Polish School in Edmonton, the school took part in the project "Together for Education". This project is funded by Ministry of Education and Science in Poland for implementation assignment: "Polonia Family". The purpose of the project is partnership between Polish schools operating in the education system in other countries with schools in Poland. This cooperation includes also social organizations abroad that teach Polish

language art, history, geography, Polish culture, and many other subjects taught in this beautiful language.

Our partner school in Poland for our project: "Together for Education" – "East – West – Poland connects us" is the elementary Sybiraks School Nr 4 in Bialystok.

This project enables two-way collaboration and integration of children living in Canada and Poland, to whom schools give the opportunity to create educational projects

that meet the interests of both parties. Because of their multicultural profit both schools in Edmonton and in Poland have implemented two educational blocks: Multicultural Edmonton and Multicultural Bialystok.

Various groups of children and young people took part in optional classes in Polish language art, history and culture of the polish regions, projects, workshops, and competitions. The school in Poland organized an educational fieldtrip to the south of Poland. Students visited historic places that symbolize patriotism, determination of Polish citizens to protect their national identity, heritage, and the beauty of the national landscape. Photos and reports from this trip have been posted on our school website www.pshs.ca.

Henryk Sienkiewicz School in Edmonton organized an educational fieldtrip called "In the footsteps of Polish Pioneers in Alberta". Students traveled to some Alberta towns and visited few churches and cemeteries in search for Polish settlements and Polish pioneers.

Our school also visited Beechmount Cemetery where students laid poppies on the graves of war veterans as part of the 11th annual No Stone Left Alone Remembrance Day ceremony. A delegation from various school grades laid flowers at the Monument of Polish Soldiers at the Holy Cross Cemetery.



School also organized an art and literacy contest with title: "Celebration of Polish Independence Day and Remembrance Day in Canada".

Students of the senior classes took part in historical workshops and conducted interviews (via zoom) with people who survived exile to Siberia and participated in the battle of Monte Cassino during World War II.

The main goal of the project is to build historical awareness and identity among children and young people in both communities and to continue partnership in the following years.

Descriptions and photos of the implementation of this project are included in a special edition of the

school newspaper "Sienkiewicz's Pen" - also on the webpage of our school.

Teachers from all classes were involved in the implementation of this project, but nevertheless the most work, dedication and time was devoted by the following teachers: Barbara Naletilich, Violetta Stryjski, Monika Jurkiewicz, Bożena Gaciag and Krzysztof Nikścin.

The entire project was supervised by the School Principal Krystyna Dembowski.

This PD session builds on the findings and ideas from my PhD research at the University of Iceland, called School Experience of Plurilingual Students: A Multiple Case Study from Iceland. Plurilingual students in heritage language schools possess unique linguistic repertoires that are both a part of their linguistic identities, and a valuable, rich linguistic resource. In this workshop, the participants will learn how to utilize their students and their own linguistic resources to strengthen the plurilingual identities of their students, to scaffold HL learning, and to teach towards a better language awareness and transfer of language skills. At the end of the workshop, the participants will have a good understanding of the concept of linguistic resources and will have learned a few methods to utilize them for HL instruction.
